He said that it was necessary to hold only one share of stock to qualify as a director to represent small minority. Interest in the opposition to both men is waning.

WOMAN SECURES EXECUTION STAY

NEW YORK, July 6.—A stay of execution was granted Mrs. Madeline Ferola, 45, who was sentenced to die in the electric chair for murdering Carmello Canestrano, 23 years old, last December.

When a verdict of guilty was found against Mrs. Ferola, it was the first time in more than fifteen years that a woman had been found guilty of murder in Greater New York. The last woman against whom a similar verdict was returned, was Mrs. Martha Place, of Brooklyn. The Ferola jury deliberated less than three hours. She is the first woman to be convicted of first degree murder in Brox county. There is no death cell for women at Sing Sing and a special structure had to be used for her cell. She twice confessed to stabbing young canestrano to death, and afterwards repudiated the confessions. She has amazed court and prison officials by her absolute composure at all times.

Mexico City, July 6.—Elections for president, vice president, deputies and senators were held yesterday in parts of the republic controlled by Huerta. In Mexico City there was almost no voting and indifference was manifested everywhere.

General Huerta appeared favored for the presidency; and General Blanket, the war minister for the vice presidency.

President Huerta, it is reported, received a virtually unanimous vote of confidence. Returns indicate re-election of present members of the chambers of deputies and senate. The highest vote in many years was cast both in the capitol and in nearby towns.

CHRISTIAN REVIVAL OPENS WITH SUCCESS

If the interest manifested by the membership is to be taken as an index, the revival meeting now being held at the Christian Tabernacle will be a great success.

The evangelists, Marshall and Mullins, arrived Friday, and began the first service Friday night. Four services were held Sunday—the regular Sunday services and a lecture by evangelist Marshall at 4 p. m.

The Bible School showed life and vigor and a substantial increase over last Sunday. An effort is being made to have one hundred present next Sunday.

At the morning hour Mr. Mullins sang, "Unanswered Yet," and Evangelist Marshall preached on "The Pre-eminence of Jesus." The sermon was a masterpiece, and showed how, both, the friends and enemies of Jesus paid tribute to the power and greatness of his personality.

At eight-thirty, the tabernacle was comfortably filled and the song service began under the direction of Mr. Mullins. Following the lecture in the afternoon the evangelists sang a duet, entitled "Were You There?"

The subject of the sermon was, "The Golden Candlestick." The speaker said in substance: "The Golden Candlesticks was used to light the Holy place of the Jewish Temple, which was a pattern of the true church today.

Both the evangelists sing, preach and lecture, and so form a unique combination. It was announced last night that Evangelist Mullins would preach this afternoon at 4 o'clock and every afternoon this week, and Marshall would direct the music.

MINERS GO ON TRIAL TO DAY

L'ANSE, Mich., July 6.—With more than a dozen attorneys on hand to represent state and defense, the trial of Charles H. Moyer, president of the Western Federation of Miners, Guy Miller, J. C. Lowney and William Mills, members of the national executive council, together with 31 other officials and members of the federation on charges of conspiracy, was scheduled to start this afternoon before Judge Patrick H. O'Brien, of Calumet, in the Baraga county circuit court. The trial is the direct outcome of the grand jury investigation of alleged violence by strikers in the recent labor war in the Michigan copper country.

Under the Michigan law, the offence charged against the labor leaders constitutes a misdemeanor not a felony. Moyer and his associates are directly charged with conspiracy to prevent the operation of mines by violence or other means. The trial here establishes a precedent, inasmuch as charges of similar nature never before have been lodged against any labor organization or its officials. Rumors were widely circulated in the court room just before the start of the trial that the prosecution would move for a change of venue, on the ground that it would be impossible to secure a conviction against the federation officials in Baraga county. There was no confirmation, both Special Prosecutor George E. Nichols, in charge of the prosecution, and Assistant Deputy General L. W. Carr, appointed by the state to aid Nichols, refusing to discuss the report.

One change of venue already has been made in the case, Judge O'Brien ordering a transfer from Houghton county to Baraga on motion of the defense attorneys several months ago. Judge O. N. Hilton, of Denver, chief counsel of the Western Federation of Miners, is directing the defense of the indicted labor leaders, aided by attorney Angus Kerr, of Calumet, federation counsel in the copper country, and several other lawyers.
