It is reported here that Gen. Villa is trying to make Gen. Felipe Angeles, minister of war under Gen. Carranza, first chief of the constitutionalists to replace Gen. Carranza himself.

The move, if there is any truth to the report, would be satisfactory to the United States because Gen. Angeles is a great soldier and scholar and is very friendly to the United States.

Ballinger was "buggy" last night. Thousands of bugs of every variety imaginable, flocked into the city for their annual convention, seemingly, under the several arc lights on the streets. This morning the several conventions about town broke up with a riot at the break of day. Leaders of the association, who could be seen today, stated that another session would be held this evening, promptly after the street lights are turned on over town.

As the first flicker of light came on last night on the streets of Ballinger, the bugs began gathering for the convention. There were only a few present as the roll was called when the lights flashed on, but as increased darkness

in the middle of the blocks came on, the delegates, supposedly from San Angelo, began flocking by the thousands to the nearest convention "hall."

By ten o'clock a full attendance was present around each of the several arc lights of the city. They were as thick about the brilliant as the editors are on the corners today in Wichita Falls.

Today many insects were found dead under the arc lights about the city, having died after a too strenuous night.

The presence of the thousands of bugs cannot be accounted for unless the heavy rains followed by exceedingly sultry weather, brought them into the city to spend the evening.

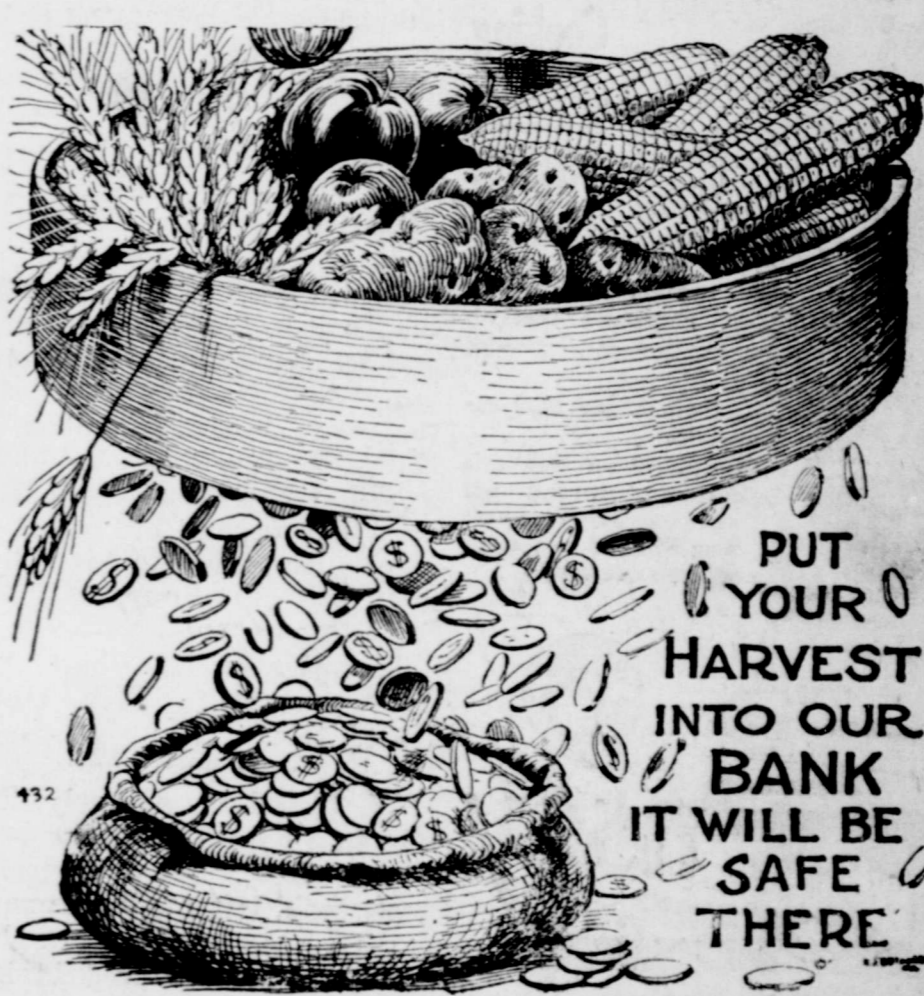

LITTLE STORIES OF THE LONE STAR STATE

Those who find it an effort to go to church once a week should peruse the following historical account of the religious duties forced on many Indians by the Franciscan missions in the early days of Spanish colonization of Texas, about 1715.

Early in the morning, according to a Franciscan priest who has left an account of the day's duties, the "converted" Indians assembled in church, had prayers, received instruction and chanted some canticles. Each then goes to his labor. In the afternoon the catechizing was held at which time the whites were present, men, women and children, young and old, and where each without distinction of rank or age, answered the questions put by the missionary.

"As these Indians are indolent," said the Franciscan, "and have no books, they would shortly forget the principles of religion if the remembrance of them was not recalled by those almost continual instructions."

In the evening all assemble again at the church, to listen to instructions, have prayers and sing hymns. On Sundays and festivals instructions were also added after the vespers and the day ended by private meetings in their own residences, the men separately from the women, "reciting clichelets with alternate choirs, chanting hymns until the night is far advanced."

If to these duties we add the surprise is caused that the neophytes sometimes fled from the missions and resumed the war-whoop and the chase. At the Spanish missions, troops pursued these apostates, compelled them to return and in addition to whippings, they were obliged to do penance.

No more romantic story can be found in the early history of Texas than that of M. de Belisle, a Frenchman of distinction and leading member of a party of one thousand Europeans sent out in 1719 by the French to the colony of Louisiana. Winds and current carried the vessel on which Belisle had embarked into the Bay of Matagorda, Texas.

Being lost in an unknown country, the five men coasted in their little boat along westward for several days, living upon herbs and insects. Belisle had brought a young dog from the vessel. He gave up the dog to his companions to kill for food but they were so weak that the dog escaped and disappeared.

Belisle lived for several days on worms and insects when at last his dog reappeared with an opossum which he had killed. Shortly afterward the dog was wounded by a wild beast and to be killed.

Belisle went into the interior in hopes of finding men. He met Indians who stripped him, divid-

ed his clothes among them, took him to their village and gave him to an old widow. She treated him kindly, however, and he recovered his health, learned their language and became their leading warrior.

Eventually Belisle made his way back to white people, the French, and afterward became major of New Orleans and major-general of the Louisiana marines.

Duke Pays His Rent to King With Little Flag

LONDON, June 18.—Today being the anniversary of the battle of Waterloo it was rent day for the Duke of Wellington, but his grace did not have to dive into his pockets very deeply, and it was with an air of unconcern that he drove over to Windsor Castle to present King George with the little silken flag on a silver staff which covers the rent of his big Strathfield Saye estate for the ensuing year. The estate was presented by the nation to the victor

of Waterloo and cost originally \$1,315,000, and under the act of parliament every duke of Wellington is required to present a replica of one of the French standards captured by his famous ancestor on the anniversary of the battle. Failing the payment of this "possession rent" the estate reverts to the crown, but as the flag costs only about twenty dollars there is no record of any holder of the title losing sleep over his liability or being late in payment.

JOHN S JN TALKS ON ENSILAGE

Listen to what Mr. H. B. Johnson of Chickasha, Oklahoma, has to say to the farmers of Texas. Mr. Johnson is high authority as he is one of the most successful feeders in the Southwest, and his cattle have won Sweepstake and Grand Champion prizes for the past six years. He holds the record for top prices at four markets, viz: Kansas City, St. Louis, St. Joseph, and Fort Worth.

"If every farmer in Texas will erect a silo for every 160 acres of land he has in cultivation, and will feed from one to four ears of cattle, and he can also fatten 25 to 50 head of hogs on the same feed he has fed the cattle, he will also have a large supply of the best dairy feed on earth for his milk cows and will be making from 25 to 50 tons of the best fertilizer to go back on his land.

"Fifteen to twenty acres of kafir corn, sorghum or milo maize, if planted in drills, not broadcast, will make from 200 to 225 tons of ensilage. I much prefer kafir corn and sorghum mixed half and half. Kafir corn gives you the grain and sorghum has the sugar, and the stock like the flavor of the sorghum. To this ration must be added from three to 6 pounds of cotton seed meal per head per day, this to be determined by the age and the weight of the cattle, and you have a balanced ration, and one that will fatten and make that will command top prices on any market.

"The farmers of this country are more fortunate than any of their Northern neighbors. They have, right at their doors, herds of the very best cattle to feed in the State of Texas, and by planting some feed crops and putting in silos and feeding it to cattle and hogs, they get a larger return per acre on their land than if planted all to cotton. For example, a farmer buys 25 head of coming two-year-old steers. They cost him, say, \$40.00 per head, and he feeds them three tons of ensilage which cost him to raise and put in silos \$3.00 per ton and he feeds 500 pounds of cotton seed meal which costs \$7.00. The steers, say, will weigh 800 pounds when he gets them, and he puts on pounds per day for 120 days, which would bring them up to 1100 pounds, and they sell for \$7.50, and might bring \$8.00. This would be \$82.50 per head, deducting the cost, including feed, \$56.00, would leave a balance of \$26.50; take off \$3.50 for shipping, which would still leave him \$23.00 per head. It is true we have not counted anything for hog feed or for interest, but say one will offset the other; this would leave him a nice profit of \$500.00 on each carload of cattle fed, and he would have 20 to 25 tons of fertilizer to put back on his land.

"The small farmer can beat the large speculator feeder, feeding cattle. The farmer will do most of the work himself and be on the job all of the time, while the large feeder has to depend on some one else to do the work, and he buys all of his feed and oftentimes the expense eats up the profit. It is true the majority of the speculator feeders feed cattle at oil mills and have no land on interests whereby they could utilize any of the fertilizer derived from feeding.

"If the bankers will encourage and help the small feeder to get started to erecting silos and feeding from one to four ears of cattle, South Texas will soon be producing more pounds of good choice beef than any other section of the country? You have the climate, you don't have to waste any feed during the cold weather, keeping up animal heat like the Northern feeder in the same business. You have no blizzards

and no muddy feed lots, and you have right at your door as well bred cattle as you will find anywhere.

"What has made Iowa, Illinois, and Kansas, where all of the farmers are practically independent and have lifted all of the mortgagages off of their farms? It was raising the feed, feeding it to hogs and cattle, and doing most of the work themselves. The farmers in South Texas can all do likewise. They can do more—they can raise the cattle and then raise the feed to fatten them. You have more varieties of feed and have a great deal of advantage in climate.

"I think the bankers will generally admit that the small cotton farmer has never been known to build up much of a bank account, especially if he continues to raise all cotton. He is a continual borrower; but with the farmer who raises diversified crops and feeds part of it to his cattle, he can have more chance for making good than the one-crop farmer, and besides, he does not have to work half as hard as the farmer and all of his family has to work eleven months in the year to raise a cotton crop."

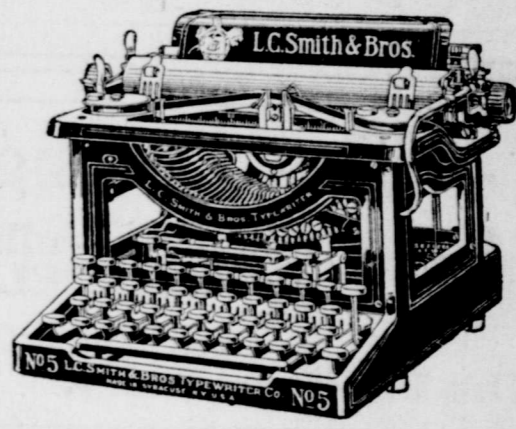
FROM WACO MORNING NEWS
