Call For Meat Boycott Sounded 400 Ulsterites Greet Sir Carson

CHICAGO, July 10—Answering the packers' prediction that the coming fall and winter would see the highest prices for meat in the history of the world, Mrs. George Bass, president of the Women's Club, sounded the call for the meat boycott today.

"The packers' monopoly caused the increase of the already high prices for meats," said Mrs. Bass. "We must stop eating meat. I urge the housewives over the country to use vegetables, fish and eggs as a substitute for the high meat."

BELFAST, Ireland, July 10—In open defiance of all law, 400 Ulsterites with bayonets and cartridge belts, greeted Sir Edward Carson upon his arrival here from London, and escorted him to the first meeting of the provisional government.

Wildest enthusiasm reigned throughout the whole city today. Thousands lined the streets at the time of the procession of Sir Edward through the town.

The preamble of the provisional government constitution declares that it is no intention of the leaders to set up a parliament in Ulster but merely to "hold the providence in trust for the United Kingdom."

Capital Roads Almost Open

SALTILLO, Mex., July 10.—With Guadalupe in the hands of Gen. Orbrigon's forces and news that Gen. Jesus Carranza has taken San Luis Potosi which is reported here, and expected momentarily the road to Queretaro and Mexico City is almost open. Rebel leaders here regard the capture of the capital a certainty within a few weeks.

The prosecutors are unsatisfied with the evidence offered.

Parks said he met Mrs. Carman coming up the stairs from the office of the doctor immediately after shooting of Mrs. Bailey.

WASHINGTON, July 10.—The Senate will have to take the responsibility to complete the federal reserve board. President Wilson will not send a name as a substitute for Paul Warburg. He will either stand or fall by New York bankers. This position of the president was outlined today. The row overshadows the anti-trust legislation. The refusal of Warburg's approval for the committee is considered very discouraging. The administration leaders admitted that the senate vote will be unpleasantly close in an attempt to force the confirmation of Warburg's name to the reserve board.

The woman is dead. Poland with two bullets in his abdomen may recover. A revolver duel between Poland and Mrs. Naylor's husband is the theory of the death of the two, given out by the police.

WOMAN SUICIDES. COLEDADE, July 10.—Mrs. Cornelia Fisk, a prominent club woman and church worker, suicided today over worry for her son, who is serving a term in the penitentiary for embezzlement.

Bandits Rob Train

ST. LOUIS, July 10.—Two bandits last night boarded the Katy Flyer, Texas bound, when it stopped to take water at a tank, then covered the train men, uncoupled the express cars, dynamited the American Express safe and escaped.

The loot which the robbers took away with them is not known but the company said the car carried no large sums, but did carry several packages of money. The pair of bandits were seen with their pockets stuffed with loot. Blood hounds are valueless because the robbers escaped in boats on the Missouri River.

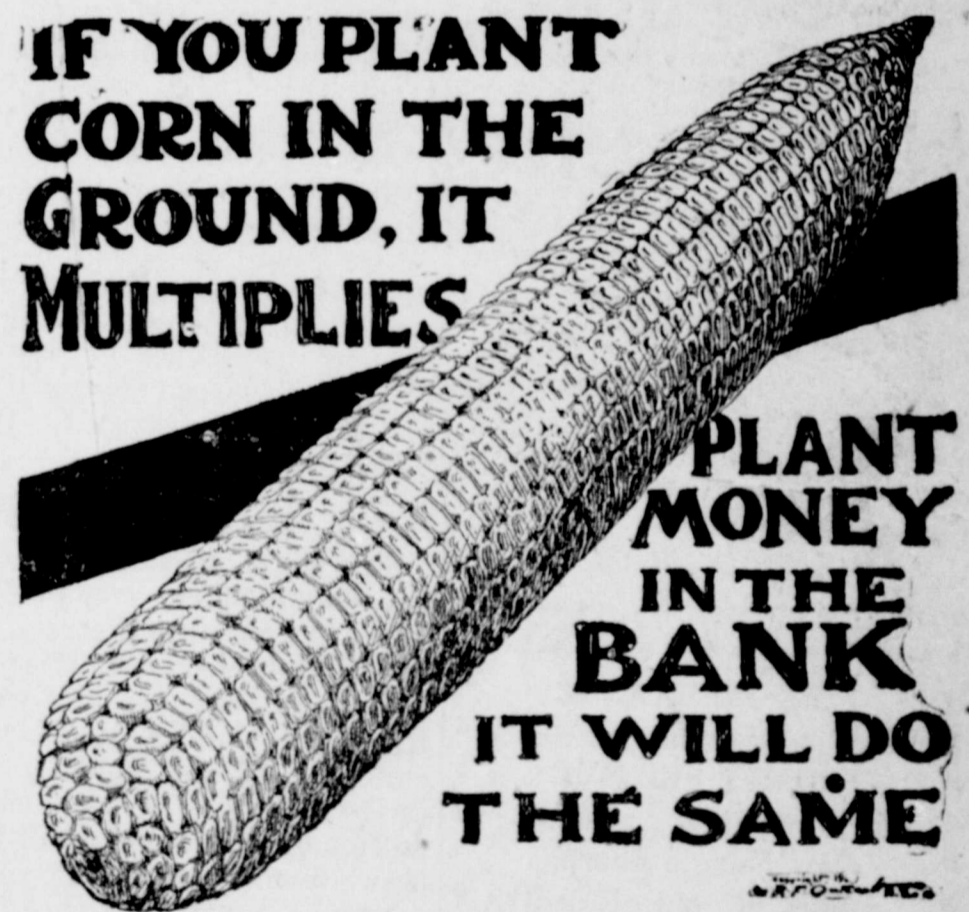
Woe Be Unto Them Who Drink Ice Cream Soda

To be exact for the year 1914 there were issued 606,765 poll tax receipts, and the over and unders, or exemption certificates, makes a total of 697,779 qualified voters. 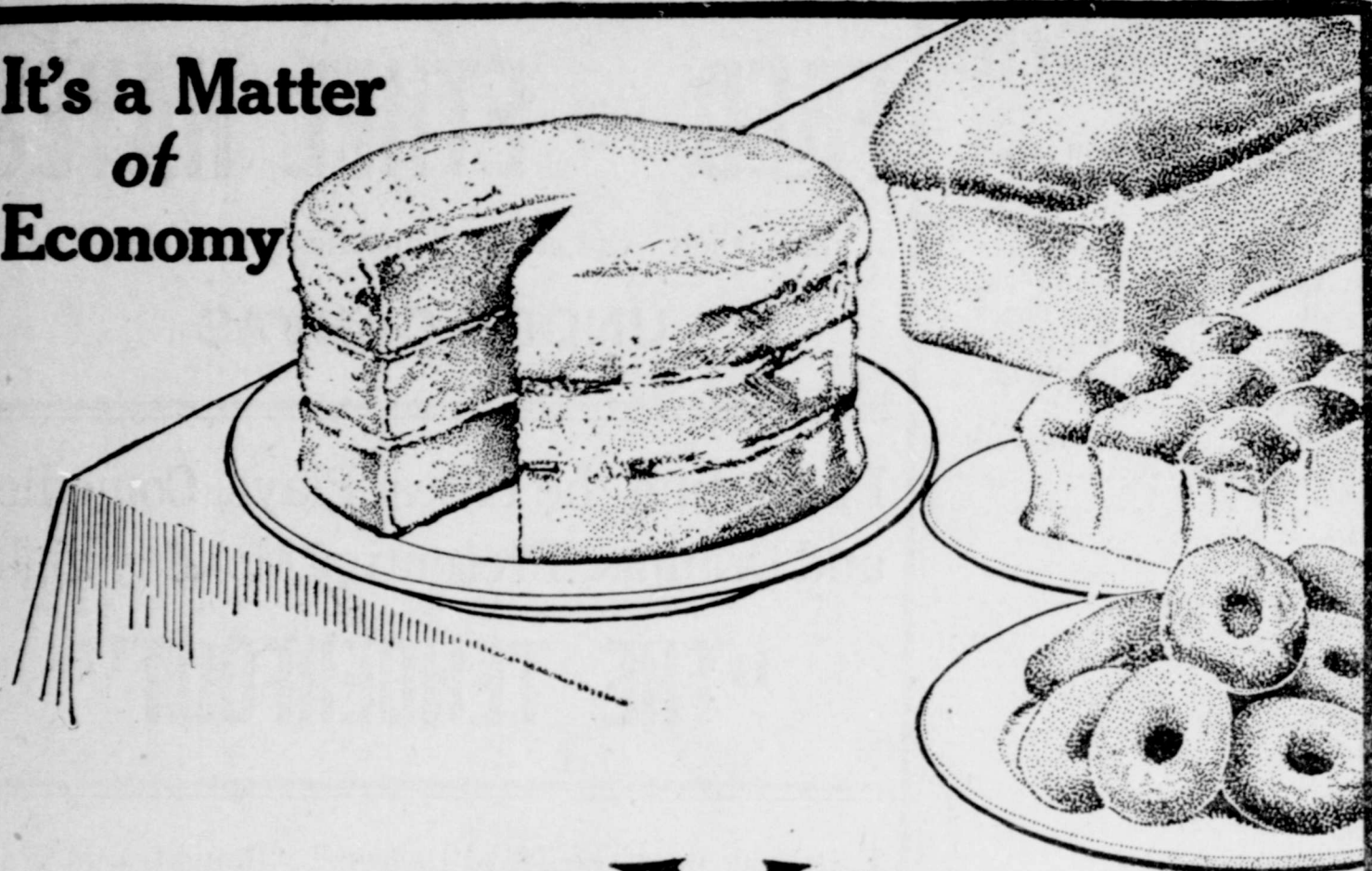
