## U. S. Marshal Makes Trip to Brownwood, But Finds Suspect Had No Connection.

Brownwood, Aug. 1.-The clew in the Dallas murder mystery which brought United States Marshal McDonald to this city last night has proved false, and no arrest was made The former ranger captain brought with him a number of letters written to the slain Dallas stenographer by a young traveling man of Brownwood.

Captain McDonald became convinced within an hour after arrival here that the clew was worth less, and that the Brownwood party had no connection with the murder.

The young man travels for a typewriter house and had met Miss Brown a year ago. Letters passed between them and only three days before the murder the man had written to her There was nothing, however, in the correspondence except friendly badinage The young man also is known to have been constantly in Brown wood for the past several weeks.
