

#### FRISCO RAILROAD ATTOR-NEYS PETITION FOR A RECEIVERSHIP.

St. Louis, May 27.—Attorneys for the St. Louis & San Francisco railway will file a petition for receivership late this afternoon.

For several weeks the Frisco stocks have been a low feature of the market and Tuesday following the announcement that receiv ership proceedings had been instituted, made new low records.

Judge Walter H. Sanborn of the Eighth judicial district, came from St. Paul to receive the petition.

The receivership proceedings are understood to have been decic. ed on at a conference today of large bondholders of the railway and a number of the directors, ineluding B. F. Yoakum, chairman of the board J. F. Campbell, James West, W. F. Wade, B. L. Winchell. resident of the company, and Murray Carleton

The petition will be made in the names of Thomas West president of the St. Louis Union Trust Com pany, and other directors.

The petition is to be based on the inability of the railroad to meet a maturing loan of \$2,250,-000 based on short time 5 per cent notes during June. While none of the directors or attorneys would be quoted to the effect that a receivership was contemplated, vet it was learned from a source close to the management that the petition would be filed.

# GEN. YOUNG AGAIN LEADS GRAY ARMY

Attack on Officer Occurs Near Place Where Policeman Was Murdered 10 days Ago.

Fort Worth, May 28.—Stepping from the shadow of Montgomery from the corner where Patrolman John Ogletree was murdered May 15 by Tom Lee, negro an unknown man made a futile attempt to kill Patrolman E. W. Johnson at 4 a. m. Wednesday.

The assailant fired at the police man with a revolver, the bullet passing through Johnson's coat. He ran east and escaped in the darkness after the patrolman had fired three shots at him.

Johnson had just turned from Grover street to East Seventh and was walking eastward in the middle of the street. He saw a man leaning against the building fifty feet away and started toward

The man straightened himself as the officers approached and fir d. As he turned and ran, Johnson pursued, firing. Half a block away, the man fell headlong. He scrambled to his feet and continued his flight, easily outrunning his pursuer.

After searching for his assailant without success ,Johnson returned to his beat. He failed to get a close view of the would-be assasin and does not know whether the latter was a negro or a white man. He can ascribe no reason for the man's act.

It was six blocks from this corner that a sucessful attempt was made upon the life of Patrol man Campbell in August, 1910. A shot gun was used and the officer was killed instantly. The shot was fired from the secondstory window over a saloon in the old "acre" district. One arrest was made in the case, but a trial was never held. The assassin or assassins of Campbell escaped prosecution and punishment.
