## WAR WITH MEXICO IS NOW IMMINENT

**Ambassador Wilson is Called to Washington to Confe with President Wilson in Regard to Affairs in Mexico.**

(Special to Ledger)  
Washington, July 17.—The U. S. is in receipt of a code message from Germany today, stating that if the United States does not interfere to bring about peace in Mexico, the German Government will take the initiative to that end. Ambassador Wilson has been called from Mexico City to Washington to confer with President Wilson as to what steps to take.

Germany's message has air of finality about it that indicates she means business and will land troops in Mexico in a short time. Officials in Washington view the situation with alarm and think war is inevitable. In the meantime every step will be taken by Uncle Sam to protect life and property in Mexico. The strictest Secrecy is maintained in the war department.

## ANGELTON MURDER IS NEAR SOLUTION

**Woman's Husband and One Negro Suspect Have Been Released. Narrows Down to One.**

Angleton, Tex., July 16.—After full investigation of all facts in connection with the outrage and murder of Mrs. J. M. Seitz of Post City Wednesday night last, Sheriff Wright has released the slain woman's husband and all other persons detained by him except Jim Duffee, the negro convict trusty, who was alone at the Masterson home all Wednesday and Wednesday night in the absence of the family and which home was nearest to the place where the body was found.

"I will not file a formal charge of murder against Duffee," said Sheriff Wright, "but I have communicated with Judge Styles, he will lose no time in convening a special term of the district court here for his possible indictment and trial. We are convinced that we have solved this murder and stand ready to lay our case against Duffee before the courts. We will give out no line of that case pending court action, which will be taken by Judge Styles at the earliest moment possible. He will probably fix the time for the court term today."

Officials at noon today admitted an analysis of the ashes taken from the stove in the home of Judge Ewing Materson disclosed

a full sea of metal taks, such as would be used in making women's shoes and further that the ashes are partly those of burned material such as shoes are made of.

Stains taken from the floor of the home and also an adjoining servant house occupied by Duffee and believed to be human blood, have also been analyzed, but with what result is not stated.

## BROWNWOOD FIRE CAUSES \$5000 LOSS

Brownwood, Texas, July 16.—Defective flues caused the loss by fire of three residences here late this afternoon. A strong wind blowing at the time the fire was discovered and it was with difficulty that the fire department finally got the flames under control.

The fire originated in a rent house on Durham street and soon spread to the building adjoining. Hard work by the volunteer firemen stopped the conflagration in that block but sparks carried by the wind caught a residence on College street and badly damaged the building.

The loss will reach about \$5,000 partially covered by insurance. This is the first fire Brownwood has had in more than sixty days.

## TWO MILLION ACRES IS ORDERED FORFEITED UNDER THE NEW LAW.

Austin, Tex., July 16.—Land Commissioner Robinson today declared the forfeitures for non-payment of interest and nearly 2,000,000 acres were forfeited.

The forfeitures occurred under the relief act passed by the recent session of the Legislature, which provides for a commission of three, the Land Commissioner to be one, to appraise the lands forfeited and then permit the owners, if desired, to repurchase at a reduced price, if the commission did lower the price.

The land forfeited was that sold on condition of settlement after January 1, 1907, and up to about May 1, 1913. That sold after the latter date and up to January 1, 1913, comes under the provision of the act, but action thereon will come later.

The Governor has not appointed the two members of the commission, and it is known that he has said that he would probably ask the special session to repeal the so called "relief" law. Feeling as he does about it, the executive will probably not appoint the other two members until after the special session, in the event it does not repeal the law.

The following appears in the Land Commissioner's statement to the Governor concerning the forfeitures: "It is aparent that some persons are attempting to speculate on the favors intended to be conferred by this procedure, but in my judgment the board can handle that feature if it should be disposed to do so."

The Governor's opposition, it is understood, is based on reports that advantages were to be taken of the law. It is said that the private land owners, object to reductions in State lands, as it

There is no hurry in appointing the board, as it could not get to work before Aug. 15, as the Governor has plenty of time to deliberate and see what the special session will do.

Burkes, formerly sergeant at arms of the Texas legislature and recently appointed deputy United States marshal with headquarters at Waco, who was drowned in the Llano river near here yesterday with his fiancée, Miss Effie Gamel whom he was attempting to rescue, was recovered from the river late last night. Burke's body was taken to Belton today for interment. It is believed that Burkes was seized with cramps after going to Miss Gamel's rescue.

Belton, July 16.—The body of Chas. P. Burkes, who was drowned Tuesday, will be brought to this city Thursday night on the midnight Santa Fe train.

The funeral services will be held Friday morning at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Burkes.
