COLORADO TRIP TO STATE CAPITAL

Angelo Parties Launch Their Boat at Ballinger and set Sail for Austin. Will Make Trip in Canvas Boat.

Prof. V. J. Smith, John Thomson and Wallace Mason, of San Angelo, arrived in Ballinger Saturday morning at nine-thirty, and after spending about one hour here transferring their boat, and camping outfit to the Colorado river, they left for Austin.

The young men are making the trip in the "Angelo" a canvas boat built especially for the trip. Their outfit consisted of guns, ammunition, fishing tackle, bedding and a short supply of provisions. They expect to sail from the Colorado to the State Capital, camping on the banks of the river at night, and will supply their larder with fish and game.

The young men were unfortunate in having their boat badly snagged in transit from San Angelo to Ballinger, the damage having been done in removing it from the express car. They patched it before launching on the Colorado and carried a supply of material to make repairs that might be needed before they reach Austin.

SOME OAT SACKS.

A firm at Winters received a solid car load of oat sacks to be used in sacking the grain crop of that section of the county. WINTERS MAN DIED AT CHATTANOOGA

L. A. Harper Passed Away While Attending Confederate Reunion. Remains are Brought to Winters.

A phone message from Winters to Jo Wilmeth Saturday morning stated that a telegram had been received at that place from Uncle Johnny Spain announcing the death of L. A. Harper, and that he was en route to Winters with the remains.

Mr. Harper and Mr. Spain left Winters together going to Chattanooga, Tennessee, to meet with the old soldiers. They were both in their usual good health when they left home, and the news of the death of Mr. Harper will be received with sadness among his many friends in this county. We have been unable to learn the cause of his death.

Deceased has been a citizen of this county for many years, and for a number of years he served this county as commissioner. He leaves a family and a host of friends all over the county, and especially in the North end of the county where he has resided for so many years, who are made to feel the sting of death.

The date of the funeral will be announced later, and interment will be made in the Winters cemetery.

BALLINGER MAN PERFECTS PATENT

R. B. Creasy Invents Machine for Gumming and Sharpening Gin Saws. Will Demonstrate Machine.

R. B. Creasy, superintendent of the Ballinger Cotton Oil Mill will leave here Monday for Little Rock, Ark., where he goes with a machine that will fill a long felt want, and that promises to make Mr. Creasy independently "fixed." He has just completed the machine and before shipping it to Little Rock, he operated it for several days at the Ballinger Oil Mill, where he demonstrated thoroughly that the machine is a success, and will solve one of the problems that every gin and oil mill man must deal with.

Mr. Creasy's new machine is a rotary filer or gummer for sharpening gin saws, or linter saws. It is built on a frame that fits over the saws and the little round disc file works automatically and is operated by a cam that raises and lowers the file in between the teeth of the saw as the saws are automatically turned. It does its work perfectly, being operated by a little motor. After being regulated and set for a certain work it does not require the constant attention of the man in charge, and the frame which is moved back and forth on a frame with cogged tracks it is only necessary for the operator to change from one saw to the other as the work of sharpening one is completed.

There is no question as to the success of the new machine, as it has been thoroughly tested out, and proven beyond doubt that it will do a work that has heretofore been done in a much slower and more tedious manner, and it is only a question of time until every gin and oil mill of any size in the cotton belt of the south will be using the machine, saving much time and expense on the saw problem.

Mr. Creasy has secured a patent on the machine, and will have them made as fast as possible. He has already sold a number of them, and he will go with his machine to Little Rock, Ark., where the National meeting of the oil mill and gin superintendents will be in session next week, and he will demonstrate his machine before that body. It is just another step in the advancement being so rapidly made in labor saving devices, and the supplying of practical machinery that solves the problems in every manufacturing and industrial line.

300 PRISONERS MAY BE RELEASED

Lieutenant Governor Mayes Believes that 300 May be Pardoned in Next Few Weeks.

Lieutenant Governor Will H. Mayes was in Houston a few days ago and his presence was noted by the Chronicle which paper secured an interview regarding the work of the investigating committee of which he is chairman. The Chronicle said:

Following the trip of the legislative committee appointed to investigate the financial conditions of the state convict farms, Lieutenant Governor Mayes went direct to Huntsville, where he met the indeterminate sentence committee, of which he is chairman. This committee has been revising a list of about 1000 names of convicts now in the penitentiary and on the state farms who by their individual records will receive consideration of the state pardon board. Lieutenant Governor Mayes stated that the committee has already passed on 150 names of convicts at Huntsville, out of which number they would probably recommend executive clemency for about 40 men.

"This committee," stated Lieutenant Governor Mayes, "will confine its attention to looking after the old, longtime men, the forgotten men in the state penal institutions. There are men who served a great portion of their sentence, who have good records while in the prisons, but who have no friends to intercede for them. These men will be the first to receive consideration. In many instances where the cases are ones of merit we will recommend clemency for the sick and feeble convicts, provided their relatives are in a position to take care of them after they are pardoned. While it is impossible to determine at this time just how many convicts will be pardoned under the indeterminate sentence law, we believe that out of the 1000 names submitted us we will recommend between 300 and 500 pardons. That is the way it looks at this time."

The members expect to make a tour of the farms within a short time so that they might investigate each case on the ground and determine its merits to the fullest extent.
