Hedges, Republican; Chas. D. Whitman, Republican; William Sulzer, candidate on the Prohibition and Washington Party tickets; Frederick M. Davenport, Pro gressive.

The senatorial candidates include: James W. Wadsworth Jr., William H. Calder and David Jayne Hill, Republican, James M. Gerard, Democratis and Bainbridge Colby Progressive.


