MILITANTS TRY TO BLOW UP BOBBIE BURNS' HOME

 AYR, Scotland, July 8.—Robert Burns' humble birthplace in this city was the scene of a suffragette attack last night. The night watchman discovered two women placing bombs under the old residence. He chased them, catching one, who was promptly jailed.

Robert Burns, — 1759-1796. Scotch lyric poet. Born at Ayr; the son of a poor farmer. Burns worked hard on his father's farm and had little opportunity for education. Began rhyming at the age of 16, and studied mensuration and surveying. His poems brought him into society, where he acquired dissipated habits. Formed a liaison in 1785 with Jean Armour, whom he married later. Intended to immigrate, but the popularity of his poems induced him to remain in Scotland. The principal characteristics of Burns' poems are beauty and intensity of feeling. Just why the suffragettes deemed it necessary to blow up the Scotch poet's old birthplace is not known. Whether it was because his poems brought him into society or because of his failure to emigrate when his popularity was at its height will probably never be known.

In the event the ruler of Mexico decides to withdraw from the capital, it is reported, that he has been promised an asylum in the American lines at Vera Cruz.

SAM SPARKS COMING; WILL SPEAK FOR BALL

5000 FLEE

 ORENDAY, Mexico, July 8.—The constitutionalist circles of General Obrijon, after thirty-six hours of savage fighting, almost completely annihilated 5000 federals, who attempted a sortie from Guadalajara Sunday night. They were fleeing Tuesday.

The federals abandoned their ten troops trains. Many pieces of artillery were taken along with much munitions. Several hundred federal prisoners were taken by the rebels. Casualties on both sides were heavy.

ASSYRIANS GIVEN HEARING AT ANGELO

According to the San Angelo Standard, the two Assyrians who have been soliciting funds for orphanage in Kurdistan, Asiatic Turkey, and who worked Ballinger one day last week, and who were arrested in Brownwood by immigration officers and carried to San Angelo in The Daily Ledger Tuesday, were given a hearing Tuesday at San Angelo.

The two men admitted that they were perpetrating a fraud upon the public, and that the money they collected was for their own use. They told of their travels in other places. They stated that they had sent money back to Turkey, but what they sent was for their own family and not for any other orphan children. The older man claimed that he changed his name after leaving Brownsville, where he escaped from the officers, and that his name was (Continued on Last Page.)

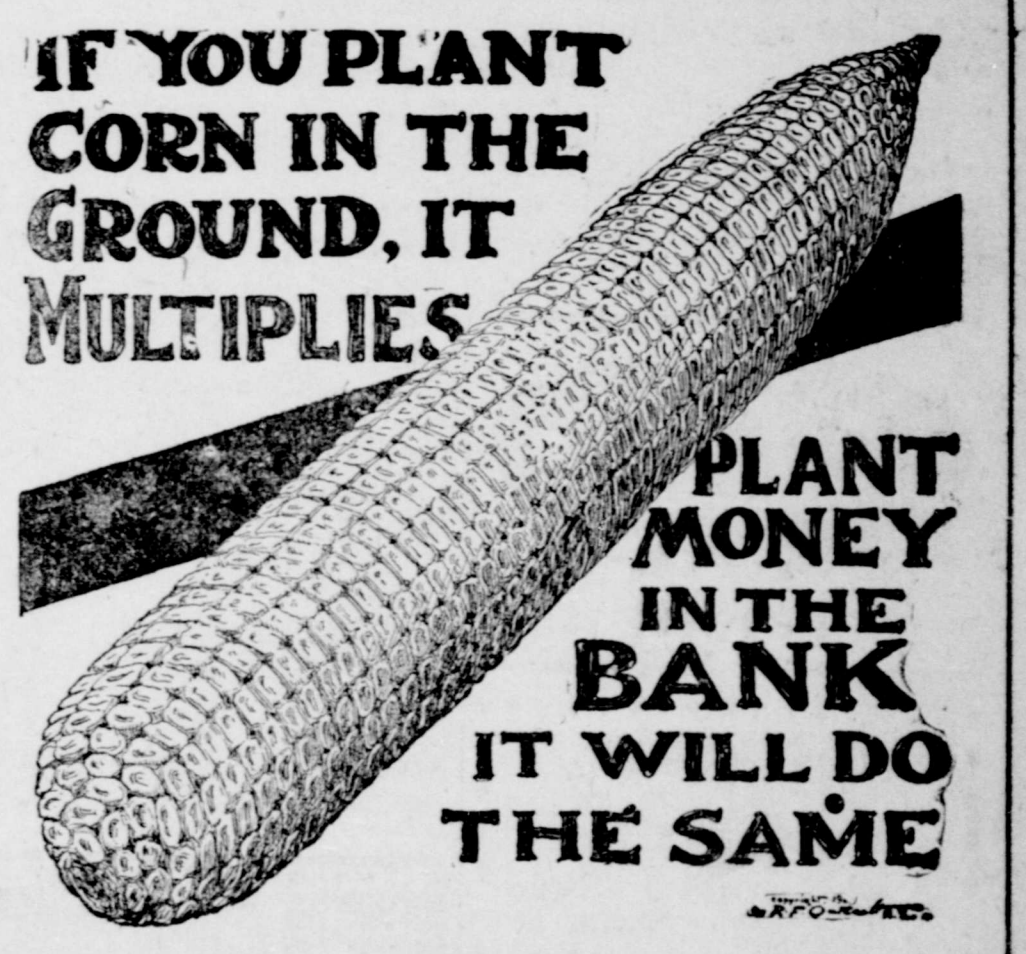

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LITTLE STORIES OF THE LONE STAR STATE

Baptists of Texas credit the Rev. Joseph Bays with being the first minister of their faith in the state. He emigrated from Missouri in company with Joseph Lindley and preached on Peach Creek, on the west side of the Brazos in 1826. In the latter part of 1827 he removed to San Augustine where he labored until compelled by the Mexican authorities to leave.

The first Sunday school established in Texas is claimed by the Baptists. A number of the members of this faith who had emigrated from New York established in 1829 at San Felipe a Sabbath school. It was taught by T. J. Pilgrim, then interpreter of the Spanish language in Austin's colony. The same year a similar school was opened at Matagorda and the year following one on "Old Caney"—all under Baptist auspices.

After this baptist ministers and members came in with the constantly flowing tide of emigration and participated with other denominations in the joys and privations of the new country.

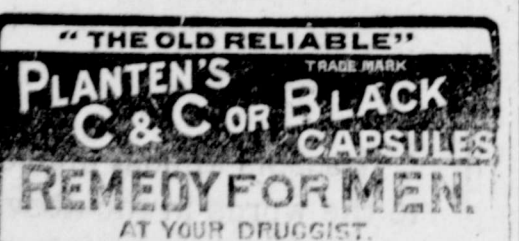

FEED TOO GREEN MAKES BAD ENSILAGE

The American Silo Association is sending out a warning to silo owners, and giving directions that are valuable to follow in filling silos. The notice says:

Immature silage is sour, lacks nourishment and causes animals to scour badly. Corn should be cut when the kernels are glazed and dented and in the dough. This is past the milk stage. Cut cane, sorghum, kaffir, milo and fetterita when seed is matured and in the dough and while stalk is full of sap.

Silage should be cut fine. Get a good mixture of grain, stalk and fodder, so quality of silage will be uniform. Tramp down well in silo, especially around the walls. Keep silage higher in the middle of the silo than around the walls in filling. If silage is dry be sure to add enough water to make it pack well. Even dry feed makes good silage if enough water is added while silo is being filled. The water can be run into the blower and carried in with the feed.

Farmers should co-operate in filling their silos—help your neighbors and get them to help you. The silo is the father of co-operation.

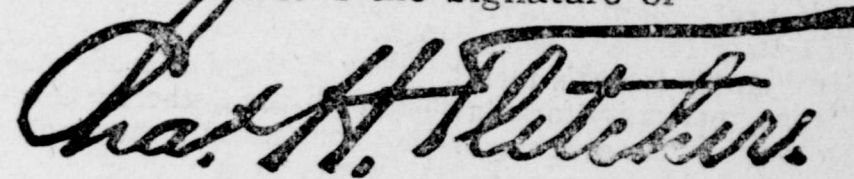

Now Listen, Children, Keep Quiet and Figure on This

If you saw a pump delivering 1,000 gallons of pure sparkling water every minute of the day, how long do you think it would take that pump to fill the Ballinger standpipe? Everybody has seen the local standpipe and everybody has a pretty good idea just how large it is. But who has an idea how long it will take a 1000-gallon pump to fill it, if the average number of citizens is using the water while the filling is going on?

Here's the solution: if the residents are using the water in the afternoon it will take three hours and eight minutes. If the filling is going on in the morning, it will take two hours and sixteen minutes. The discrepancy in the length of time of the morning and afternoon filling is because Ballinger residents use more water in the afternoon than they do before noon.

Here's how it's worked out: In the afternoon Ballinger people use approximately 600 gallons of water every minute. A pump discharging 1,000 gallons of water per minute would deliver a surplus of 400 gallons every minute into the standpipe, which holds 75,000 gallons of water, or beer, or whatever liquid you want to put into it. The 400 gallons divided into the number of gallons the receptacle holds, would give the number of minutes it would take to fill it, which in this case is 188 minutes. Sixty minutes divided into the 188 would resolve the quotient into hours and min-

utes which would be 3 hours and 8 minutes.

Now, you mathematically inclined students of the schools, here's the solution to the morning filling: Approximately 450 gallons of Elm Creek water is used forenoon, during each of the golden minutes of the afterbreakfast-before-lunch period. Our pump sucks out 1000 gallons of water from old Elm, you must remember. If 450 gallons is consumed by the thirsty residents every minute, then 550 would remain in the standpipe. Five hundred, fifty divided into the 75,000 which the reservoir holds, would cause a quotient of 136 minutes, which is equivalent to 2 hours and 16 minutes.

Then the pump station master would lay off for all he would have to do would be to tone his pump to the figure in gallons consumed by the residents of the city.

Well, all that concerns the new pump which the city recently installed. Carlos Dunn who directed the installation of the giant piece of machinery, is real proud of it. The pump has not been connected up yet, but he has kept it bright and clean every minute since its arrival and he will probably keep it that way after it has been put into use. Engineer Dunn, who has charge of the station during the day hours, hopes to have the machinery in working order within the next ten days. In his own words, "Ballinger will have some pump when the new one is rigged up."

DENIES CHARGE

MADE BY FERGUSON

Temple, Texas, July 6, 1914. Ballinger Banner-Ledger, Ballinger, Texas.

Dear Sir:—Through the report of a speech in the Temple Telegram, made by James E. Ferguson, candidate for governor, I notice that said Ferguson made a personal attack upon me. The report is not full but I presume it was in substance the same as made at Decatur some weeks ago. In substance he charges me first with being Tom Ball chairman in Bell county and with being a bosom friend of Tom Ball.

That some years since he signed a bond for me as guardian; that I have stolen this money and that he has paid \$1900.00 for me after being sued. These charges were all made, you will notice as far away from Belton as possible, and 200 miles in each instance. We might call it long distance character assassination. In answer I have this to say.

1st. I am not a citizen of Bell County, but a citizen of Smith County. These facts were well known to Ferguson at the time he made his statements. I have not been in Bell County for more than thirty days until July 1st. I am not a bosom friend of Tom Ball. I never spoke to him but one time in my life and that was in Dallas about six weeks ago.

2nd. About ten years since J. P. Stewart died, leaving a will, under which I was executor and the property was left to his great nephew, Pemberton Stewart. I at first refused to qualify as the time was longer than I wished to be tied up with trust money. Ferguson was just then starting the Belton Loan and Trust Co., and almost with tears in his eyes he insisted on my qualifying so that he could use the money in lending; it to the tenant farmer of Bell County at from 20 per cent to 50 per cent, offering to make the bond for me, which I allowed him to do. The boy became of age March 14th, 1914. I made, as I supposed, a satisfactory settlement with the ward, paying part of the money due and asking for a little more time to raise the balance, to which he was willing and cheerfully granted the time. Ferguson persisted and instigated him to bring this suit against me on the ground that I had used all this money myself, which was not true, and should allow him 10 per

cent interest instead of 8 per cent. There was no reason or occasion for this suit except Ferguson's venom against me, knowing that I was against him, desiring to injure my influence. Except for this suit this money would have been paid. Now as to his having paid the \$1900.00, Ferguson has not paid one cent of this amount or any other amount for me. It has not been paid by any one. Mr. John B. Daniels of Temple is the attorney for the plaintiff and he informs me that it has not been paid to him or to any one authorized to receive it. The publication in Ferguson's organ in Temple that it had been paid embarrassed him very much as his client seeing this called on him and demanded the money. At the time Ferguson made this statement he knew that I had deposited with Geo. W. Cole Jr., the other bondsman, ample collateral to secure him in the payment of this obligation.

I also note that Mr. Ferguson says that the report that his business associates past and present are against him is untrue. I say this, that with the exception of one I know of no business associate, who is now out of his power, who is for him, and that is Judge John D. Robinson. He studied law in W. W. Hair's office. Mr. Hair is against him. Judge John D. Robinson, his first law partner, is for him. I, his second, am against him. Judge J. B. Durrett, his third and last is against him. E. C. Claiborn, his first business partner is against him. R. E. Burns of Anson in Jones Co., A. L. Flynn, of Temple, Dr. Campbell of Temple have been vice-presidents of his Temple Bank, all are against him. Geo. W. Cole Jr., of Belton and Z. T. Booth of Rosebud were formerly associates and both are against him. He organized a bank in Belton in 1905. I am informed and believe that with one or possibly two exceptions, the stockholders of this bank are against him. He and nine others bought a hotel in Belton about ten years ago, I am informed that all of the nine are against him, being for good reasons. I know that some of the stockholders of his present bank are opposed to him, but I do not propose to give their names. I would not willingly in-

Texas Farm Life Subject of Study

Facts of Actual Texas Conditions Shown in Special Maps.

At the last National Corn Exposition the Division of Public Welfare, in the Department of Extension of the University of Texas, had a display of maps of the State of Texas. On these maps was shown in color and by figures just where each county of the state stands so far as certain problems affecting agricultural life of the state are concerned. Among the subjects dealt with were those of tenancy and mortgages, the amount of different crops produced, or the number of live stock to be found, and other closely related subjects. The facts thus set forth permitted the people from any county to compare their standing at a glance with the standing of other counties on the same question. This material has since been used by local parties who want to make a further study of their own communities as related to other communities, or who desire to write an intelligent article upon the agricultural resources and possibilities of their respective counties. In this way the information compiled by the University has been given a wide area of usefulness and for work along all lines of community betterment it forms a basis founded, not on personal opinion, but upon actual evidence as furnished by the best authority.

BOOKKEEPING FOR FARMS IS URGED

Simple Bookkeeping Will Enable Farmer to Check Cost.

Farming is the only business which has not developed standard bookkeeping methods. The majority of farmers keep no books at all, and still they are engaged in a business which demands constant attention and accurate knowledge of the day to day progress. The division of Public Welfare of the University of Texas Extension Department recently undertook a study of marketing farm products, and naturally desired to know the cost of production of farm products. Owing to the fact that few farmers keep an intelligible set of books, this important data is very difficult to obtain.

This bookkeeping can be made very simple and the record kept without difficulty. Such record will consist of all the items, which show what has been paid in the way of rent for land, wages for labor, and interest on capital used. If such record is checked up from day to day, recording the amount of land used, and such items as the use of machinery and the number of days labor given to the crop, it will be found that it is easy to determine about what it costs the farmer to produce his product. If any considerable percentage of farmers kept accurate books, the study of marketing problems, as well as problems in efficiency of farm management would be greatly facilitated. The Division of Public Welfare of the State University undertakes to suggest a simple method of keeping a farm record to any farmer who cares to apply for such information.

In the thirty-one years of its existence the University of Texas has granted approximately 3600 degrees.

FOUR BAPTIZED, LAST EVENING

Last evening just as the sun was dropping behind the distant tree-tops, a little group of earnest people gathered on the banks of the river and greeted each other in subdued tones that betokened a feeling of deep emotion under a calm exterior. While they waited one for another, the waters of the river, kissed by the burning rays of the descending sun, became a flood of crimson glory.

Presently out over the rippling waters floated the words of that old song, "Nearer My God to Thee." At its close the evangelist and four splendid youths in the vigor of young manhood's morning, slowly walked out into the middle of the stream. "In as much as ye did it unto the least of these, ye did it unto me," said the Master. We serve God by serving our fellowmen, and minister unto Christ by giving succor to his needy creatures. Our religion becomes real, only when we live the Christ life.

"No Infidels in Hell," was the topic of the evening sermon, by evangelist Marshall.

"The word of God tells us," said the speaker, "that 'every knee shall bow and every tongue confess Christ as Lord.' No one can pass the judgement bar of God without confessing Jesus as Christ.

"He may live and die an infidel, and spend eternity in hell, but he will not spend it as an infidel. He will be a believer then, but it will be too late for his faith to profit him.

"Christ is ours to be confessed and enjoyed here and now, not bye and bye. Take him into your life now and receive the blessing

here and the eternal reward in the great beyond."

The evangelists and the church seem to be well pleased with the interest and outlook of the meeting. Many comments are heard on all sides concerning the high standard maintained in all the services. The evangelists use no tricks or devices but depend upon the preaching of the simple gospel, upon the spirit, prayer, and personal work, for results.

Tonight Mr. Marshall's theme is "The Old Time Preachers and What They Preached," this afternoon, Mr. Mullins will preach on, "Christianity Applied."

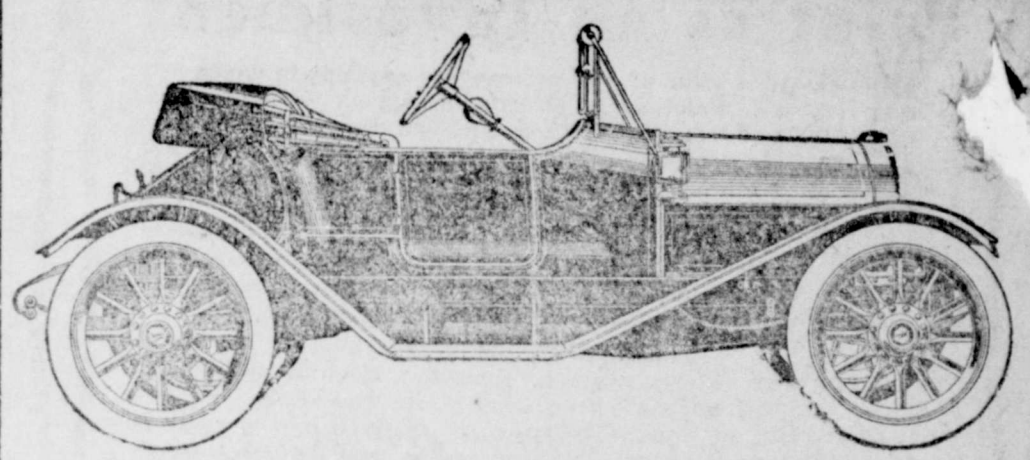
