WACO TAILOR SHOP EXPLOSION

Gasoline Ignites and Explosion Injures 9. Two Will Die. Damage to Property \$10,000.

Waco, Tex., Sept. 16.—An explosion of gasoline at the cleaning and pressing establishment of Shafer & Dutte, shortly before 9 o'clock this morning, injured nine persons, two of them perhaps fatally. The building was wrecked by the explosion.

The injured are: Mrs. E. Steger, badly burned on the face, arms and neck and breast, right foot crushed and leg burned. It is believed she will die.

O. W. Maek, head, face and injured, will die.

Mrs. J. T. Ward, burned on arms, breast, neck and face.

Mrs. Hugh Allen, arms, chest, face and back burned.

Mrs. W. B. Moore, slight burns on arms, face and head. She was blown from a second story window into the street.

Hugh Allen, forearms, back and neck burned.

Hilda Petrice, serious burns on face, arms and neck.

Marvin Kelly, slight burns on face, neck and arms.

Sandifer Thompson, a negro porter, was slightly burned on the head and face. A person whose name was not learned, passing on a bicycle, approached the building just as the explosion took place. He was blown clear across the street and his wheel demolished.

From what can be learned practically every one at work at the time of the explosion was hurt. All were accounted for and it is known positively that no one was killed.

Shafer & Duke had carried \$10,000 liability insurance and a small amount on the machinery. The damage to the plant is estimated at \$5000, while the value of clothing is placed at \$2000.

SAM SPARKS MAY BE NEXT GOVERNOR

Friends of Former State Treasurer Trying to Get Him in Race. Local Option and Business Platform.

Austin, Sept. 17.—Friends of Sam Sparks have started a movement to have him announce for Governor. Letters to friends over the State have been sent out, and as soon as the sentiment in different localities is ascertained the friends of Mr Sparks who are promoting his boom will endeavor to have him announce officially.

Mr. Sparks has been identified in Texas politics for some years, having served two terms and a portion of a third term as State Treasurer, which office he resigned to accept a position as an officer in a local trust company. He was previous to that time, a sheriff of Bell county. His influential friends and the strength he displayed in his race for treasurer brand Mr. Sparks as a formidable candidate.

Mr. Sparks would announce on a platform which look to Texas upbuilding rather than to prohibition. He would declare himself in favor of the principle of local option, but rather decree that the prohibition question should be side tracked in behalf of Texas' development of material interests. His friends, who have started the boom, insist that he is much more available than W. A. Hanger, Chester Terrell or John G. Willacy.

Comptroller W. P. Lane is not bothered about what other pros are in the race. "I am in to stay," was his remark. He probably is, to judge from the campaign posters he is having prepared.

"My platform will deal with every important issue in the State, although prohibition, it is true, will be the paramount question involved. The educational question will be the strongest issue in the campaign," Mr. Lane continued. "I want the strongest system of public schools we can get."

Supporters of Lieutenant Governor Will H. Mayes have been awaiting anxiously some announcement regarding his candidacy. Mr. Mayes has made the statement that after the close of the special session of the Legislature he would have a definite announcement to make. The Lieutenant Governor will be acting Governor Colquitt to Panama, and during that time will be prevailed upon by his friends to make acceptance or rejection of the plan of announcing for Governor on the conservative prohibition ticket.
