### PULLS TRIGGER WITH TOE; ENDS LIFE

Bell County Farmer Committe Cuicide in Cold Blooded Manner. Leaves Wife two Children.

Rogers, Tex., June 16.—Details of a tragedy enacted laste yestermunity, eleven miles east of this place which tell of the suicide of and well known citizen of the county.

Mr. Moss was the manager, or lessee, of the Watt plantation, an Higginbotham, Currie, Williams extensive farm property owned by Waco interests. He resided, with his wife and two children, in the old Add-Hall farm house on the place. Yesterday evening, accord ing to the accounts of the tragedy while his wife and eleven year old daughter were out in the back yard, Mh. Moss loaded an automatie shot gun with buck shot, removed his shoes and walking to the back door placed the weapon against his breast and pulled the trigger with his toe. Mrs. Moss and the little girl were startled by the report of the gun, and turning saw the multilated body farmer. The demonstration farm- of the arrangements being made of Mr. Moss plunge headlong thru the door and fall across the back porch. The full charge of buck shot took effect in the heart, and death was instantaneous.

No definit cause for the act is

given. Mr. Moss was 38 years old, and leaves a widow and two children, a boy 15 and a girl aged 11.

The little community of Add Hall is universally grieved and shocked over the deplorable tragedy as the Moss family was well liked and highly respected among the neighbors, and, in fact, thruout this section of the country.

Yesterday Jim Got away from the depot with a flying start. His boy grabbed Jim's bundles the moment the train came in, hustled them to the buggy and Jim was several blocks uptown before the automobile was started.

The race was a fierce one but Jim's poor old horse was no match for the high power machine, and they reached the hotel where the visitors had gathered at the same time. The policeman stepped out and ordered Jim to appear in court today. No attention was paid to the driver of the machine.




