COUNTERFEITER DIES IN ANGELO JAIL

The old man who was arrested at San Angelo about one week ago and brought back to Ballinger charged with passing a counterfeit five dollar bill, at the Seerest Hotel, and who was later removed from the Ballinger jail to the San Angelo jail by the federal officers, died in his cell at San Angelo Thursday night.

True to his statement that he would die before he would tell the whereabouts of his people and bring shame and disgrace upon them through his violation of the Federal law, the old man died with sealed lips, and a loving daughter and son will no doubt ever know the closing chapter of a life that ended in shame and was made to sorrow over the death of a father in a prison cell.

The old man used two or three names when he was first arrested by the officers, but he finally told them that his name was McLibbon. It is thought that this was not his right name, and he refused to tell anything that would enable the officers to locate his people.

The old man stated that he was 75 years old, and he looked every day of it. He was feeble, and when placed in jail expressed a desire to die, and told those with whom he talked that he realized that he was not much longer for this world, and the end came very suddenly, heart trouble being the cause of his death.

After being returned to San Angelo the old man was given a preliminary hearing and his bond fixed at \$2000, which no effort was made to secure by him, and he requested that the court make quick work of his case. Subpoenas were being issued, and in a few days a number of Ballinger people would have been called to Fort Worth to testify in the case. It is not known here what disposition will be made of the remains, but it is presumed they will be laid to rest in the potter's field at San Angelo.

WAR WITH MEXICO SEEMS CERTAIN

Texarkana, Tex., Nov. 6.—"Unless Huerta complies with demands of the United States there will be war with Mexico," declared Congressman Horace W. Vaughan here today. "We are fully prepared for any emergency I don't believe any foreign power will join hands with Mexico against the United States. It is not at all probable that Japan will take a hand in spite of the efforts of young hot bloods there. Though should other nations join, the United States is amply prepared to protect its own interests."

Mexico City, Nov. 6.—The purpose of General Huerta were voided this morning by a person who is close to the provisional president. The president is determined to reject all the demands set forth in the latest American communication and is resolved to seat the congress just elected.

If congress, however, declares the recent presidential election null and makes arrangements for another election, General Huerta would be disposed to abide by this decision and submit to the people's choice of a man who would occupy the president's chair until the autumn of 1916.

Mexico City itself is still ignorant of the nature of the new representations made by Washington to General Huerta. The newspapers here have printed only denials of the reports from the United States until today, when they partially confirmed them.

The Herald, the only English daily newspaper, published a dispatch from Vera Cruz stating that John Lind, the personal representative of President Wilson, had confirmed the reports of "certain indications being made by Washington to Mexico."

W. Norman and family at Paint Rock.

Mr. Norman is a son of J. W. Norman, of Paint Rock. He went to Dallas several years ago, and married a Dallas girl. They visited relatives here some time ago, and the friends of the family and relatives will regret to learn of the death of this young wife. The remains were laid to rest at Dallas.

WILL MAKE RACE FOR TAX COLLECTOR

Learning that the friends of M. D. Chastain were urging him to permit his name to go before the people for the office of tax collector, and incidentally running across him, we asked him if there was anything in the much repeated rumor. Mr. Chastain stated that he had had the matter under consideration for some time, and had been solicited by friends from every section of the county, and many of his friends learning that there was some probability of his entering the race had volunteered their support, and that this had caused him to decide to make the race, and at the proper time he would make his formal announcement.

Mae Chastain came to Runnels County in 1890, coming here from Menard county, where he moved with his parents from Collin county in 1872, to take the place of some Indians who had decided to go further west. He is an "Old Settler" in the true sense of the word, and is well known to all old settlers in Runnels and surrounding counties. In the early days he worked on the cow range from San Antonio to New Mexico and knows what pioneer life is.

When Mr. Chastain first came to Runnels county he engaged in the grain and grocery business, and remained in that business up to the time of the organization of the F. & M. Bank when he became associated with others in the organization of that bank and sold his business house, which was torn down and the modern bank building built on the lot. He has been prominently connected with the development of Ballinger and Runnels county. He has served his country in the capacity of school trustee and city alderman, and of course sacrificed his time in the work of building for the interest of the coming generation.

It has been said that if a man ever committed anything wrong in his life, it would be brought out on him when he entered politics. This old saying, be it ever so true, will not stand as an obstacle in the race of M. D. Chastain. It is a foregone conclusion that there will be some mighty good men in the race besides Mr. Chastain, and it, like other political races in the coming campaign promises to be interesting.

ATTEMPT TO MURDER GEN. FELIX DIAZ

Havana, Nov. 6.—Gen. Felix Diaz was stabbed by a Mexican at 10:30 o'clock tonight. He was wounded twice, probably not fatally.

The attack on Diaz occurred while he was walking on Malecon, a fashionable promenade.

He was wounded behind the ear and in the neck, besides receiving several blows on the head from a cane. Diaz was removed to a hospital. His assailant was arrested.

BLOOD POISON DEATH THIS MORNING

S. J. Bates died at his home four miles south of Ballinger Friday morning at ten o'clock. Death was due to blood poison. A little place on Mr. Bates' lip became infected about a week ago and physicians were called to see him last Sunday. The trouble was pronounced blood poison and Mr. Bates rapidly grew worse until death relieved his suffering.

Deceased came to Ballinger about four years ago. For the first two or three years he resided in town, and it will be remembered that he lost his home near the standpipe by fire about a year ago. He then moved to a place he owned south of town and was living there at the time of his death.

He is survived by a wife and several children. As we go to press arrangements are being made for the funeral and the remains will be interred in the Ballinger cemetery some time Saturday.
