Particulars at that time were not complete but later reports state that the origin of the fire is unknown. The gin was owned by J. R. Holloway. Mr. Holloway ginned a number of bales of cotton Wednesday and closed down as usual Wednesday night, and the fire occured about three o'clock Thursday morning, and the fire was under good headway when the fire was discovered

The gin was a four stand gin, and was well equipped for converting seed cotton in lint cotton and pressing it into bales. Mr. Holloway only carried about \$2000 insurance, and the loss falls pretty heavy on him. Fortunately the ginning season is about over and the farmers of the Norton country will not be inconvenienced but very little. Mr. Holloway will rebuild and be ready in ample time for the next crop.





Construing all of the provisions of the chapter providing for the levying and collecting of intangible taxes, we think there is no doubt that such tax is not subject to any local taxation but only to state and county taxes.
