TRAIN MANGLES

ABILENE YOUTH

Abilene, Tex., Jan. 29—The identity of a young man who was ground to death beneath the wheels of a Texas & Pacific rail road between Eastland City and Dothan at an early hour this morning has not been established in this city, although the young man wore clothes which had the Abilene stamp on them. According to the meager information which reached the city about the boy he was evidently known by some body in Abilene.

The unidentified young man was aged between 18 and 19 according to the judgement of those who surveyed the badly maimed corpse. He had light complexion with along sear above the right eye. His eyes were brown, and he wore a Union Woolen Company suit that had the Abilene stamp on the inner pocket. The suit worn was a light grey check and on the inside above the pocket was the words, as they could best be deciphered: "Mermont" or "Merehan" with the letters "E. W." before the name. However the coat was so badly ground and bloody that it was hard to decipher the lettering. The coat was made May, 27, 1910.

All efforts of the railroad men to identify him have been futile.

TRAPPER BRINGS IN ALL KINDS OF SKINS

George B. Eskeridge of Ballinger, one of the early settlers of Runnels county, now a trapper in this section of the state, visited San Angelo Thursday, bringing with him a large number of furs and hides, which he turned over to the county to be passed upon for the bounty at the next meeting of the commissioners. The pelts of three timber wolves, one coyote and numerous hanger, skunk and possum hides were included in the number. The animals were trapped on the Llano ranch, 15 miles north of town.

"Trapping has been unusually good during the past few weeks, due to the present spell of warm weather," stated Mr. Eskeridge Thursday morning. "However, the hides are not quite so good, due to the fact that the fur does not grow so long in warm weather as in the cold snaps."

After disposing of his pelts, Mr. Eskeridge left again for the ranch to resume his work.—San Angelo Standard.

PLANS GAIN

TANGIBLE FORM

The plans among Ballinger men who have been pushing the idea for the organization of a West Texas league of six clubs, have almost gained tangible form. A subscription list has been started among the business men of the city. Letters have been written to the baseball leaders of the five towns interested in the movement asking for their support.

It is the intention of those at the head of the local movement to collect enough money from the business men of each town to pay all railroad expenses. Twelve men will be carried by each club. This will demand a neat little sum of money, but not as much as imaginable at first thought, since a low baseball rate is allowed the clubs by the railroad commission. About two hundred and fifty dollars would be required from the business men. This money will pay the railroad expenses of the Ballinger club around the circuit twice, as planned.

Ballinger, Sweetwater, Coleman, San Angelo, Brownwood and Abilene are the towns planned by the Ballinger leaders for the circuit. A schedule of sixty games, according to the Ballinger boys would be sufficiently long enough to interest those who love baseball as a sport. Nothing but home material would be used.

The gate receipts would pay the hotel expenses of the visiting club each day of its stay in the city and probably allow a little money to go to the treasury. At the end of the season this money would be split amongst the players. It is believed that a neat little sum could be derived from the games by this means.

A sixty-game schedule would mean thirty games on the home lot. Two road trips would be required.

The secretaries of the various chambers of commerce of the cities interested in the movement for a league's organization are interested, judging from the manner in which letters have been flowing into Ballinger lately, asking about the league. It is hoped before many days something definite will be decided upon and plans actually perfected for the circuit. In all probability the Ballinger end of the organization will be up to the standard since the amount required for the starting of the league will be raised among the business men with little effort. A majority of the merchants who have announced their intentions of donating a little amount have stated that they realize the amount of advertising the town will derive from the national game's being played here by an organized club.

BOY SCOUTS OUT FOR A LITTLE HIKE

The Boy Scouts, about twenty in number, with Scout Master, Rev. A. C. Smith, will go out for a little hike this afternoon. 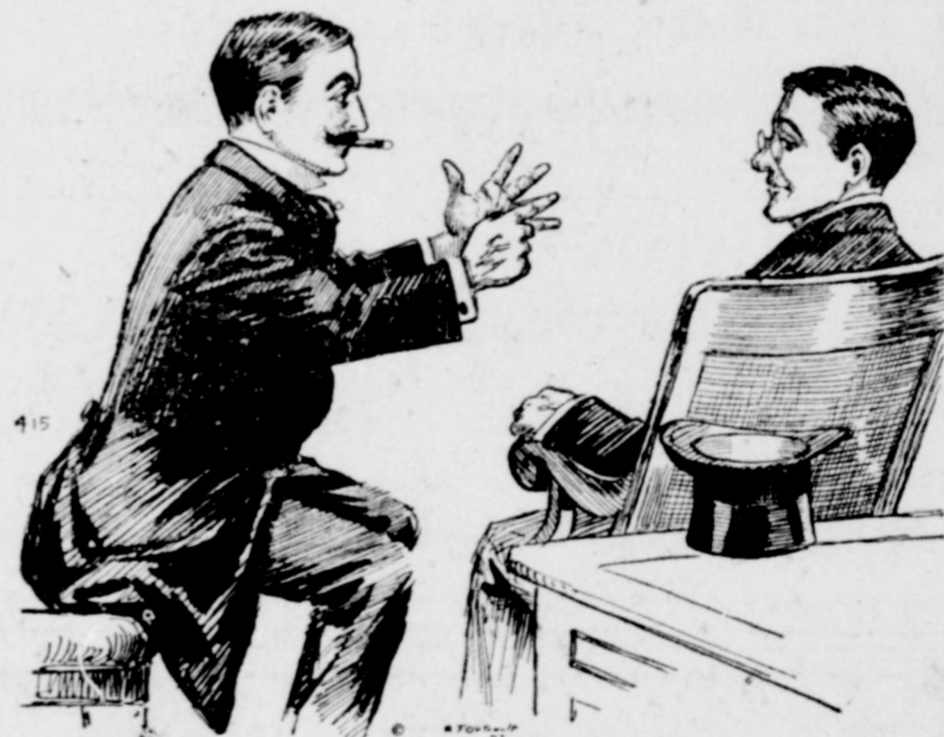
SOME TURKEYS

Mr. Creswell says they have raised something over two hundred turkeys on the ranch the past season and that he now has 103 turkey hens and 17 fine gobblers which he will keep to raise from this year. He has a fine range for his turkeys and at very little expense and trouble hopes to do better the coming year.



DEATH OF BALLINGER LADY REACHES OLD HOME

In speaking of the death of Mrs. Don A. Swett, which occurred in Ballinger last Sunday night, the The Victor (Colo.) Daily Record says:

"Mrs. Swett was one of the best known residents of the camp and was loved and respected by every one in the district. Coming to Victor about sixteen years ago the Swetts built a home on South Fifth Street where they lived until the time of their departure for the warm country. Besides her husband she is survived by two children, Harry age 14 and Cleonee age 4, both of whom were born in Victor.

About a year after their arrival in Victor Swett became engaged in the postal service and for about fourteen years he served most efficiently and well as an assistant postmaster under many heads. He was a very popular public servant and the unusually good standing of Mr. and Mrs. Swett in the lodge and social life of the camp; attested the ability of the couple.

The couple were married at Punksa, Neb., the girlhood home of Mrs. Swett, eighteen years ago and two years later they moved to Victor. Her health had been failing for some time prior to their removal to Ballinger about one year ago. It was with the hope that a change in the climate would benefit her health that Swett sought a transfer to Texas. The change of climate promised to benefit for a time and then her condition grew steady worse."

DOINS IN COLEMAN TOWN.

(From the Democrat.)

By petition of more than ten per cent of the qualified voters of the city of Coleman, Mayor J. A. Miller has called an election for Tuesday, March 3rd, to determine whether or not the city shall adopt the Commission Form of Government.

Joe F. Bryant, a prominent farmer-citizen of the Burkett community, was accidentally killed Tuesday morning, January 27 in the neighborhood of his home five miles south of Burkett, when his team ran away. Mr. Bryant was engaged in hauling wood and it is supposed the accident occurred about 11 o'clock a. m. His body, almost lifeless, was found by Roger Kenney about one o'clock p. m. Tuesday, and conveyed to the home of W. A. Smith where death ensued shortly afterward.

An agreed judgment was entered in the Fifty-sixth district court in Galveston the 21st inst., against the Coleman Compress Company in which violation of the so-called "spider-law" was alleged. The defendant company paid a fine of \$750 and costs in open court. This is the first "spider law" case to come to trial. There are a number of others pending.
