## M'GREGOR SPEAKS IN BEHALF OF JIM FERGUSON

Good Crowd Hears Austin Senator Expound the Platform of the Temple Candidate—Predictions that Ferguson Will Carry Runnels County.

While Jim Ferguson, himself, is touring the Panhandle, Senator T. H. McGregor, of Austin is sweeping Central West Texas advocating the candidacy of "Farmer Jim" of Temple.

To a crowd that was interested in what Mr. McGregor had to say, the Austin Senator carried the audience with him last night. The attendance was not too large; however, it was larger than was originally expected by the Ferguson men who arranged for Mr. McGregor's coming to Ballinger. Several farmers were noticed in the audience, although a majority of the crowd was composed of city people who were interested in the

Temple man's candidacy. Many farmers, however, are busy in the fields and were unable to attend. The speaking was held at the Runnels county court house.

Senator McGregor was introduced by Judge T. T. Crosson of this city, who paid a high tribute to the Austin man, classing him "a gentleman whom I have known for some time, a citizen whose labors it has been my pleasure to notice, a patriot whose purpose has been always to serve his country in his own way and the best he knows."

## DEMO. COMMITTEE MEETS MONDAY

The County Democratic Executive Committee will meet in Ballinger next Monday, June 15, to attend to matters required by law governing the holding of primary election. The secretary C. R.  CHICAGO, June 10.—For the fourth consecutive day, the middle western states saw no immediate relief from the unprecedented June heat wave that has caused more than a score of deaths and dozens of prostrations.

The temperature at Springfield, Illinois, is 100 degrees.

Eleven deaths have resulted from intense June heat in Chicago alone, eight in Pittsburg and four in Detroit.

## Three Million Roses Used In Floral Parade Today

 PORTLAND, Ore., June 10.—It was estimated that more than 3,000,000 cut roses were used in the decorations of the floral parade held here this afternoon in connection with the annual Rose Festival.

The parade consisted of hundreds of the smartest pure bred horses, owned by members of Northwestern City hunt clubs, supplemented by nearly 1,000 handsomely bedecked motor vehicles

both pleasure and commercial.

Tonight's fire drill and life saving exhibition is to be one of the features of the week. An eight story factory building, saturated with chemicals will be theoretically destroyed and the entire city fire department will be called out to rescue three hundred persons who have volunteered to fill the various floors of the structure to demonstrate the different types of modern fighting machinery and life saving apparatus.

## Wants Perkins to Get Out For Good of the Party

 NEW YORK, June 10.—Demanding that George B. Perkins withdraw immediately from the direction of the Progressive party affairs, Amos Pinchot made public a letter today insisting that Perkins retire for the good of the party.

The letter was sent to Senator Dixon and members of the national progressive committee and to Roosevelt and Perkins, May 23rd.

Perkins has not as yet replied. The letter accuses Perkins of antagonism to labor unions, believing trusts are sacred institutions and of circulating his ideas as progressive party literature.

"On both these subjects, the progressive party has placed itself positively and emphatically on record in the opposition to Mr. Perkins," said the Pinchot letters.

## MEN LIKE CARRANZA WANTED

 NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., June 10.—The United States is understood to demand men such as those surrounding General Carranza at the present time, to head the provisional government of Mexico.

The suggestion that such a type of men be chosen met with strenuous objection from General Huerta's envoys who believe men free from alliances with any faction should be chosen.

## TIME IS ALL THAT'S NEEDED BY OFFICIALS

 WASHINGTON, June 10.—Hopeful waiting has replaced watchful waiting in Washington. The administration is confident that only time is needed to completely solve the Mexican problem.

General Carranza's reply to the invitation to join in the mediation conference has not as yet reached Niagara Falls. However, it is expected to reach the mediators today.

Whether or not it will be satisfactory to the mediators does not matter much because the United States believes that it can get General Carranza's approval on its peace plan.

Admiral Badger has been instructed to report the Antilla's arrival off Tampico. When he does, Secretary of State Bryan will then decide whether or not the cargo of ammunition for the rebels will be landed. Army and navy officials stand united in suggesting that the cargo not be permitted to land.

 PITTSBURG, Pa., June 10.—Violence in the Westinghouse plants are feared this afternoon despite the fact that the unions have waived the demand of recognition by the company. Two hundred private armed guards are at work. There is a probability of mediation.

## 200,000 POUNDS WOOL TO SELL

The Ballinger Wool Growers Association have selected Wednesday, June 17 as the day for receiving bids on about 200,000 lbs. of wool that will be concentrated here. At present there is 125,000 pounds of wool stored here, and other growers will bring their wool here for the sale. The sale of between 50,000 and 75,000 pounds of wool which was scheduled to take place at Talpa Wednesday of this week, was called off, and it is reported that the Talpa wool will be shipped here and will be sold at the sale next week. The sale at Talpa did not take place because some of the buyers failed to arrive, and those there were not willing to wait for the other buyers to come.

R. G. Erwin is looking after the plans for entertaining the wool growers and the buyers who come next week, and the usual good time is being arranged for.

Considerable wool was sold while en route to Ballinger, the W. O. Schultz clip, amounting to about 100,000 pounds having been sold. Other clips from Concho county that are usually brought here were sold at the pens.

**LITTLE STORIES OF THE LONE STAR STATE**

A little four-pounder cannon, a mere toy in these days of powerful dreadnaughts, started the fuse which ended in Texas declaring its independence from Mexico.

Historians imagine that the good people of Gonzales, Texas, back in 1831, were slightly proud of this little cannon intended for defense against the Indians. It was highly prized, Santa Anna made the mistake of starting at Gonzales to disarm the people of Texas in accordance with the General's self-made changes in the Mexican constitution. Perhaps the only thing the people of Gonzales prized more highly than the cannon was their liberties under the old constitution. They decided to keep both liberties and cannon.

The news that Gonzales would dispute the demands of Santa Anna's dragoons spread like wildfire through Texas. While the Gonzales volunteers parleyed for delay, reinforcements arrived. When, quietly under cover of a heavy fog, Col. John H. Moore led his volunteer forces across the river and on the morning of the second attacked the Mexican camp. The Mexicans retreated leaving their dead on the field of battle. The Texans met with no casualty.

Thus the cause of the independence of Texas was inaugurated. And the engagement was opened by a shot from the little four-pounder.

The bids offered have not been made public, but it seems that the prevailing price for wool this season will be between 18 and 20 cents.

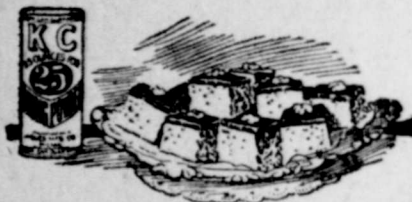


## Nut Cake

Simply Delicious

By Mrs. Janet McKenzie Hill, Editor of the Boston Cooking School Magazine

In giving this recipe, Mrs. Hill believes it to be one of the best all-around cake recipes it has been her good fortune to make. The simplicity and uniformly good results will appeal to every housewife



K C Nut Cake

One-half cup butter; 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar; 3/4 cup milk; 2 cups flour; 2 level teaspoons K C Baking Powder; 1 cup of nut meats chopped fine; whites of 4 eggs, beaten dry.

Sift flour and baking powder together, three times. Cream the butter, add the sugar; then alternately, the milk and the flour mixture; lastly the whites of eggs and the nut meats. Bake in a sheet in a shallow pan thirty or forty minutes. When cold cover with the icing and decorate with whole nut meats. This is also an excellent white cake recipe when nuts are omitted.

### Chocolate Icing

One cup granulated sugar; 1/2 ounce chocolate; white of 1 egg, beaten dry; 1/4 teaspoonful vanilla extract; 1/4 cup water.

Stir the sugar, chocolate and water until the mixture boils; cover and let boil three minutes. Uncover and let boil till when tested in cold water a soft ball may be formed; beat into the white of egg, then beat until cold, add vanilla.

## HUERTA'S BROTHER LIVES IN AUSTIN

Austin Tribune:

Blind, helpless, poor, Severin Huerta, half brother of Victoriano Huerta, dictator of Mexico, is living in seclusion at 906 San Antonio street, Austin.

Struggling for the bare necessities of life, in Mexico a large fortune might be his did he dare to claim it.

Time and again President Huerta has sent emissaries here to induce his brother to come to Mexico and claim his property, but he fears his brother and distrusts him, and so will not go.

Two beautiful daughters, with more of the characteristics of the Japanese than the Aztec, are nurse maids in prominent homes in Austin to help eke out a subsistence for the family.

### Denies His Brother.

Severin Huerta is a typical Aztec, and while not possessing the pronounced features of his brother, is much like him.

Senor Huerta is a motherly, kind-appearing woman, her face expressing affection and cheerfulness.

A Tribune reporter met Senora Huerta at the door of the humble residence next to the splendid home of Lynn Hunter and found that she could talk a little American. "Yes, her husband's name is Huerta. He has been long blind. He came to have Dr. Hilgartner to treat his eyes. They were injured in an explosion."

Senor Huerta came to the door. His face was not unkindly, though it resembled his brother. He, too, could talk broken American.

"Yes, my name is Huerta. No, I am no relation of el presidente Huerta," and his face clouded. "No he has not asked me to come back to Mexico. I shall not go."

### Many Emissaries Here.

This was at 1 o'clock, and there was little time to ask questions, and Senor Huerta evidently did not wish to talk.

It is said the emissaries of Huerta have been here almost constantly trying to induce his brother to come back. These emissaries have been liberally supplied with funds for themselves, but none for Huerta unless he will go back to Mexico. American friends have advised him not to go, but to request remittances to come to a bank here, but none has ever been sent.

The daughters say they would of course like to have money and the things they had in Mexico, but they do not want their father to leave them. Senor Huerta is older than the Mexican president. His daughters give evidence of culture far beyond the usual Mexican girl, and there is something touchingly gentle about the mother.

## McGregor Speaks In Behalf of Jim Ferguson

(Continued from First Page.)

ing public institution and handling the repairs of the same for quite a length of time. It was he who was instrumental in the erection of the Carlsbad Sanatorium. On a number of occasions he has visited this part of the state. He is well known over Western Texas.

During the day Tuesday, Mr. McGregor greeted old friends and made new ones. He left Wednesday morning for Coleman where he will speak tonight, in behalf of the Temple man's candidacy.

"It is immaterial to me," said the Senator at the outset of his speech, "whether Jim Ferguson or Tom Ball is elected to the office of governor of Texas. And it should be immaterial to you of the audience. But I am here to tell you, that it is material to me whether the advocacies of Jim Ferguson are enacted into the laws of the State of Texas, and it is material that the fallacies of Tom Ball be not enacted into laws."

Mr. McGregor stated that he was not going to judge the two men who are running for governor, that the qualifications as a man of each were sufficient to tide him through the office. He stated that what he had to say in his speech would concern the speech of Jim Ferguson when he opened his campaign for governor at Blum, Texas, and the speech of Tom Ball when he set forth his platform at Greenville and at Ft. Worth.

For a considerable length of time, Mr. McGregor reviewed the plank of the two platforms, concerning the land question. He upheld in vigorous terms the tenant proposition of Jim Ferguson and stated that Jim Ferguson is the first man in the history of the state of Texas who has ever raised the land question. The Senator said that Mr. Ferguson's proposition not only concerned the tenant and the landlord but that it concerned every farmer in the great state of Texas and that it was for the benefit of each of the two that Ferguson studied out the proposition which has been submitted to them through his platform for governor. Mr. McGregor said that Tom Ball followed Mr. Ferguson and came out with another proposition on the rentals of land, and called it his "land plank." It was showed how it was necessary that something be done immediately looking towards the welfare of the farmer, especially the tenant who is renting at any price and often times at a sum that enables him to fall in debt heavily.

The tenant would be relieved from the extortion of the landlord by Mr. Ferguson's land proposition, the speaker declared that the landlord who owned land and rented it right would have nothing to fear from Mr. Ferguson if elected governor of Texas.

Mr. McGregor said that it was time that all liquor legislation, whether pro or anti, should be stopped before it reaches the statute books of the state. He said that there was enough prohibition and enough anti-prohibition laws in Texas now and that more would be too many. Mr. Ferguson will veto all legislation that bears any semblance to liquor rulings, the speaker said.

When the name of Jim Ferguson was first mentioned by Mr. McGregor, a storm of applause broke out through the building, and for a minute or more the speaker's voice could not be heard above the voices. The Senator, finding his cue, knowing that it was clearly a Ferguson audience, started his address with renewed vigor in behalf of the Temple man.

Taking plank for plank, Mr. McGregor expounded the candidacy of Mr. Ferguson and told of the "fallacy" of the propositions offered by Mr. Ball. He discussed the penitentiary system, and advocated Mr. Ferguson's policy of placing convicts with business farmers.

Mr. McGregor also discussed the railroad question, stating that the railroads are a public necessity and must be maintained for the public good. He stated that the public would do the right thing by the railroads, if the roads would do the right thing by the people in little matters.

The need of a public warehouse is another plank in Ferguson's platform. The Temple candidate thinks that a special department in the office of the commissioner of agriculture should be established to give out information on the cotton consumption that would be helping to the producer.

After the speaking had been brought to a close a number of friends of Mr. McGregor greeted him and thanked him for his speech in behalf of Mr. Ferguson. It was predicted by some after the address that Ferguson would carry Runnels county by a heavy majority and the state of Texas by at least 50,000 majority.
