HIGHWAY INSPECTOR HERE THIS WEEK

Logging Committee Due in Ballinger Thursday or Friday. Will Address People.

At a meeting of the Business League which has been called by President Giesecke for ten o'clock Tuesday morning, among the question to come before the directors will be the appointing of a committee to pilot Mr. Ferguson, the man who is inspecting the route for the National Highway from New York to San Francisco, from Ballinger to San Angelo.

Mr. Ferguson is due here Thursday or Friday. He will be accompanied to Ballinger by a number of good roads boosters along the route from Fort Worth to Abilene, and quite a number from Abilene are expected to accompany him to Ballinger, and at this place he will be joined by a Ballinger party who will accompany him to San Angelo. A committee from San Angelo, will also come here to meet Mr. Ferguson.

It is the desire of Mr. Ferguson and his party of inspectors that they be heard on the plans outlined for this great highway, and as soon as it is known what hour he will arrive here a time and place will be selected for an address and that fact made known to the public.

Some had reached the conclusion that this highway would not come by Ballinger, and that a definite route had been selected, same to follow along a line North of the T. & P. As to this we will learn more definitely when the inspecting party reaches Ballinger. Those who are familiar with the lay of the land for the two proposed routes say that the route this way is far better than the other and after the committee has made its report there is no doubt but what the route by Ballinger will be endorsed as the more favorable.

Watch for further announcement of the inspector's coming, and if possible make your arrangements to accompany him to San Angelo.

THREE NEGROES FIGHT; ALL DEAD

Negro Festival in Ellis County Ends With Three Dead Negroes. Shanty Crowded.

Waxahachie, Sept. 21.—Three negroes, Rufus Birdwell and Lonnie Jackson, of Forth Worth and Will George of Mansfield, were killed last night in a three-cornered pistol duel fought on the Getzendaner farm about two miles southwest of Britton. The shooting occurred in Ellis county, but one of the wounded negroes ran a distance of 200 or 300 yards and died just over the line in Johnson county. All the participants in the duel were slain and no one else was injured.

The dead negroes, according to information gained by the officers, came down to Britton to attend a festival given by negro cotton pickers of that community. The shooting took place in a small shanty which was crowded with blacks. It is said the triple tragedy was the result of the renewal of an old quarrel between Birdwell and Jackson.

Birdwell received three or four wounds, Jackson was shot twice in the stomach, and George received a bullet in the head just above the left ear. Birdwell died in the house and Jackson fell just outside. George ran across the road into a small pasture and there dropped dead. An investi-

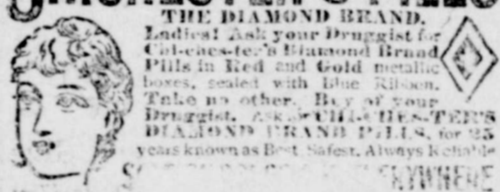

ROAD BUILDING.

Demonstration Work and Machinery on Exhibition at the Dallas Fair.

Of this amount \$1,000,000 is raised by bond issues and \$3,500,000 by taxation. We spend on an average of \$2.00 per annum per capita on our roads and the average in the United States is \$1.55. We have four per cent of our public highways classed as "improved" and the average in the United States is nine per cent.

There is no better investment than money intelligently spent on public highways and every dollar invested in road improvement adds three times its value to adjoining property and every argument that applies to the improvement of private property will apply with multiplied force to the improvement of public property, and especially to public highways, as every farmer must use the roads.
