## FOR WINTERS OIL CAN EXPLODES RESULTS IN DEATH


Mrs. Sneed, Daughter of Commissioner Adams, Burned to Death at Her Home Near Wingate.

News reached Ballinger Sunday of the death of Mrs. Sneed, which occurred Friday night at her home near Wingate. Mrs. Sneed died from burns sustained while assist ing her husband in burning out an old chicken house. Mr. Sneed had a can of oil and was in the act of pouring the oil in the house, Mrs. Sneed was standing nearby, or just Nind him. The oil can exploded, the end blowing out throw ing fire over Mrs. Sneed, and she was so badly burned before the fire could be extinguished that she died in a few hours. The aceident occurred in the forcenoon Friday and Mrs. Sneed died Friday night.

In an effort to put out the fire Mr. Sneed was seriously burned, and while his condition is not con sidered necessary fatal he is not able to use his hands. Fortunately no oil was thrown on him when the can exploded and he was not burned from the explosion. Both hands were badly burned in trying to put out the fire that burned his wife to death.

Deceased was a daughter of Commissioner Adams, and she leaves two children. The awful tragedy cast a gloom over the Wingate country, where the family have lived for a number of years, and where they have many friends. The funeral was held Saturday afternoon and the remains laid to rest in the Win-
