WASHINGTON, June 30.—The order, "pay up by midnight or be fined," issued by Secretary McAdoo caused a rush today to pay the income taxes in large cities. The House appropriation of \$500,000 for dodgers of the five per cent fine for delinquency is effective tomorrow.

Pressure On Rebels

WASHINGTON, June 30.—Spurred on by the administrative pressure of the strongest being brought on Gen. Carranza to prevent an imminent open break with Gen. Villa. Despite the pressure which Washington officials are bringing to bear on the matter, it is believed that the probability is increasing for a revolution within a month. It is almost certain that it cannot be avoided. This was forecasted in the British Minister's advice to the British subjects of England to leave immediately.

MILITANT TRYS TO CHAIN HERSELF TO A DOOR

LONDON, June 30.—Two suffragettes achieved a long desired ambition among the militant of this country when they fooled the servants at the home of Premier Asquith and were unwillingly admitted into the home. One had a chain lock and was locking herself to one of the premier's doors when the police arrived. She was taken to the police station and fined \$10.

200 PERSONS KILLED IN STREET FIGHT

BUDAPEST, Hungary, June 30.—More than 200 persons were killed and wounded here in street fights. Most of the number were Herzegovinians.

Desperate street fighting has been going on here between Christian Servians who detest Hungarian rule and the Mohammedans who favor Hungarian domination of the two Turkish provinces, Bosnia, and Herzegovina.

Messages dispatched from dozens of other towns and villages tell of similar outbreaks.

It is believed here that hundreds will have perished before the conflict is over.

TORREON, Mex., June 30.—The future of the Mexican revolution hinges on the conferences to be held Friday and Saturday between the delegates appointed by Gen. Villa and Gen. Carranza to straighten out the differences between the two rebel leaders.

Gen. Villa has wired Gen. Carranza saying he is tired of the treatment received from Carranza and unless the differences are satisfactorily arranged, he declared he would take the field and his army would rest on its arms.

Should the conferences end unsatisfactorily, Gen. Villa may establish his own capital in Chihuahua with Gen. Angeles as provisional president.

Many federal soldiers are reported mutineering to the rebel forces in various localities over Mexico.

LITTLE STORIES OF THE LONE STAR STATE

In the history of the early wars with Indians in Texas no act is more regretted than the necessary massacre of Comanche chiefs in San Antonio, 1840. The Comanches had made frequent forays into the settlements, and, among other outrages, had carried off several captives. Desiring to make a treaty, the Indians were told to bring in thirteen white captives they had and peace would be granted. They promised that at the next full moon they would do so.

On the 19th of March, a little after the appointed time, sixty five Indians, including men, women and children, came in to San Antonio, bringing only one captive, however. In the council-room the chiefs were told they were prisoners until they sent the

rest of their company for the captives and brought them in.

As the white peace commissioners were retiring from the room one of the chiefs sprang to the door. The sentinel there, in attempting to prevent his escape, was stabbed by him with a knife. The remaining chiefs now rose, drew their knives, prepared their bows and arrows and the fight became general.

The soldiers killed the whole of the chiefs engaged in the council. The warriors, not of the council, fought desperately in the yard but the company of Texans on guard forced them to take shelter in a stone house where they were cut down. A party of the savages at last made their way to the opposite side of the river but were pursued and all killed. Twenty seven women and children were made prisoners.

One of the squaws was dispatched to inform the Comanches that they were willing to exchange prisoners. Two white prisoners were given their freedom. But the Comanches brooding over the massacre of their chiefs at last retired to their homes on the upper branches of the Texan rivers and prepared for war.

There followed in that year a terrible series of massacres in settlements perpetrated by the Indians. Companies of Texas Rangers recruited deliberately to take revenge for these massacres, pursued the Indians for several months and inflicted defeat after defeat upon them, killing hundreds and showing no mercy. The final scene in this bloody drama was enacted in the farthestmost villages of the Comanches, at least three hundred miles north of Austin, where forty-eight of the Indians were killed in the village, eighty more shot down or drowned in a river and thirty-four captives taken. The village was then utterly destroyed by fire.

SILO BUILDING ATTRACTS ATTENTION

The writer had the pleasure of an auto drive Tuesday morning in company with H. Giesecke down to Mr. Giesecke's farm on the Colorado river five miles below Ballinger, where we went to see the big silos that under construction on this farm.

Mr. Giesecke recently let the contract to Chas. Eisenhuth for the construction of three 380 ton concrete silos. One of the big stock food preserving cans is ready for filling, and the second one will be completed by Saturday night. There are located within twenty feet of each other on the Giesecke farm down the river. The third silo will be built as soon as the one now under construction is completed and the third one will be located on the Joe Routh farm just across the river.

The silos are made of reinforced concrete and Mr. Giesecke thinks these are the best silos for this country, notwithstanding that the first cost is greater than the other makes of silos. The three silos are all of the same size, 20 feet in diameter and 45 feet high and are made to hold 280 tons of ensilage, of a total capacity of about one thousand tons.

The first two silos stand right near a field of 165 acres of feed which is rapidly ripening and will be ready for converting into ensilage by the time the silos are ready to be filled. Mr. Giesecke expects to build a feed pen on a site near the silos, which is right on the river and is an ideal location for cattle feeding. He will either feed the ensilage himself and convert it into beef or will sell it to some one else for that purpose. Ensilage has a market value of from \$6 to \$8 per ton, and it is easy to figure that Mr. Giesecke will have between six and eight thousand dollars worth of feed when he gets his silos filled.

Chas. Eisenhuth, who has the contract, has recently installed new equipment for this kind of work. He has discarded his old frames, and is operating a new frame that does perfect work, and is easy to operate, and a silo can be built much quicker and in perfect form.

Silo building seems to be in its infancy in this country, but the success of those who have made the experience will no doubt cause many more to go up over the county. In fact more silos have already been built this year than there was in the county the first of the present year, and the number will be double many times within the next few months. It is the successful way to preserve feed so as to get the full value of its producing quality, and save what under the old way of feeding goes to waste.

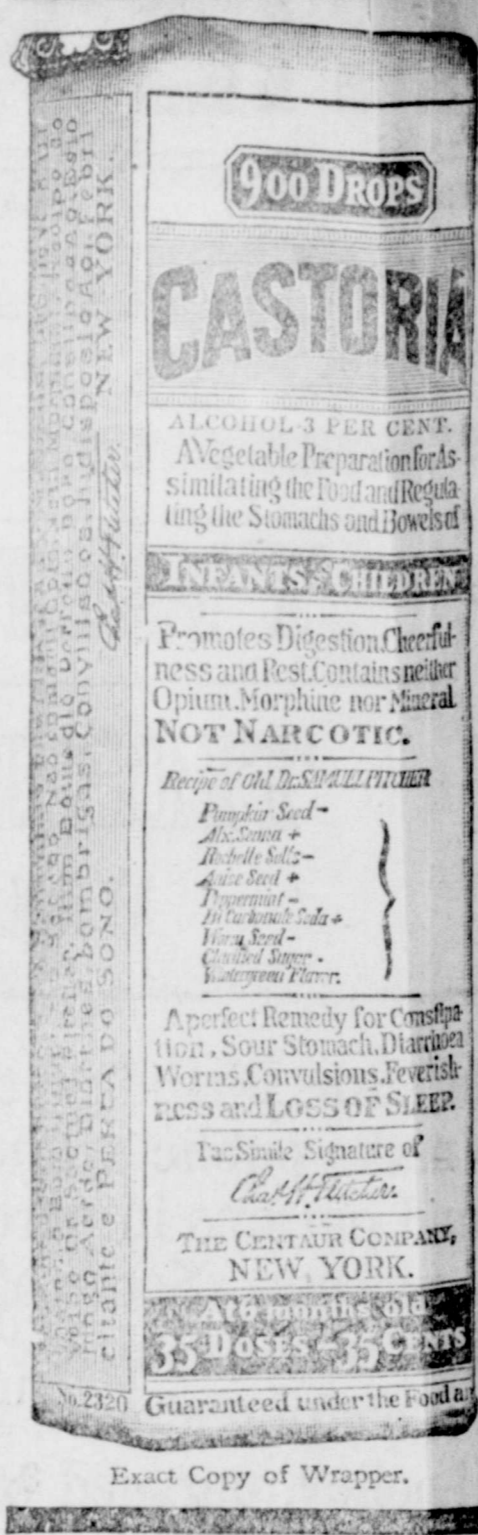

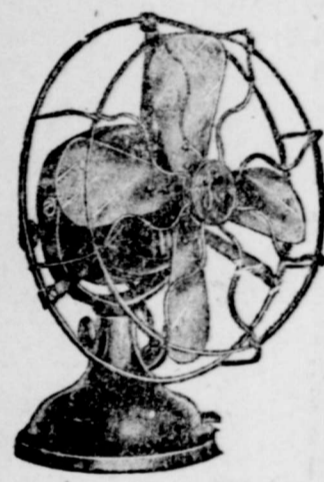

C. A. Doose Rescues Men from Automobile Wreck

While returning from San Angelo Monday afternoon C. A. Doose was the unsung hero of a thrilling rescue. Mr. Doose was in his automobile, accompanied by his son and nephew and two friends. When about three and a half miles out from San Angelo the party saw a Ford car turn completely turtle on the right side of the road. Drawing nearer a pair of feet covered with tan shoes were seen kicking through the port side of the runabout and the Doose party lost no time in getting busy.

Under the car were Jim Howard, who represents the Fairbanks-Morse company and a Mr. Sullivan who is with the same firm. Howard had his neck pinned by the back of the seat and Sullivan was held fast by the steering wheel. Sullivan was the first man dragged from beneath the car. He was quite limp and was voicing grave fears. He was also spitting considerable blood. Howard was next gotten clear of the car and was able to rise at once. The effects of the accident on

Howard while distressing were not serious.

Doose drove his car back to the first telephone and Clarence Webb brought out a service car to convey the injured men back to that place.

The men had not been pinned beneath the car very long when Doose reached them as the radiator was still too hot to permit one to bear his hand on it. Howard however, states that he had about given up and that every second seemed an hour long.

Sullivan was being taught to drive the car, which belonged to Howard. The rear right wheel got in a drain on the side of the road, which is being fixed up at the place the accident occurred, causing the car to skid. In an attempt to force the wheel to the road level the effect was the wheel forced the car to turn turtle.

Both men were well bunged up, while apparently the only damage sustained by the car was a smashed top and a bent steering gear. Fishing tackle and the like were scattered for about twenty yards from the car.

Jim Ferguson Will Arrive in Ballinger Tonight

Tomorrow will be Ferguson day in Ballinger. The candidate for governor will arrive on the midnight train tonight. He will be met by friends early in the morning and accompanied to Winters where he is billed to speak at nine-thirty. After the Winters speaking Judge Ferguson and the friends who accompany him from Ballinger, will return here, and at two-thirty he will speak at the court house, leaving Ballinger at four-thirty, the candidate will go to Mineral Wells where he is billed to speak Thursday afternoon.

The local supporters of Mr. Ferguson have been busy since the announcement reached here that he was coming to Ballinger. Circulars have been printed and scattered over the county, and it is expected that a large crowd will be here tomorrow to hear this paramount in the present gubernatorial campaign. The band will furnish music for the occasion, playing a number of pieces on the streets at two o'clock and at the court house before the speaking.

\$100,000,000 LOSS IN EGGS PER YEAR

It is estimated by the Department of Agriculture that the loss in the United States by improper care of eggs amounts to \$100,000,000 per year.

A large percentage of the loss can be saved to the producer by observing the following suggestions:

1st. Provide suitable buildings for your poultry and laying stock. It is equally as necessary as proper buildings for your other live stock.

2nd. Provide roomy nest and plenty of clean nesting material.

3rd. Collect the eggs regularly, at least once and better twice daily.

4th. Keep your eggs in a clean, dry, cool, well aired place, free from strong odors. Cover with clean cloth to prevent dust from settling upon them.

5th. Pack carefully when taking to market, either in a regular egg case of 15 to 20 dozen capacity or in suitable box with grain.

6th. Market frequently.

7th. Do not wash eggs.

8th. Do not market cracked, cracked or dirty eggs.

It will pay you to confine the male birds by themselves as soon as the breeding season is over.

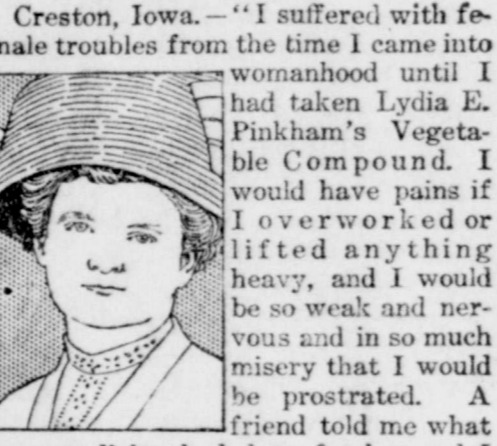
