### **BORROWS MONEY TO BUY** POISON COMMITS SUICIDE.

Fort Worth, Sept. 2.—After borrowing 5 cents from a friend to add to 5 cents that he had, Charles Wilson, 35, a waiter, took the dime bought two ounces of carbolic acid and drained the phial on the courthouse lawn Tuesday. He died about an hour later in the Medical College Hospital. Wilson's wife killed herself about two years ago in Amarillo, according to the testimony of Walter Wallis, a friend of Wilson, before Justice T. J. Maben.

Wilson had been in ill health for a long time. Monday night he gave up his room at the Park Hotel, Weatherford and Houston streets, telling the proprietress that he was "going to work some where else."





The greatest deterioration was in Oklahoma, where the condition dropped 36 per cent to 45 per cent. In Texas the condition of 64 per cent showed a deteriorain other states in the part of the belt stricken by drouth was:

Arkansas, 15 per cent; Missouri, 14; Louisana, 12; Tennessee, 10 Mississippi, 8 and Alabama 5 per cent. In all these states the condition was much below the tenyear average condition figures.
