WASHINGTON, May 4.—D'Emilio Rabas, a prominent jurist and Augustine Galindo, under Secretary Justice, have been selected as two of the three of Huerta's delegates to confer with A. B. C. mediators. The third delegate will be submitted tomorrow.

May Name Olney As Chairman

WASHINGTON, May 4.—Richard Olney of Massachusetts, who was secretary of state under President Cleveland, is reported to be President Wilson's choice as chairman of the federal reserve board.

Olney refused the British ambassadorship on account of bad health.

May Bombard City of Guaymas

(By United Press.)
SAN DIEGO, May 4.—Guaymas newspapers declare that Admiral Howard intends to notify the authorities of the Mexican city that he will bombard the city at the expiration of 48 hours unless Americans are accorded better treatment.

It is reported here that Americans and other foreigners are leaving Mansanillo by hundreds in fear of violence. The city's pier has already been burned.

RATTLE SNAKE ATTACKS NEGRO GIRL

Austin, May 4.—An adventure with a six-foot rattle snake in the heart of the city is unusual, to say the least, but that is what happened yesterday afternoon, and the adventure had its hero.

A negro girl who was passing some rice home from the grocery stumbled and fell, arousing the big reptile, which was coiled among some tin cans nearby. The snake struck at the girl, fastening its fangs in her clothing. Frank L. Willis, a tree expert connected with the State Department of Agriculture, working on some trees nearby, ran to the girl's assistance, grasping the snake with one hand and almost cutting its head off with a tool in the other.

The snake retaliated, however, scratching the skin of Mr. Willis' arm with a fang. He bled the arm and a physician was called, who administered such remedies as were deemed needful.

Mr. Willis left on the afternoon train for his home at Temple.

HUERTA FORCES PREPARING ATTACK ON VERA CRUZ

In Order to Save Himself from Revolutionists Will Attempt to Draw American Troops into Mexico City—Mediation May Blow Up with Loud Noise.

(By United Press.)
VERA CRUZ, May 4.—It is believed here that Huerta will provoke a bloody engagement at Vera Cruz, and in this way draw the American troops on to Mexico City in order to save himself from falling into the hands of the revolutionists.

Maas, who is stationed near here with his men is rapidly being reinforced, and it is reported that he is preparing to attack Vera Cruz at an early date. The little skirmish last Saturday in which the federalists tried to drive the American guards off their post, following Maas' demand that the Americans surrender the water-works, supports this theory.

Mediation May End Any Minute.

(By United Press.)
WASHINGTON, May 4.—The peace proposal is still up to Huerta. If he provokes a battle at Vera Cruz or slaughter any Americans in the Mexican capital mediation will blow up with a loud noise.

The Chief of Staff of the army has completed all plans to reinforce General Funston if it becomes necessary. Transports due at Galveston will be provisioned and kept ready to transfer another brigade to Vera Cruz on short notice.

A. B. C. mediators are awaiting appointment of the representatives for the United States and Huerta government. Carranza will attend further conferences.

General Strike May Be Called

(By United Press.)
INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 4.—Members of the executive board of the United Mine workers are arriving for a meeting which may order a general strike over the country. Fifty thousand miners will be concerned in the proposed strike. It is possible that at the meeting the members of the board may vote for the confidence in the federal government's ability to handle the Colorado situation. The sessions will last through the week.

Vive President Frank J. Hayes said that a general strike was hardly justified.

SPECIAL TRAIN CARRIES REFUGEES

(By United Press.)
LONDON, May 4.—A suffragette threw a hammer at the portrait of Henry James today at the Royal Academy. The hammer broke a glass and tore much of the canvas. She was overpowered and arrested.

Floods Serious In North Texas

(By United Press.)
DALLAS, May 4.—Heavy rains early today aggravated an already serious flood condition. Many sections of Oklahoma and Texas were visited by heavy rains early this morning. Schedules on all railroads are delayed.

Dozens of bridges, including a few railroad bridges, have been washed out. An unconfirmed report has it that three deaths at Geary, Oklahoma, have resulted from the floods. Several have been rescued from tree tops.

Governor May Be Impeached

(By United Press.)
DENVER, Colo., May 4.—The Colorado legislature met in special session today. Although the call stated that the only business would be the appropriation of funds to maintain the state militia in the strike fields and pass other strike laws, these probably will be overshadowed by an attempt to impeach Governor Ammons.

His friends say the effort to impeach him will fail. Compulsory arbitration, state constabulary and the regulation of private mine guards will be discussed at the session.

The disarmament of strikers is rapidly proceeding today. Additional federal troops are pouring into the strike zone.

MEXICANS PROTEST AGAINST REMOVAL

(By United Press.)
EL PASO, May 4.—Under a heavy military guard, 5000 Mexican federal soldiers with their wives and children began entraining today for Fort Wingate, New Mexico.

The soldiers protested loudly against being moved farther away from the border, but elaborate preparations made in advance blocked any attempt to escape.

Weeping women burdened with pots and pans and with children clinging to their skirts trudged over the desert dust from Fort Bliss to the trains awaiting to carry them farther inland.

LONG AUTO TOUR STARTS.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., May 4.—A score of automobiles were entered in the 2,500 mile automobile tour through Colorado, Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Kansas which started today. The start was scheduled for day-break, the machines to start from the Garden of the Gods at the foot of the Pike's Peak. It is planned that the trip shall take three weeks.

The first week's run will be over the Panhandle division of the Colorado to the Gulf Highway to Fort Worth and Dallas the second taken up with the triangular run to Waco, Austin, San Antonio, Freeport, Galveston, Houston and return by the Gulf Division of the Colorado to the Gulf Highway and the final week of the trip through Oklahoma by way of Oklahoma City and Guthrie to Wichita, Kans., with return westward over the New Santa Fe Trail to Pueblo and Colorado Springs.

M. A. TRAYLOR'S ARKANSAS SPEECH

(Continued from first page)

on the subject of beef cattle production and feeding. It so pleased the audience that the association voted to have 25,000 copies of it printed in booklet form to be distributed by the various banks throughout the state. Mr. Traylor took the position that one of the chief reasons of the high prices of meat is that cattle raising is being neglected for farming. The great ranches of Texas and the west have gone under the plow and the cattle under the hammer, never to be replaced," he said. "The population of the United States has increased 25 per cent in a decade, in all meat producing countries, while live stock has increased only 10 per cent. Brazil and Argentina show a decrease in cattle, with an increase of population. Australia alone showed an increase of cattle over population, but Australia was not a factor in the situation.

"In the United States an increase of population of 20 per cent in a decade was accompanied by a decrease of 32 per cent in cattle. The killing in the United States has been reduced 1,500,000 head of cattle, in three years so that if we got Argentina's whole output it would only equal what we killed in the United States three years ago." Mr. Traylor spoke of the evil of slaughtering calves, a total of 6,700,000 under six months old being killed.

"He said Arkansas has 37,000,000 acres of land, 33,000,000 probably arable. 20,000,000 certainly arable of which 17,000,000 acres were under fence and less than 8,000,000 acres under cultivation. Arkansas, with its fertile soil, bought \$5,000,000 worth of feed each year, he said; according to the census 24 per cent of farms reported no beef cattle and 22 per cent not even a milch cow. In the past 13 years there had been a big increase of population in Arkansas and a decrease in cattle and hogs.

"Build a fence around Arkansas," he said, "and go on increasing in population and decreasing in cattle, and in five years you'll starve to death."

"He had statistics showing the average price of cattle being \$95 in Illinois; \$52 in Oklahoma and Texas, and \$35 in Arkansas, and urged the betterment in grade of herds and eradication of the tick as the remedy for this condition. The banks he said, held the future of Arkansas in their hands. They should advance money to the farmer, not on the basis of his raising so many bales of cotton, but on getting good stock, horses, cattle, and hogs on their farms, putting up silos and filling them with good ensilage, and drew a glowing picture of the future of the state when her farmers should raise their own cattle and corn, in stead of buying feed and decreasing the cattle production."
