The Telephone Switch

The telephone switchboard is divi each section consists of three "positi operator at each position during the total number of sections and position course, upon the size of the telephone ex-

When you call "Central" from your telephon. signal always appears at the same position on switchboard. But the signal of any person calling yo may appear at any of the other positions on the board, depending upon what position that subscriber's line terminates. The operator at that position makes the connection with you right there; your operator will not know that your line is in use unless she should test it and find it "busy."

Sometimes the calling party "hangs up" before you answer; sometimes, through mistake or because of interruption in the circuits or apparatus, you may be disconnected before your conversation is concluded.

The foregoing explains why, in such cases, your operator cannot tell who was calling you-she probably, did not handle the call at all.
