MANY NEW LAWS NOW IN EFFECT

Unhappy Wedded Ones to Have More Difficulty Untying Knot. A Blow to Joy Riders.

Nearly 2000 laws enacted by the Thirty-third Texas legislature became effective June 30, and quite a number of these are of widespread effect. It is said by men in a position to know that more laws enacted by this legislature affect the whole people than by any legislature for years.

What is believed by many to be the most radical change and of widest effect will be the 9:30 closing law for saloons.

This law specifies that every firm or person having a license, who may be engaged in or who may hereafter engage in the sale of intoxicating liquors to be drunk on the premises, shall close and keep closed their places of business and transact no business therein from and after 9:30 p. m. until 6 o'clock a. m. of each week day, and from 9:30 o'clock Saturday night until 6 o'clock on Monday morning the same rules prevail.

Violation of this law will subject the offender to a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$200, or by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

New Divorce Law.

Another law that is of widespread effect is that governing the securing of divorces. This specifies that applicants must have lived in the state twelve months, in the county in which petition is filed six months and that no petition shall be heard until it has been on file for thirty days.

Neither party to a divorce shall under the new law, marry until twelve months after divorce is granted, if it was granted on the grounds of cruelty. However the parties divorced may marry each other at any time they see fit.

Another clause in this statute provides that where a man mar-

ries a woman he has seduced to escape the penalties of the law, he shall not be entitled to a divorce for any cause within three years after such marriage.

In the trial of criminal cases a radical change has been made in the method of charging the jury. Under the new law the judge shall prepare the charge after the evidence is in and before the argument begins, and after giving attorneys a reasonable time to read this charge and prepare objections, if they have any, it shall be read to the jury. This charge shall contain all law applicable to the case and attorney's way, if they see fit, prepare special charges to be submitted by the judge as written if he judges them suitable.

Nine-Hour Law for Women.

The "hours of service" law, governing the number of hours that women may be permitted to work, about which so much has been said and written, is another law passed, but under a special provision, does not become operative until Oct. 1.

It is described as "an act to regulate the hours and safeguard the health of females employed in any manufacturing, mechanical or mercantile establishment, or work shop, laundry, printing office, dressmaking or millinery establishment hotels, restaurants or theaters, telegraph or telephone establishments and offices, and to require all persons employing any female to provide suitable seats for such female and to permit her to use the same at any such time when she is not engaged in the active performance of her duties as such employe, and providing a penalty for the violation thereof."

This law specifies that no female shall work more than fifty-four hours per week, and in nearly all occupations not more than ten hours shall be worked in any one day.

Exceptions to this law are that laundries may work female help a maximum of eleven hours in one day, but not more than the fifty-four hours per week, but all time more than ten hours shall be paid, and a half, and telegraph operators may, in times of great disaster, calamity or epidemic, work a number of hours per day,

providing they are paid for the extra time.

This act does not apply to stenographers or to women who are registered pharmacists in cities and towns of 5,000 population or less.

An employer, overseer, foreman superintendent or other agent of the employer who shall violate any of the provisions shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$50 or more than \$200 or imprisonment in the county jail not less than five days or more than thirty days, or both fine and imprisonment.

Change In Procedure.

An important change in the proceedings in the trial of criminal cases is that applications for witnesses must be made under oath to the effect that the testimony of the witness will be material to the case. This oath will be required both of the prosecution and the counsel for the defense. The district clerk will not be permitted under the law to issue a subpoena until the application has been duly sworn to.

The same chapter specifies that witnesses in felony cases shall be paid by the state \$1.50 for each day that the witness is necessarily absent from home or business.

It is expected that while this will be much more satisfactory to the witnesses, it will cost the state hundreds of thousands of dollars annually.

One of the most radical changes in all the criminal laws is one that does away with the degrees of murder, which have been the bugaboo of so many jurors who have been unable to distinguish between or agree upon.

The penalty for murder under the new law is any number of years from five upward.

A law that will be appreciated by practically all, and especially by owners of bicycles, motorcycles and automobiles, is one mak-

FORMER BALLINGER NEGRO KILLED AT ANGELO

News was received here today (Tuesday) by some of the colored people of a killing that occurred at San Angelo last night. A negro by the name of Walter Mangum, better known in Ballinger as "Mooch", who worked in the Avery saloon here for a number of years, was killed by a negro woman. It is reported that the woman almost severed his head from his body with a knife or razor.

Particulars in Negro Killing.

San Angelo, July 2.—Two negroes and a razor were the principal participants in an encounter Monday night, from which Alice Lawrence emerged into jail and Walter Mangum into eternity. The cutting followed a free-for-all affair in an alley at the rear of the Concho Livery Stable about 10 o'clock, bricks and other missiles being freely used. Following the fight a dash was made for the Lawrence house, a short distance away, where a razor was known to be, the negro obtaining possession of it.

In the cutting that followed, Mangum was slashed in seventeen places the wound which caused death being under the left arm, where an artery was severed. Although medical attention was immediately rushed to his aid, the injured negro survived but twenty minutes.

The woman was arrested following the affray by Officers Carter and Grayson, and is now in jail.

AT THE WHITE CITY.

FARMERS' QUARREL ENDS IN KILLING

Z. Casteven, 36, Shot to Death at Everman. E. W. Winchester Held.

Fort Worth, July 2.—Z. Casteven, 36, was shot and killed by E. W. Winchester on the farm of the latter near Everman Tuesday morning. Winchester immediately boarded an interurban, rode the five miles to Fort Worth and surrendered to Deputy Sheriff John Alderman at the sheriff's office. He claims he shot in self-defense.

The quarrel which resulted in the killing followed the successful efforts of Winchester to dispossess B. T. Howell of a house on a farm leased by Winchester. Winchester obtained an order to dispossess Howell Monday and the latter left the premises. Casteven is said to have become incensed at this action and, according to Winchester, threatened him. Howell had been working for Winchester as a hired hand for several months.

Casteven, who is also a farmer, went to Winchester's place Tuesday morning to get Howell's personal effects, it is said. Winchester armed himself with a 38-caliber revolver before Casteven arrived. Winchester claims Casteven cursed him and was advancing upon him with a large knife in each hand when he pulled the revolver and began firing. Three shots were fired but Winchester did not wait to see if they had taken effect. There were no eye-witnesses.

He went immediately to the Interurban station at Everman, on the Fort Worth-Cleburne line, and boarded a car for Fort Worth. His father, J. W. Winchester, was notified of the killing and arrived here before his son. He retained Baskin, Dodge & Eastus and McLean, Scott, Bradley & McLean as counsel for his son.

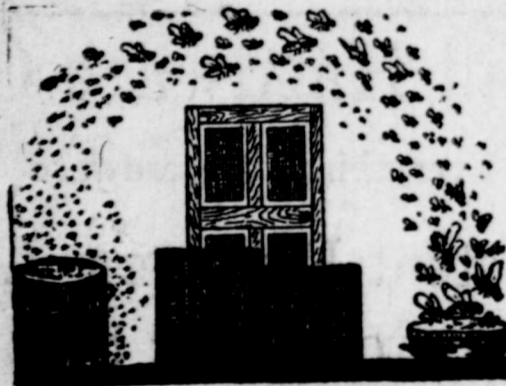

PASSENGERS WILL BREAK FAST IN FORT WORTH

With the establishment of a new and greater Harvey house at Fort Worth additional demands have been made on the poultry and dairy produce raisers of Temple and Bell county and enlargements of chicken farms and dairies are the order of the day.

In the past Santa Fe trains No. 5 and 18, one north and the other south-bound, have "fed" at O'burne but in the future all passengers on these trains will breakfast at Fort Worth. Since Temple supplies the Harvey eating houses with much of their provender the importance of this change to growers of poultry and dairy products can be seen.

The new Harvey house at Fort Worth will be one of the finest appointed on the entire Santa Fe system. It is located at the Union passenger depot, where the Santa Fe and the Houston and Texas Central trains enter. By the establishment of the new eating house the Santa Fe eating service is greatly enhanced, there now being eating houses located not more than 100 miles apart along the entire system.—Temple Mirror.

MANY NEW LAWS NOW IN EFFECT

ing it an offense for anyone to throw any glass bottles, glass, nails tacks, hoop, wire, cans, or any substance likely to injure any person, animal, automobile or vehicle, into the road, street or any alley.

Severe Blow to Joy Riders...

Joy Riders are dealt a severe blow by Senate bill No. 292, which provides that any person who takes, drives or operates, or causes to be operated any motor vehicles bicycle, buggy, carriage or other horse-driven vehicle without the consent of the owner, shall on conviction, if the vehicle is of a value of as much as \$35, be imprisoned in the county jail for not more than one year nor less than six months, and if the value is less than the sum the punishment shall be not more than \$200 or imprisonment for not more than thirty days, or both fine and imprisonment.

The same statute covers the taking of any part, no matter how small from any power-driven vehicle, and sets the punishment at not less than six nor more than twelve months in the county jail.

Besides these, this law specifies that any person who shall start th motor or change the levers or the starting gears of a motor-driven vehicle, or cut, scratch or mark any portion of such vehicle, shall on conviction, be sentenced to not less than six months nor more than twelve months in the county jail.

MANY AMENDMENTS IN ONE.

It is urged against the amendment that it embraces a number of different propositions and that the voters are deprived of the privilege of voting for some of them and against others, and therefore, they should vote against them all. It is true that there are several propositions embraced in this amendment, but they are all related propositions, are all concerned with the proper financing of the State's institutions, and could not conveniently be separated into separate amendments with out breaking the Constitution into many fragments. In submitting these propositions together, the legislature has only done what former legislatures have done—that is, it has submitted in one amendment all matters of an essentially related character. Thus, in 1891, with Governor Hogg's approval, the legislature, is one amendment, completely re-wrote different sections of Article 5 of the Constitution, making almost a completely new Constitution in so far as it pertained to the organization and procedure of the higher courts of the State, a much greater change in the fundamental law than is proposed in the pending amendment. This amendment was adopted by the people by a large majority, and no objection was raised to it on the ground of its embracing many propositions. The present Constitution, embracing hundreds of different sections, was adopted by the people at one vote; and no opportunity was given for voters to express his choice for or against the several individual sections. Exactly the same thing would be done again should a new Constitu-

tion be adopted, as is now being urged by some of the very people who are now raising this objection.

is another of the new ones regarded as important, and provides that when a party is convicted of a first offense, and that it is clearly proven that it is such, except when the charge is murder, perjury, burglary of a private residence, robbery, arson, incest, bigamy or abortion—if the verdict returned by the jury is for not more than five years, the sentence shall be suspended, provided the jury recommends this in its report.

During Good Behavior.

However, under the terms of the law, the sentence may be suspended during good behavior only, and should the same person later be convicted of a felony, the court may sentence for the second offense as well as the former one, and make the sentence cumulative.

Another law of special interest to people who travel on the railway trains, is one requiring train dispatchers to notify the agents along the same road of delayed trains and requiring the agent to post this information in prominent places at the station.

One of the new laws that directly affect a large Fort Worth concern is one to prohibit the use of the Texas flag or any imitation of same to be used for the purpose of advertising any commercial product. This will be punished by a fine of not less than \$25 or more than \$50, and each day shall constitute a separate offense.

For the benefit of the general public and for house wives in particular there is a law that makes it a misdemeanor for a peddler to fail or refuse to leave the premises when requested to do so. The punishment for this offense will not be less than \$1 nor more than \$5.00.

The total number of laws created by this legislature was 182, the ones given being merely those of special interest to the public.
