### OLD LADY TRAVELS WITH \$5,000 BILL

Old Lady En Route From New York to Washington State is Detained in Brownwood.

The Brownwood Bulletin says: Brownwood has an unusual, as well as an unexpected visitor to day. It isn't often that a woman travels around in this country with \$5,000 gold certificates and twelve hundred dollars worth of jewelry on her person. Last night a well dressed, but travel stained woman about 65 years of age got off of train number 18 out of Houston at Temple. She fainted on the Temple platform, and was picked up by Santa Fe train-guard W. V. Fisher, who is also a deputy United States Marshal. After being restored from the fainting condition she told Mr. Fisher to put her on a train for Plainview, stating that she was going there to look at some irrigated land. After getting on the train she acted rather queerly indicating that she was not at all well, and gave Mr. Fisher a note which requested that in the event of her death A. T. Nunnely be notified at Seattle, Washington, Care of George R. Bent Piano Company. She had previously given her name to the train guard as Mrs. A. T. Nunnely. She also turned over to the guard a \$5,000 gold certificate, a \$20.00 bill, a \$5.00 bill and \$1.00, together with a ticket from New York to Anna Cortez, Washington, dated June 7th, and expiring October 31st. The gold certificate is series H. No. 3687 and is apparently all right. She wore diamonds estimated to be worth about \$1200.00. Knowing that a woman in her physical condition should not be traveling alone, especially after she had exhibited so much money and jewelry, Mr. Fisher insisted that she should stop over in Brownwood for a night's rest, which she readily consented to do. The money and jewelry were deposited in a Brownwood bank by Mr. Fisher and Station Master Jack Osborn and Mrs. Nunnely is quietly resting today in room 19 at the Southern Hotel. The bank says it does not handle many \$5,000 gold certificates, but is carefully guarding this one and expects to return the bill to Mrs. Nunnely whenever she is ready to receive it.

### ARRESTED FOR HORSE STEALING

Coke County Officers Arrest Runnels County Man for Horse Theft. Man Brought here.

Sheriff Flynt received a phone message from the sheriff of Coke county Monday night stating that he had in his custody a man charged with stealing two horses in the neighborhood of the county line between Coke and Runnels counties. From the best information obtainable it seems that the man had taken the horses from one pasture and placed them in another, but had not got out of the county with the horses before he was caught with the goods, if such were his intentions. The Coke county officers said that he was en route to Ballinger with the man and would arrive at four o'clock Tuesday afternoon, coming via San Angelo. A witness arrived on the nine-thirty train Tuesday morning, and went before the grand jury and that body is investigating the charge, and it is probable that an indictment will be returned. The man arrived from Bronte at four-thirty in the custody of the sheriff and was placed in jail to await the action of the grand jury.

### 17 CAR SPECIAL TO DALLAS FAIR

Santa Fe Runs Special Train 600 Miles to Compete With Other Lines.

Brownwood, Tex., Oct. 20.—The enterprise of the Santa Fe management was shown when they undertook to run a special train out of Amarillo, via Brownwood to the Dallas Fair and the hustling ability of their representatives and the popularity of the road was attested by the fact that the train which came rolling into the Brownwood station last night at 12:15 carried seventeen first-class coaches, all full of people from the blooming, bounding west. A special was made up Sunday at San Angelo and this special was added to that from San Angelo at Coleman last night.

The Santa Fe was against hard competition because of the fact that it is only a matter of some two hundred miles from Amarillo to Dallas by the nearest line, while coming by way of the Santa Fe through Brownwood it is more than 600 miles from Amarillo to Dallas.

### MEXICAN REBELS HOLD GERMANS

Strong Demand Made on Mexican Government to Insure Safety to Prisoners.

Mexico City, Oct. 20.—The holding of forty-three Germans at Torreon by General Francisco Villa, as hostages against an attack by the federal forces has aroused the German government to make strong demands upon the Mexican foreign office to insure their safety.

General Villa permitted the Americans to depart from Torreon but held the Germans, about the same number of French residents ten or twelve Britishers and several Spaniards, declaring

### TRAIN WRECK

Troop Train En Route to Mississippi State Fair Goes Thru Bridge.

Meridian, Oct. 20.—During the day twenty-six bodies were taken from the Mobile & Ohio troop train wreckage near State Line, Miss., according to a telephone report reaching this city. The report said all bodies had not been taken out. The same report gave the number of injured at ninety-five. Some of these are at Buckatanna and some at State Line, but will be taken to Mobile as quickly as possible.

While the Mobile & Ohio railroad officials say the official reports from Buckatanna received here place the number of dead as high as thirty-five. It is said that up to noon many arms, legs and other parts of bodies were being picked up separately and this may have led to exaggerated reports of the number killed.

It is reported that an unrecognizable mass of parts of human bodies is accumulating at the wreck scene.

### LITTLE CHANCE FOR ENTOMBED MINERS.

Rockdale, Tex., Oct. 20.—Digging for entombed Mexican miners continues at the Vogel mine here. Those in charge of the rescue work hope to strike the tunnel at sixty-five feet, before daylight.

The drill sent here by the state mining board today for the purpose of making an opening for food and air in case any of the miners are alive, was set to work at noon. It is now in solid rock at forty feet. No developments are expected before morning.

### TEXAS CROPS IN GOOD CONDITION

Washington, D. C., Oct. 21.—The condition of all growing crops of Texas, on October 1st, 1913, was 98.5 per cent of the average condition of the previous ten years, according to a recent report of the Federal Crop Reporting Board. On the same date last year the condition was 95.1 per cent. The general average for the United States was 90.3 and 89.9 on October 1st, this and last year respectfully.

FOREST NOTES.

Siam exports about nine million dollars worth of teak a year.

The Automobile Club of America, through its bureau of tours, is urging automobilists to use care with fire in timbered regions.

Oils distilled from the needles of spruce and fir trees are being used to scent petroleum floor oils which are sometimes objectionable on account of their odor.

The governor of Iowa has set aside a fire-prevention day, urging that the citizens discuss and create a sentiment against forest fires and other conflagrations.

The average area administered by a ranger on the federal forests of the United States is about 100,000 acres. In Germany the area administered by a man of equivalent rank is about 700 acres.

The republic of Colombia is said to have excellent regulations for its national forests. Lumbermen who take cedar and mahogany are required to plant young trees of the same species in the cut-over spaces.

TEXAS COTTON AVERAGE ABOVE THIRTEEN CENTS

A bulletin just issued by the United States Department shows the average price per pound of cotton in Texas on October 1st, 1913, to be 13.3 cents, which is the highest average for any of the cotton states. This average has been maintained on the local market. The average price a year ago was 11.4 and the staple has averaged this price throughout the past five years. The acreage devoted to this plant in Texas this year is estimated at 11,732,000 compared with 11,338,000 acres in 1912.

WACO PUBLISHER MEETS TRAGIC FATE

C. J. Glover, Manager of the Times-Herald, Found Dead on Floor of Bath Room.

Waco, Oct. 20.—Chauncey J. Glover, aged 51 years, secretary-manager of the company publishing the Waco Times-Herald, was found dead in the bathroom of his home, No. 1219 Washington street, shortly after 6 o'clock this evening with a bullet wound in the head. He was a member of the Associated Press.

Mr. Glover was on the streets all today. He called at the places where he was accustomed to call from time to time and was at his office a part of the time during the day. This afternoon he had an appointment for 5 o'clock with some of the employes of his office to collaborate on some of the work of the office. He did not keep the engagement and just before 6 o'clock his daughter called at his office in an automobile to take him home. As he was not there his son Chauncey J. Glover Jr. got in the car with his sister and motored home. Reaching the residence the young man searched the house and finally went to the bathroom where he found him on the floor dead.

His close friends have observed that his health had been failing gradually since he lost his wife a few months ago.

Mr. Glover was born June 26, 1862. He was the son of Joe Glover, a pioneer merchant of Bastrop and at one time mayor of the town.

At 20 years he became a printer on the Belton Journal.

Three children survive him, Chauncey Glover Jr., Mrs. Doris Prendergast and Miss Mary Glover.

Funeral services will be held at the family residence Wednesday afternoon at 10 o'clock.

IGNORANCE IS BLISS FOR THIS AGED MOTHER

Chillicothe, Ohio, October 19.—An aged mother greeted her son here tonight with tears of joy over what she thought was his return from the west, ignorant of the fact that he has been a prisoner in the Ohio state penitentiary for the last two years. She is Mrs. Mary Gartner, aged 86. In January, 1911, her son, Nolan L. Gartner, was sentenced to serve six years in the penitentiary for making false entries in the books of the Kingston bank, which failed.

Fearing knowledge of his sentence would cause his aged mother's death relatives concealed it from her. She is too old to read and care was taken that she did not hear through neighbors of the trial. The son told her he was going west to work for an insurance company when he left home to go to the penitentiary and she helped him pack his trunk for the "long journey." Regularly during the past two years he has written her "from the west" and though the letters were written on prison letterheads she did not know it for they were read to her. Now relatives declare she shall never know the truth.

OLD ROYAL HOUSE

Chateau Bonnetable Dispenses Hospitality to Beau Monde.

Antient Palace of Noble House of La Rochefoucauld-Doudeauville, Near Paris, Scene of Many Aristocratic Gatherings.

Paris.—The present generation of the old nobility of the Faubourg St. Germain, with the fathers and grandfathers, have found the most sumptuous hospitality of country life at Bonnetable, the chateau presided over by the duchess of La Rochefoucauld-Doudeauville, generally spoken of simply as the duchess of Doudeauville, to distinguish her from her cousin by marriage, the duchess of La Rochefoucauld, who was the American Matthe Mitchell, daughter of a United States senator.

Bonnetable is in the Sarthe department and is easily accessible from Paris. It was rehabilitated by the last duke of Doudeauville, who died in 1908, shortly before his eighty-fourth birthday, a wonderful old man who spent many years of his life in the work of reconstruction and then in making the chateau the center of a society life which brought together the leaders of the ancient nobility. He had a large family of children and grandchildren and he lived to see them all make exceptionally brilliant marriages.

His eldest son, the present duke, married Princess Louise Radziwill, and the other sons married Princess La Tremolle and Marchioness Colbert, while one of his daughters became the wife of the prince of Ligne and the other married the duke of Harcourt.

The late duke was a famous ambassador during the time of Napoleon III, being many years at the head of the French embassy in London, and he always invited the American ambassadors in Paris out to Bonnetable along with the other members of the diplomatic corps.

Otherwise few Americans were included in his house parties. He was a royalist of the old school and did not approve of Americans. When his kinsman married Mattie Mitchell the old duke considered it a terrible mortification. He said: "The young man's father married his housekeeper, so what could you expect from their son?"

But the present duke of Doudeauville and his duchess have extended their invitations to Bonnetable to a small number of Americans, who consider it the crowning achievement of society "climbing" in Paris to be asked to join that exclusive circle. The duchess of Doudeauville likes Americans and frequently goes to their houses herself.

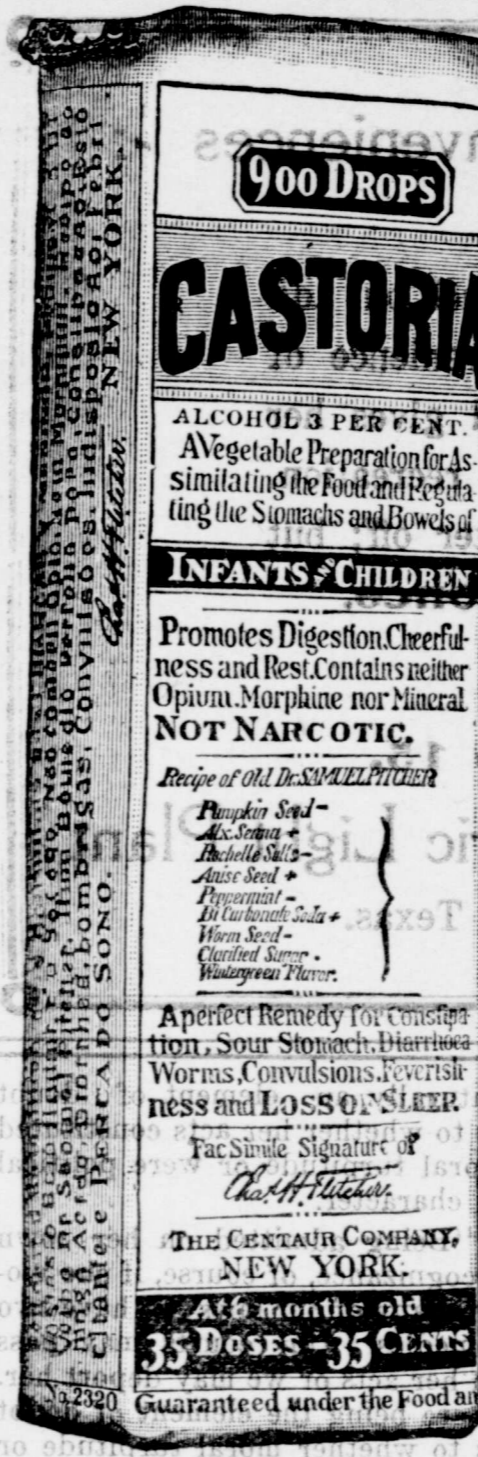

### ADMITTED TO U. S.

**British Suffragette Must Leave Country After Filling Lecture Engagements.**

Washington, Oct. 21. — Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the militant British suffragette, is free to enter the United States. The Ellis Island board's order of deportation was reversed after President Wilson had conferred on the celebrated case with Secretary Wilson and a hearing had been concluded before Immigration Commission Caminetti.

Secretary Wilson announced after the conclusion of his conference with the President that Mrs. Pankhurst would be admitted upon her own recognizance with the understanding she would depart at the end of her lecture engagements. No bond was exacted.

Secretary Wilson declared that he and the President had discussed the question briefly.

"We agreed," he said, "that Mrs. Pankhurst should be admitted on her own recognizance. My own reason is, and the President feels likewise, that there is

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## WASHINGTON'S NAME

### TRAMPLED IN DUST

Washington County Sheriff Forgets the Principles Taught in Story of the Hatchet and Cherry Tree.

Banner-Press: Sheriff Teague returned last night from Ballinger and other points in west Texas.

The people out there are doing very well, says Mr. Teague, although the weather has been fearfully dry for quiet a while. The Ballinger section is one of the best agricultural sections of Texas, when rains are abundant but when drouth prevails it is a hard matter to make any kind of crop in a paying way. In this respect conditions are always better in East Texas, because the climate there is more humid and it never gets so dry that some kind of crop is not made. In speaking of crop conditions in the Ballinger section, Mr. Teague tells some amusing incidents which he says he experienced while in the section mentioned:

"I was told by numbers of farmers out there," said he, "that this year has been the worst year for all kinds of crops that has been experienced in the Ballinger section in many years. One farmer told me that if he raised as much cotton in the next two years as he had raised in the past two years that he would have to take it to the gin, because it would amount to about one bale. Another asked me how they paid for picking cotton here in east Texas and I told him we paid so much per hundred pounds. He then told me that the farmers this year around Ballinger, were hiring hands and paying for them by the mile—that is the hands were paid for the number of miles they walked in looking for cotton."

"Still another farmer is reported as taking one of his boys to town and while they were looking around the street sprinkler passed and the man remarked to his boy that he now had an opportunity of seeing how it looked when it rained. The boy expressed great surprise as it had not rained since he was born and he had no idea how it looked."

Sheriff Teague told many other interesting things in regard to the western part of the State but failed to get the sory of he locality where it was recently reported that it hadn't rained in so long that there were thousands of old grey whiskered bull frogs in the neighborhood that didn't know how to swim.

The sheriff says Washington County puts it all over every section of the West, that he saw and he was glad to get back here again in God's country.

If we were a delicate little thing and too timid to open our mouth when being prodded with a column odoriferous hot-air, as the above is, we would hesitate about replying to the statements credited to the high sheriff of Washington County. But like all newspaper men and most sheriffs of East Texas, we never let anything pass us by nor let ourselves pass anything by, not even a "wet county." In the first place, we do not believe that "the law" of the county christened after the first president of the United States, made the statement above. This is not saying the editor of the Banner-Press dreamed them on a schooner. Far from it, but simply implying other things. All sections have there good and bad points. Washington County evidently pleases the sheriff or he would move away. Runnels County, or "the Ballinger section" meets our fancy, and we habitate here. There is quite an intervening space between the two places, and we are glad.

The reporter of the Banner-Press, in starting his direful tale, describes the incidents which the sheriff met with in "the Ballinger section", as "amusing."
