MEDIATION WILL BE SUCCESS BEFORE HUERTA CAN USE MUNITIONS

WASHINGTON, May 28.—Mediation will have settled the Mexican problem before General Huerta will be in a position to use the arms and ammunition which were landed at Puerto, Mexico, is the position of the United States administration.

An agreement as to General Carranza's part in the mediation conferences will be reached within twenty-four hours, said Secretary of State Bryan.

A high state department official declared that a protocol will be signed within the next week. "The situation is very encouraging," said Secretary Tumulty. "We are hopeful of a definite action soon."

WASHINGTON, May 28.—Relief from the hot wave which is gripping the east, is promised by the weather bureau. Lower temperatures are promised by tomorrow.

Mrs. Diggs is friendly but firmly refused to withdraw the suit for divorce.

In an interview today, Diggs said that he regretted his wife's action but if she insisted, he would not resist the suit.

AUSTIN, May 28.—Next Monday, June 1, is the last day for party nominations for state offices at the coming primaries. Also candidates for district office where the district is composed of more than one county must file application for place on the ballot on or before June 1, with the district chairman or the respective county chairman in the district.

Modern commerce can be conducted most effectively by large concerns."

Foreign Manager Ouden of the General Electric Company said, "Much of the proposed anti-trust legislation threatens to harm the export trade."

EXTRAORDINARY SESSION PROBABLE

AUSTIN, May 28.—An extraordinary session of the Texas Legislature called by Governor Colquitt for August is declared today to be a strong probability although the rumor lacks official confirmation. The Governor is said to have several odds and ends relating to affairs of his administration that he wants to clean up before he retires from the office of Chief Executive. The new 1915 Legislature is of too uncertain quality to be correctly diagnosed at this stage of the changing political panorama for Colquitt turn over to it or leave undone certain governmental matters that have developed since the last Legislature closed its labors.

VERA CRUZ, May 28.—The United States was tricked by Dictator Huerta, who had the German vessels Ypiranga and Bavaria land munitions at Puerto, Mexico. The arms and ammunition were rushed from the coast to the interior to the small town of Cordova.

It was to stop the landing of the Ypiranga's cargo that Vera Cruz was selected as a base for the American army and navy in Mexico, and twenty American boys lost their lives in the capture of the city.

An appeal, it is stated, to the mediators and charge that Dictator Huerta violated the armistice will not avail.

The Bavaria is still being held at Vera Cruz by Brig. Gen. Funston, who is awaiting orders from Washington, as to what disposal must be made of the German vessel.

SOCIAL EVIL'S BIDS FOR GIRLS

By United Press. DALLAS, May 27.—Let us have an auction and sell a girl. Two bidders appear. One is the Good. It offers God, and happiness, and refinement, and usefulness; it offers a career as mother, or teacher, or artist. Shall I knock her off to the loving hands of God, and let its kingdom have its sway over her?

"But list! I hear another voice, cold, harsh, terrible, 'Who are you?' I cry. 'The Social Evil' is the answer. It offers gayety, godlessness, shame, and death without hope; it offers the slipperous path, conscience smittings, drink and drug to drown the memories, and finally the 'reservation' and the potters' field.

"The world protests against such barter. 'There's not a man or a woman of sanity anywhere who would not cover for the girl the kingdom of God.'

This, in the stirring words of J. Frank Smith, pastor of the Central Presbyterian Church, is the reason for the fight on the social evil by the Dallas Council of Churches. Listing other reasons, Rev. Smith gave these:

"1. The social evil and all its manifestations in segregated districts or reservations are immoral. A thing is immoral when it is contrary to the inner law of the conscience, the consensus of opinion formed by the best moral judgements of a community or an age, and the divinely sanctioned teachings of past and present. Among all the sins of society, none so undermine and pollute and destroy so successfully the very foundation of morals as the social evil.

"2. It brings a blight upon the weakest of our population, woman.

"3. The social evil exacts a terrible toll in disease and death.

"4. It encourages and fosters the most brutal business in the world—white slavery. It is time for the blue pencil to let up, and the muzzie to be taken off of the pulpit in the presence of facts unearthed by grand juries in the City of Dallas. For money, blood money, men built cribs and stalls no better than those at a horse fair, and rented them at rates that were robbery. They were willing to fatten off their sisters' shame.

"Look at your little innocent child; she knows not the ways of the world; she is uninformed, innocent as the honeysuckle that blooms by her window. She grows into girlhood and womanhood, and by the very guilelessness of her heart, or the hard conditions into which she is thrown, she is sent out into the world of the lost. Every time a woman goes down, just this is realized.

"The home that gives up a daughter to satisfy the demands of the lower, has in it a woman's heart-break; the miserable being who chooses, or is thrust into this torturous path, take up her life of shame from which she escapes only with the greatest effort; the ignorant and innocent who never had more than a faint knowledge of the existence of such an evil oft times are caused to bear the pain and death of it through the sinning of others.

"When it is remembered that a vast majority of the women of the underworld are those who never had a chance in life, and who are known from investigations that cannot be questioned to be mentally deficient, or if neither of these causes has led to their downfall, either poverty or love has, the tragedy of the whole thing stands in a blacker outline.

"He who stands for a wide-open town advertises to the world that he is perfectly willing for the weak, for some other mother's daughter who is abnormal in vision or intellect, who is unfortunate through the hard conditions of life, to be sacrificed to the beast in man."

ST. LOUISIANS OPEN GREAT PAGEANT TODAY

By United Press. ST. LOUIS, MAY 28.—Thousands of persons gathered today in the national amphitheatre in Forest Park and witnessed the portrayal of the picturesque history of the city of St. Louis by seven

thousand St. Louisians in what is said to be the largest pageant ever produced. The pageant and mask will be staged every day for the remainder of the month in order that all St. Louisians and the thousands of our-of-door visitors may see it. Its production next Sunday is for the benefit of those who cannot see it on work days.

Time and money was not spared in making it the most pretentious presentation of its kind ever attempted in this country. Percy MacKay and Thomas Stevens, pageant masters have devoted more than six months to the mammoth production. For the first time in years, the city became interested in its own history, and a movement was started to introduce a study of historic St. Louis in the schools.

The opening scene represents the site of St. Louis as seen from the Illinois shore with the water between the audience and the stage on which mound builders are constructing a mound. They are interrupted by the arrival of hunters who display buffalo skins and call the men to the hunting. Despite the plans of the priests the men left the mound unfinished and join the hunt, the women following. Next appear the Indians, who set up their own wigwams. Rumors of war stir the village and the corn dance changes to a war dance. The village is attacked and after being successfully defended the pipe of peace is smoked. In the distance appears cavalcade of De Soto and his gold seekers of Spain of the sixteenth century. They set up a cross on the mound and return from whence they came while the Indian life continues undisturbed. Then Joliot and Pore Marquette pass down the river in their canoes marking the coming of the French.

Laclede and his stepson August Chouteau at the beginning of the second movement of the pageant arrive. Laclede plans the town and Chouteau builds the first house with the aid of his men and Indian squaws. Then follows the coming of the settlers and the troops under St. Angelo and a town begins to grow. Governor Piernas comes with the Spanish troops and flag establishing the Spanish regime. An Indian and British attack is successfully resisted. Singing of French revolutionary songs in the streets by the "Sans Culottes" is the next episode reflecting the struggle in France. The second movement ends with the transfer of the Louisiana Purchase, the day of three flags. The Spanish governor proclaims the rule of Spain at an end. Major Stoddard takes over the post for France, and then proclaims the purchase, hoisting the American flag. Then, in the coming twilight is shown the arrival of the pioneers Lewis and Clark and Daniel Boone followed by the coming of the first steamboat, the General Pike. The dark years of the civil war are echoed, the pageant closing with the news of peace.

Red Hat Conferred Upon 14 Cardinals

ROME, May 28.—The red hat, symbolic of the highest office in the Catholic church, with the exception of that of pope, was this morning conferred on fourteen new cardinals. The ceremony took place at a public consistory of the Sacred College, held at the Vatican, and the new princes of the church consisted of the thirteen prelates who were created cardinals last Monday and Monsignor Hornig, archbishop of Veszprim, Hungary, who was elevated to the purple last December but who had not as yet received the hat.

The ceremony this morning was the most elaborate which has been held at the Vatican since the November consistory of 1911.

when amongst the 18 cardinals created at that time, there were three Americans. The presence of all three of the latter, namely Cardinals Farley, Falconio and O'Connell, as well as Cardinal Gibbons of Baltimore, contributed much toward making today's consistory notable, as the presence of centuries special tribunes were has at all times aroused an interest and enthusiasm which that of other cardinals fails to engender.

The attendance today was also most unusual, this being the season of the year, just following Easter, when Rome is filled with pilgrims and tourists from all parts of the world. The limited number of tickets allotted to the public was exhausted several weeks ago and thousands of requests had to be refused.

In pursuance with the customs of centuries special tribunes were set aside at the consistory for those who have a special right to attend. These included the diplomats accredited to the

CONSUL CANADA IS POLITICIAN

VERA CRUZ, May 8.—(By Mail to New York.)—W. W. Canada, the American consul at Vera Cruz, when Representative Mondell bitterly attacked in Congress on April 27th for sending alarming reports about the situation of Americans in Mexico, calculated to furnish reasons for intervention in Mexico, is an Indiana politician.

During his sixteen year stay in Vera Cruz he has absorbed something of the Mexican idea of officialdom and has for many years been something of a ruler in the American colony in the city. There was never any gentleness about his rule, either; whenever he had anything to say to Americans he sent the information out in the form of orders.

"All Americans must positively leave Vera Cruz at once—W. W. Canada," was a notice which he posted up about the streets of the city recently when he thought that the city might soon be crowded by refugees.

"Anybody who criticizes President Huerta in this office will be immediately removed," is another sign he once posted in the consulate.

When he was criticized for this on the grounds that it was a sign which might be seen in the office of any Mexican official, he changed the sign to include criticism of President Wilson.

"Mondell went after Bryan harder than he went after me," said Consul Canada, after he had read an American paper containing a report of Mondell's criticism. "You know somebody's always after me, all my life."

"I was elected a judge in my own town three days before I was 21 years old and I've held political jobs ever since. Somebody's always been trying to get me, but
