FREIGHT WRECK **DELAYS TRAIN**

Five Cars Plunge Through Trestle Over Butternut Creek. Conductor and Breakman Slightly Hurt.

A Santa Te freight train running extra from Brownwood to San Angelo, was wrecked at ninethirty Saturday morning two miles West of Benoit, when the trestle over Butternut creek gave way, plunging five cars into the water and mud.

The train was made up of twelve ears and the caboose. Most of the cars were loaded with general merchandise, and the fireman stated that they were making about twenty-five miles an hour when they crossed the trestle. The engine and eight cars had passed over the trestle before the bridge went down, and to this is due the fact that no one was killed and the wreck was not heavier loss to the Santa Fe.

The trestle over Butternut is not a long one, perhaps sixty feet, but on its end. This car is loaded with a general "Dukes Mixtures" of freight. A car of cheese and one of rice and candy were thrown to one side and badly damaged, and one end of the cheese car is sticking several feet deep in the

When the wreck occurred the freight train was running on a schedule that only allowed seventeen minutes for it to reach Ballinger and let the morning passenger, which is due at Ballinger at nine-thirty, pass. As soon as the engineer learned that the conductor and brakeman were not seriously hurt he cut his engine loose and came to Ballinger to report the wreck and hold the passenger train. 



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
