CASHIER WINTERS BANK IS MISSING

Financial Embarrassment Causes Cashier of F. & M. State Bank At Winters to Leave Country.-No Funds Short.

The sudden disappearance of F Merrick, Cashier of the F. & M. State Bank, of Winters, caused all kinds of rumors for a couple of days the first of this week. Mr. Merrick left Winters last Friday without telling any one that he was going, or leaving any word as to where he could be found. As soon as it developed that he had gone, a hasty examination was made of the Bank's affairs, and we understand that there is no shortage, and while it has been rumored that Merrick left the bank in the hole about ten thousand dolllars, we learn from reliable sources that this is not true, and prob ably the only charge that can be lodged against the missing cash ier is that he has violated the state banking laws in a techinal

From the best information obtainable it seems that Merrick held considerable stock in the bank, and had borrowed money to the extent of five thousand dollars with which to buy the stock. The note for the borrowed money came due, and being unable to meet it gone, but it is reported that he him in clearing himself.


