AVIATORS CHOOSE CHANCES FOR LIFE

St. Louis, June 13.—Facing death, Aviator Anthony Jannus and Arthur Isminger coolly debated in mid air today which of two plans for escape chance would favor. They got in trouble with one of the tail rods in the machine worked loose. Isminger caught the rod, intending to hold it until they could land. In his struggle with the rod his coat tail fell over the exhaust pipe and caught fire.

Meanwhile Jannus had been fighting to keep the machine in the air. While sparks flew from Isminger's clothes they debated whether it would be better to drop the tail rod or desert the steering levers for a moment. They decided on the latter course and while Isminger held tightly to the rod his burning coat was torn from his back. They landed safely at Alton, Illinois.

After leaving Alton, Jannus decided to postpone the flight to Chicago until tomorrow and made trial trips up and down the Mississippi river going as far north as Grafton Illinois, at the mouth of the Illinois river.

BORDER TROUBLES NEAR NOGALES

Mexicans Are Making Frequent Dashes Across the Boundary Into Arizona. U. S. Troops to the Scene.

Nogales Arizona, June 13.—Stricter guard will be kept on the border near Sasabe, Sonora, sixty miles west of here, where the state troops were surprised by an attack from the Arizona side last Wednesday. Two troops of United States cavalry are on their make way to patrol the section. They must make a two days' ride from Nogales.

Testimony has been taken at Laosa, near Sasabe, by Sheriff Nelson, Coroner Comstock and County Attorney Pillinger, who are investigating a fight which occurred Tuesday between Mexican residents of the Arizona side and Sonora state troops, who had crossed into the United States.

Two American farmers were killed and two wounded in combatting the invasion from Mexico.

Dr. C. W. Kelly, called to attend the wounded, declared that ammunition is being smuggled over the international line from Arizona.

Officials of Sasabe, a port of entry for cattle had complained of an attack Wednesday night from the Arizona side of the line by an unidentified party. The attackers were driven off only after guarding the Mexican town had been killed. The investigation at Laosa, however, shows that the insurgent state troops have been crossing repeatedly into Arizona without regard for the international line.

NEW WRINKLE FOR BALLINGER BARBECUE

Barbecue Meat for Big Occasion Will Be Served From Fireless Cookers Ft. Worth Gets Contract.

The committee does not propose to do things by halves, and to insure the best eating ever dished out to the people who come to Ballinger, a new "stunt" will be pulled off in serving the meat.

The committee closed a deal with E. F. Nevans Friday afternoon for meat for this barbecue. Mr. Nevans represents the big packing house of Armour & Co., of Fort Worth, and under the terms of the contract his house is to supply about ten beeves for the barbecue and the meat will be shipped to Ballinger cooked, ready to serve. It will be shipped in fireless cookers, and it will require about fifteen or twenty ovens to transport it here, and it will leave Fort Worth on the morning of June 26th and will arrive here on the night of the 2th and be ready for the big spread at noon on the 28th. This may sound a little "fishy" to some, and you might get the idea that you'll be fed on half cooked meat. You are mistaken, however, if this is your "think" because instead of being fed on cold half-cooked meat, you will have an opportunity of enjoying the most delicious meat, served to you red hot right out of the big cookers.

This plan was used by the Dallas committee in feeding the Shriners that met in that city last month where about ten thousand people were fed, and it is said to be the most successful barbecue ever pulled off in Texas. The meat was pronounced by those who were present, and Ballinger was represented, to be the best barbecue ever served. Armour & Co., furnished the meat on the same plan as contracted for by the Ballinger committee. Mr. Nevans was sent here by the company as soon as they learned that Ballinger would have a barbecue, and the company authorized him to make very liberal prices to the committee, as this is a new "wrinkle" and they desire to show the people what they can do. Mr. Nevans got behind the work, and soon had the order for the "rations" in his book. He formerly lived here, and his many friends will be glad to know that he is making good, and that he will be here on June 28th to show the people what real meat is.

FIREMEN'S RACE WILL BE FEATURED OF BARBECUE

One of the prominent attractions on the program that is being arranged for the barbecue on June 28th will be the race for the cup between the volunteer fire companies of Brownwood, Coleman, Santa Anna and Ballinger. It will be remembered that these companies put up a cup and have been running for it from time to time. Ballinger now holds the cup, having won it in the last two races. The coming race will be hotly contested for if Ballinger should win for the third successive time it gives the Ballinger boys the cup permanently. Of course none of the other companies want Ballinger to get permanent possession of the cup and they will be here with their best material.

GUION MENTIONED FOR A. & M. PRESIDENT

Judge Jno. I. Guion May Be Called on to Head A. & M. College Says He is Not Man for Place.

Galveston, Texas, June 12.—Governor O. B. Colquitt announced late this afternoon that he would not name a successor to R. T. Milner as president of the Agricultural and Mechanical College, but that this would be done by members of the board, who would likely meet for that purpose within the next few days.

Clarence Ousley of Fort Worth and Judge John I. Guion of Ballinger are among those most prominently mentioned, although Governor Colquitt would make no statement concerning either of them. He discussed this situation freely and wound up by saying: "I will not dictate to the board."

The above special appeared in the various papers of Texas, under date of June 12. When Judge Guion's attention was called to the item, he expressed himself as being surprised, and could not account for his name being used except through the friendship for him of the Alumni of the A. & M. College, which recently elected him as an honorary member of that body. This was quite an honor, as the honorary members are limited to a few.

In an interview with this paper and in commenting on the election of a man to succeed Prof. Milner who recently resigned as president of the A. & M. College, Judge Guion said: "I desire first that the man who shall head the A. & M. College be an educator and a business man, and I realize that I am not a shining light, neither as a business man or as an educator. I have not sought the place nor do I desire it, and I have not authorized my name to be used as a candidate for the place."

Judge Guion is serving his third year as a member of the board of the great agricultural college of Texas, and we doubt whether the board could find a man that would make that college a better president should they see fit to elect him. He has many friends here who would rejoice to see him honored with the position, but at the same time, they would regret to give him up, even for a few years that he might serve that college. SHEEP HERDER KILLS RANCHMANN

John McKay of Sanderson, Texas Beaten to Death While Asleep. Murderer Escapes.

Sanderson, Tex., June 13.—Details of the killing last night of John McKay, a prominent ranchman of this county, are still lacking but it has developed that he was beaten to death with a club by Juan Reyes, a sheep herder in his employ. McKay had gone out to hunt for some sheep that were missing and it is supposed he upbraided Reyes for losing them.

About noon he laid down to sleep and the Mexican slipped up on him and killed him. The Mexican then escaped on McKay's horse, going toward the Rio Grande. The murderer had ample time to get to the river and across before anything was known of the killing and he has not been found.

INTERSTATE LIQUOR COLLECTION BY BANK

Federal Judge Reverses Oklahoma Case in Which Bank Was Fined for Alleged Violation of the Webb Law.

St. Paul, Minn., June 13.—A bank which collects a sight draft representing the purchase price of liquor shipped by interstate commerce into a prohibition state does not violate the law prohibiting a carrier from acting as agent according to an opinion today by United States circuit court of appeals.

The opinion was delivered by Presiding Judge Sanborn in reversing the decision of the district court of North Dakota in the case of the First National bank of Anamoose which had been fined \$300 in the lower court. "The history of the times and the proceedings in congress which led up to the enactment of the statute," says the opinion, "have convinced this court that the mischief at which it was levelled was not the collection of sight drafts by banks or ordinary collectors for the purchase price of liquors, although many bills of lading were attached thereto and delivered on collection, but that it was the collection by carriers or their agents of the purchase price for c. o. d. shipments of liquor into prohibition states whereby they become virtually the agents of the liquor dealers.

The collection of sight drafts and the delivery of bills of lading attached thereto long had been a common method of collecting the purchase price of liquors intended without mentioning or referring to it in the statute to strike down this method of collecting for the sale of liquors transported in interstate commerce in all the states in the large majority of which the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors is not prohibited."
