WILSON-M'ADOO WEDDING AT 6 A. M.

(By United Press.)
WASHINGTON, May 7.—Despite the efforts to make the wedding of Miss Eleanor Randolph Wilson, youngest daughter of President Wilson, to William Gibbs McAdoo, secretary of the treasury, the very simplest, only the absence of the gold-laced diplomatic corps, the army and navy men and the use of the Blue Room instead of the famous Gilded East Room, will be lacking to make the event as elaborate as any of the previous thirteen which have been held in the White House. The ceremony will be held at six o'clock this evening.

It was announced today that the word "obey" would not be eliminated from the ceremony. There had been much discussion among society circles as to whether the word would be eliminated from the service.

What Secretary McAdoo gave the bride as a wedding present is a deep secret.

The wedding will be the fourteenth ever performed in the White House.

There will be none of the pomp and ceremony which attended the marriage last November of Miss Jessie Wilson to Francis Bowes Sayre. The fact that the groom was a widower influenced this decision.

The ceremony will be held in the Blue Room, where Miss Folsom was wedded to President Cleveland. The nuptials are almost identical with those of the Cleveland wedding. It too, is a private affair, with only a dozen or so invited guests.

President and Mrs. Wilson have always maintained that the affairs of the woman-folk of the White House were not public business and so up until today practically no information was given out as to the wedding.

Secretary McAdoo, the groom, is 51 years of age. He has six children living and one grandchild. Miss Wilson is 24 years old. She is the most vivacious of the President's three daughters. She first met Secretary McAdoo while he was acting chairman of the Democratic National Committee and came to the "summer White House" at Sea Girt to confer with the then Democratic presidential candidate.

Both Miss Wilson and McAdoo had much in common. Both were fond of tennis. They enjoyed dancing the new style dances, their acquaintanceship at Sea Girt ripened here in Washington when McAdoo became one of the President's advisers. The two were constantly together. Miss Noma McAdoo, one of the Secretary's daughters who is a year or so younger than Miss Wilson, was her constant companion. They took long automobile drives and walks together and McAdoo was Miss Wilson's favored dancing partner.

Three Jurors Chosen In Becker Trial

NEW YORK, May 7.—Only seven jurors have been elected to sit at the trial of Charles Becker former police lieutenant in this city, he is being tried for the second time for the murder of Henry Rosenthal. There is hope of filling the jury today. Two were selected before noon today, the remaining five having been chosen yesterday.

Talesman after talesman either was excused for bias opinions or challenged. With Becker still calm and apparently confident of an acquittal, and his wife sitting near, a new panel of one hundred men has been ordered.

Cockran was not present at the opening of the trial. He has stated that he is through with the case. He called it "assassination" but he is believed not to have quit the defenses.

REBELS PLAN BIG STROKE TODAY

EL PASO, May 7.—The master stroke of the Carranza revolution to capture the federal garrison, composed of eight or ten thousand men at Saltillo, is planned by General Villa today.

General Villa has his troops lined up as the attack begins.

A big military parade of five thousand United States troops at Fort Bliss was announced as one of the features of the maneuvers of the troops tomorrow.

BELIEVE HEURTA WILL STEP OUT

(By United Press.)
WASHINGTON, May 7.—Officials in Washington believe that the almost continuous rebel victories in northern Mexico is clearing the Mexican situation, probably more than any other one thing of the day. When the Carranzathists held the entire northern part of Mexico, including San Luis Potosi, Tampico, Mazalan, and Saltillo, officials here believe Dictator Huerta will either eliminate himself or be ousted by his own people.

With Huerta eliminated, it is pointed out, no one will doubt that a common ground can be found upon which all warring factions in Mexico can be brought together.

In the meanwhile, President Wilson is carefully considering the naming of the representatives of this country for the Niagara Falls, Canada, conference. It is very probable that if Secretary Lane can arrange business in his office next week, he will be chosen as one of the American representatives at the mediation meeting.

Business Men To Help Band Boys

At a meeting of a number of Ballinger business men at the city hall Thursday morning it was decided to employ a leader for the band again this summer, and those present voted unanimously to appropriate \$100 per month towards defraying the expenses of the band, and assisting the boys in their work.

A telegram from Tom Martin, who is attending school in California, stated that he would be out of school on the fifteenth of this month, and that he would return here and take charge of the band again, provided the business men wanted him. Mr. Martin handled the proposition so successfully last summer that every man present at the meeting Thursday morning was in favor of employing him again, and so they voted.

It will be remembered that the Ballinger band furnished music for the picnics that were held in this county last summer, and it is the purpose of the business men and the band boys to do this again this summer. The splendid music last summer was the cause of many complimentary remarks for the band boys, and wherever they played they were treated with every courtesy, and their services were highly appreciated by the committees in charge of the various picnics.

Mr. Martin will be here about the first of June to take charge of the band, and as they have been practicing for some time it will be easy for them to organize and be ready for engagements within a very short time.

Millions of Profits Out of Subsidiaries

WASHINGTON, May 7.—In a remarkable statement to the commerce commission, John L. Billard, formerly a director of the New Haven Railway system, admitted having made millions of dollars profit, dealing in stock roads subsidiaries. It was stated that President Mellen also borrowed money from Billard.
Billard stated that Mellen gave him the opportunity to make \$2,748,750 on one deal. Edward Robins financed the Metropolitan Steamship Co., which was the New Haven side issue, Billard stated before the commission.

BOMBS DROPPED FROM AEROPLANES

WASHINGTON, May 7.—An aeroplane belonging to the constitutionalists dropped two bombs upon Mazatlan today, killed three persons and wounded eight, according to dispatches received here by officials from Rear Admiral Howard, who with a German commander protested against hostile action, and at the same time requested a neutral zone for noncombatants.

HUERTA'S OFFICERS LAX IN DUTIES

VERA CRUZ, May 7.—Disintegration within the Huerta government within two weeks is prophesied by foreigners from Mexico City. The government officials there, say the refugees, are very lax in their methods of governing.

The police are showing signs of insubordination.

According to reports from Tampico, all oil wells have escaped damage so far but in constant danger from the fighting.

KNIGHTS OF THE GRIP MEET

The organized knights of the grip are 2900 strong in Texas. The Dallas Post, the largest in the state, has a membership of 704.

DEAD OF ILL-FATED SHIP BROUGHT IN

(By United Press.)
BOSTON, Mass., May 7.—The Cunard liner Franconia, bearing thirteen survivors and Chief Steward Mathewson's dead body of the ill-fated liner Columbian, which was burned off Cape Race, was docked at daybreak.

Most of those who were rescued were in a serious condition from burns and exposure. They told tales of how the fire burst out of the hold suddenly at midnight Monday.

Nothing has been heard from the third boat, containing the first and second officers and seventeen men. The search for the boat continues.

Stormy Meeting Is Expected

WASHINGTON, May 7.—Great interest is centered in the expected meeting of Nelson O'Shaughnessy with Secretary of State Bryan. It is believed by many that the session will be stormy. The administration is supposed not to like the methods employed by O'Shaughnessy in many of his dealings with Huerta.

Chief Justice White, Justices Hughes, Lamar, of the Supreme court, are being considered today by President Wilson along with Secretary Lane, for the mediation mission which will be held in Niagara Falls, Canada next week.

RUSSIA IS READY FOR MOBILIZATION

(United Press)
ST. PETERSBURG, May 7.—Diplomatic circles are considerably exercised over a new order just issued by the Council of Ministers, which authorizes the War Minister to lay an embargo on any vessel or vessels of the Russian mercantile marine needed for transportation of war stores and troops fourteen days before formal mobilization orders are issued.

The order provides that on the imposition of the embargo no member of the crew of the vessel affected may leave the ship, and the clerical staff in the shipowner's office must also remain at their posts, all being placed under military law. It is pointed out that under the new law Russia could secretly have everything in readiness for war a fortnight before a general mobilization order was issued.

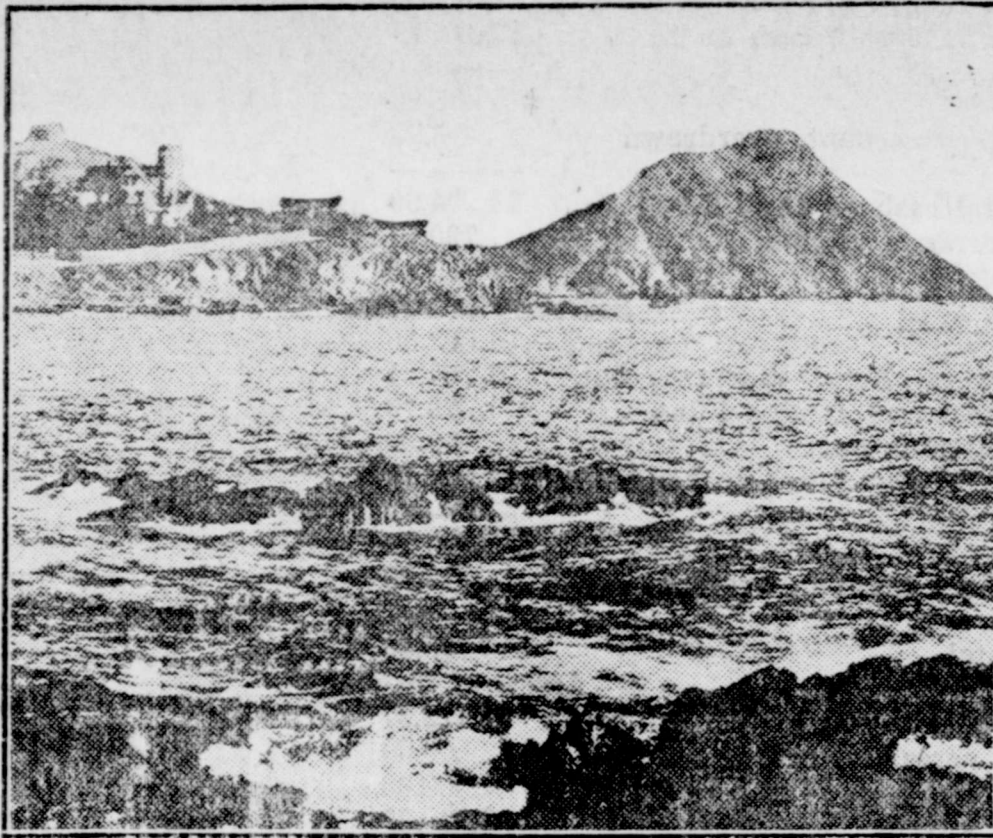

ED GLOBER WILL MOVE TO NEW MEX.

Ed Globber and family will leave Ballinger in a few days for Hagerman, New Mexico, where they will make their home. This announcement was made Thursday morning through C. A. Doose & Co., who have just closed a deal for Mr. Globber in which they sell his entire interest in Rannels and Conecho counties to G. C. Cauble, of Ozona, for a total consideration of \$61,500.

In the deal Mr. Cauble gets Mr. Globber's ranch in Conecho county, comprising 4700 acres, at a consideration of \$47,000. He also gets the land owned by Mr. Globber just east of Ballinger and sued for his feed pens, comprising 142 acres at a consideration of \$12,000, and the Globber market fixtures and business at a consideration of \$2500.

As part payment in exchange for the above property Mr. Globber gets a lease hold on a section of irrigated school land located one mile from Hagerman, New Mexico. This land is in the famous irrigated belt of New Mexico and is watered by a canal from the Pecos river and by an artesian well. It is well improved and in a high state of cultivation, about 320 acres being in alfalfa. There is a nice two story ten-room house on the property, and Mr. Globber will occupy this with his family as soon as he can wind up his business and move.

Mr. Cauble is a stockman of Crockett county, and will not move to Ballinger at present, and it is probable that he will dispose of the market here. He recently visited Ballinger and was so well pleased with our town that he expressed a desire to arrange to move here and educate his children, but at present his Crockett county interest will not permit of this.

LEAD PENCILS MAY COST MORE

(By United Press.)
BERLIN, May 7.—There is a threatening increase in the prices of lead pencils due to the effect of the new conservation laws in the United States. Germany supplies the world with lead pencils, but obtains its cedar from America.

The devastation of the American Cedar and Cypress forests together with areas now set aside to which ax and saw may not be laid, has created a great scarcity of this wood for pencils. German manufacturers are looking about for some substitute. The scarcity of hickory, also much imported into Germany from America and generally used for automobile wheels and handles for carpenter tools, likewise is causing manufacturers worry.
