New York, Polo Grounds, Oct. 11.—The Philadelphia Athletics won the championship of the world for 1913 this afternoon when they defeated the New York Giants in the fifth game of the series. The score was 3 to 1. The victory this afternoon made Philadelphia's fourth win. The Athletics won the first game of the series from New York last Tuesday afternoon at the Polo Grounds the score being 6 to 4. The second game went to the Giants, the score being 3 to 0. The third was won by the Philadelphia club, score 8 to 2. The fourth game played in Philadelphia, was won by the American contender for the championship, with a 6 to 5 score. Today's game ended the 1913 series for championship of the world. The game today was one of the fastest played in the series. It was a decided contrast to the ones of the four preceding days, when the games were long-drawn out. The fans were pleased with the snappy game as put up by both contestants. New York fandom took the defeat today good naturedly. Nothing but the best of good feeling prevailed at the game. No remarks out of the ordinary were made by either set of fans. Immediately after the game the Philadelphia team left for the Quaker city. They were escorted to the station by a large crowd of Philadelphia fans. Plank received a warm welcome when his name was announced as the pitcher for the Athletics. Mathewson, who won the second game of the series for the Giants was given an ovation when he stepped out upon the diamond in the first inning. Fans of Gotham were confident almost that the veteran who pitched his team to victory, the man who captured the only game to New York's credit, would

MOTORCYCLE RACER FATALLY INJURED

Was Thrown From His Machine While Racing at Speed of Fifty Miles Per Hour.

Brownwood, Bulletin: While practicing for the motorcycle races this morning at 11 o'clock on the Gun Club Park track, Pat Thompson was thrown from his machine and sustained injuries which it is feared will be fatal.

Thompson and Calvin Gilliam were racing around the half mile track at a speed of 50 miles an hour, and on turning the curve at the south end of the track, just after passing the grandstand the front tire of Thompson machine ran off, stopping the front wheel and throwing Thompson to the ground, where he landed head first. Since that time he has been unconscious, and though physicians did all they could for him there is but little hope for his life. Immediately following the accident he was placed in a car and taken to the home of R. K. Thompson on Brady avenue.

It is believed that the cause of the accident was the fact that the front tire was not sufficiently inflated and could not stand the strain of turning the sharp curves at so high a speed. As soon as the tire ran off Thompson began twisting the handlebars to both sides but almost instantly the loose tire wedged the wheel and the accident followed, Thompson going over the handlebars to the ground. How he escaped a broken neck is wonderful, since the full force of the fall was on his head and neck. There are only two or three scratches on the shoulder and a slight scratch over one eye.

About three years ago Thompson fell at the same point in the track his machine this time skidding in the loose earth. He was injured by the fall, however and since that time his daring has increased with each race. He almost invariably takes the sharp curves at full speed and until this morning has been very successful with his races.

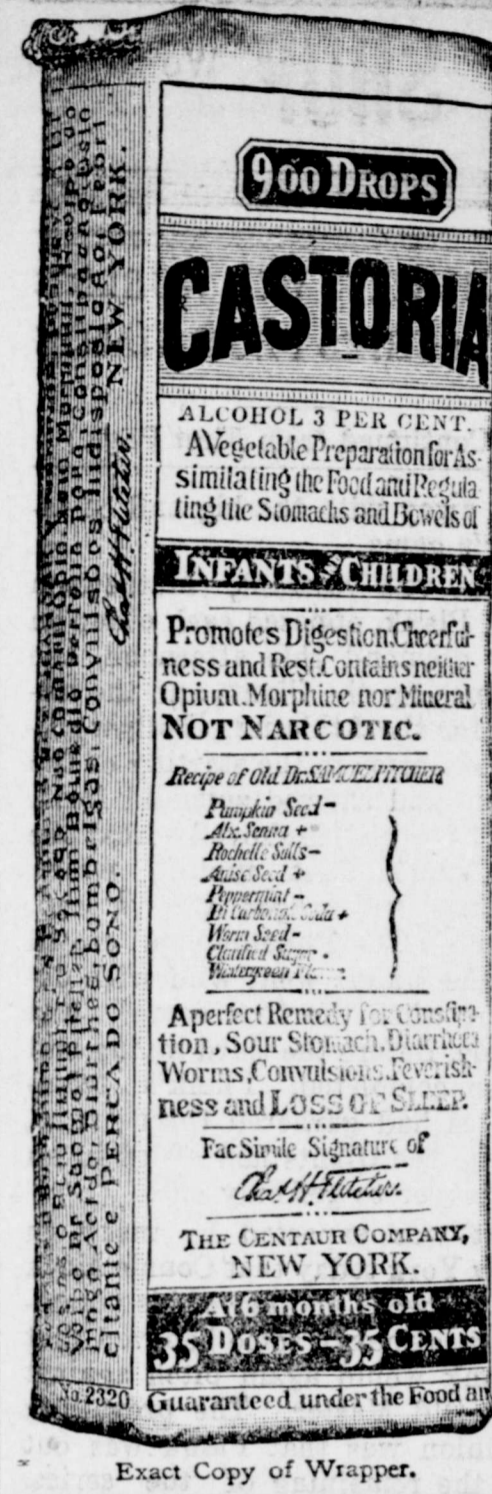
