Woods, for tventy years vice president of the State National Bank, in whose accounts a short age of \$130,000 was discovered last week, walked into the United States attorney's office this morning and surrendered. He was away on a vacation when the shortage was discovered. His son, a member of the University of California faculty, wired bank officials a few days ago that his father was on his way to Fort Worth.

Woods is supposed to have reached Fort Worth last night about 10 o'clock from California. He was accompanied by Reverend Hubert Knickerbocker of Waco, pastor of a Methodist church there. They went early this morning to the home of Rev. Herman W. Knickerbocker, pastor of the Central Methodist church here. Later they went to the federal building. Wood's bond has been placed at \$15,000. It has not been given, though a number of






