DRAWS NEAR

Washington, Nov. 9 .-- Forego. ing his usual custom of banishing official business on Sunday, President Wilson worked practically all of today on the Mexican problem. He did not go to church, remaining indoors during the forenoon. Later he summoned Senators Borah and McCumber, Republican members of the senate foreign relations committee and spent nearly two hours with them in a general discussion of the situation. Tonight the president con ferred at length with Secretary Bryan.

From the way the president's callers tallied, the situation is rapidly approaching a climax and some definite developments are expected immediately. Officially no copy of the statement of Provisional President Huerta's note to the diplomatic corps last midnight had been received, nor had the formal reply to the American demand that Huerta resign arrived.
