## THAW WILL BE RETURNED TO NEW YORK ASYLUM

Sherbrooke, Sept. 3-Superior Judge Matthew Hutchinson rendered his decision in the habeas corpus case of Harry K. Thaw, dismissing the writ and releasing Thaw from his cell in the Sherbrooke jail.

Immediately upon being released Thaw will be seized by the immigration authorities and the return trip to the Hudson will start. It was first thought that Thaw would only be deported over the Canadian line, but he will be turned over to the New York authorities who will return him to Matteawan.
