RAILROAD MEN GATHER BEFORE I. C. COMMISSION

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—A host of railroad attorneys and officials appeared today before the Interstate Commerce Commission for a final argument of the Eastern railroads that are asking for a five per cent increase in freight rates. The arguments will be brought to a close tomorrow, it appears. A decision of the matter is expected about the middle of November. It is declared by the railroad officials that an increase in freight rates of the Eastern railroads is imperative for the life of the concerns, that the great European war has seriously affected the business of the roads, cutting their proceeds down to where they are operating at a dead expense.

BIG PACKING CONCERNS TO JOINTLY CONSTRUCT UNION STOCKYARDS

The tract includes thirty acres located on the river front and the newly acquired property will soon be dotted with new and up-to-date pens, as arrangements are about complete for building operations to begin.

POLITICAL NEWS OF FOUR CAMPAIGNS

Illinois Militants Today Deciding Militancy Question; Republicans Split In Minnesota? Liquor Question In California before Voters Bryan To Close Campaign In Iowa

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 29.—Climaxing the bitter political enmity which has existed for years, Thomas Taggart, the democratic national committeeman and leader of the democratic party in Indiana, today sued the Indianapolis News for damages amounting to \$25,000, for alleged libel. The suit is based on an editorial which appeared in only one edition of the News yesterday, naming Taggart among the men "who corrupt and debauch everything within the sphere of their influence."

CHICAGO, Oct. 29.—Whether militant political methods were to be adopted by Illinois suffragists was the big subject to be decided when the annual three day convention of the Illinois Equal Suffrage Association opened today in the Congress hotel. Opposition to the re-election of Mrs. Grace Wilbur Trout as president developed several weeks ago and centered about this one idea. Mrs. Trout's opponents declare she has not made the association the powerful force in Illinois politics they expected and accuse her of being "too easy going." One of their specific objections to her candidacy for re-election is the fact that she did not press the fight to have women granted the right to vote for county commissioners.

The general topic of the convention was "How to utilize the ballot for the public good." Among the speakers during the three day session will be Mrs. Ella Flag Young, superintendent of the Chicago schools; Mrs. Medill McCord, mick, Mrs. Raymond Robins, wife of a Progressive senatorial nominee in Illinois; and Mrs. Margaret Haley of the Chicago Teacher's Federation.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Oct. 29.—With the Democrats claiming a split in the Republican party over a quarrel concerning alleged support of Republicans in the primary race for the office of state auditor, administration followers are today confident of success in the general election Nov. 3. William E. Lee, Republican, will be pitted against W. S. Hammond, democrat who has just returned from Washington to take the stump in his candidacy for the office for governor. After a fight that went through the courts of Minnesota and a contest that went through a part of the state, Jacob A. O. Preis will be on the republican ticket for state auditor. Nelson Burghelm will oppose him on the democratic side.

DENVER, Colo., Oct. 29.—The voters of Colorado Nov. 3 will elect a complete state, legislative, congressional and senatorial ticket and at the same time decide whether the state shall be "wet" or "dry." Congressman Kindel, who was elected as a democrat, repudiated the party last spring and did not seek re-election as a Democrat. He is on the ticket however, as an independent candidate for senator.

Almost overshadowing the gubernatorial fight is that between the "wets" and "drys." Both sides advertised extensively, presenting arguments for their cause. The "drys" have been aided in their campaign by the Rev. "Billy" Sunday, the baseball player evangelist, who has been conducting a revival in Denver and the Rev. Scoville who has carried on a similar campaign in Pueblo, the second largest city in the state.

IOWA DEMOCRATS CLOSE CAMPAIGN

DES MOINES, Ia., Oct. 29.—The Democratic campaign will be closed here tonight at a banquet of the Iowa League of Women Clubs at which Secretary of State Wm. J. Bryan and Postmaster General Burleson are scheduled to be the principal speakers. Democrats from all over Iowa are here today attending the closing rally of the campaign, the object being to land Congressman Maurice Connolly of Dubuque in Senator Cummin's shoes, eleven congressmen and a state ticket.

WHITE CAPS AT WORK IN WINGATE COUNTRY

A telephone message from Wingate early Thursday morning stated that efforts were being made by parties in that section of the county to free the country of the negroes that have been imported here to help pick the cotton crop. Parties attacked a negro camp near Wingate Wednesday night, shot up the tent, where the negroes were sleeping and caused considerable fright among the negroes. During the night some one posted notices over the neighborhood warning the negroes to leave the country. The negroes are taking the threats seriously and it is feared that further trouble will grow out of the attempt to run the negroes out of the country. It is claimed that many of the negroes are still in debt to the farmers who paid the expenses of bringing them here to help pick the large cotton crop and not one-half of the crop has been picked. The farmers will protect the negroes, and do all they can to keep them on their farms until the cotton is out of the fields. The officers at Ballinger were notified of the disturbances, and complaints will probably be filed against the guilty parties. The offense is a serious one, and will come up in Federal court, it being against the Federal law to attempt to run any one out of the country by violence or threats of violence.

FOREST NOTES

Because of drouth conditions there is considerable fire danger in the forests of the east this fall.

Pennsylvania and New Jersey lead all other states in the quantity of wood used for making tobacco pipes, and utilize apple wood, French brier, ebony, birch, red gum and olive wood.

Cherry is the wood most used as a backing for the metal plates from which illustrations are printed in magazines and periodicals. It is chosen above all others because it holds its shape, does not warp or twist, works smoothly and does not split.

Two governors, those of Oregon and Massachusetts, have suspended the hunting season this year because of increased danger of forest fires when the woods were exceptionally dry.

The position of city forester is now offering a new field for men with a technical training in forestry. Fitchburg, Massachusetts, is one of the latest towns to secure an official of this sort.

Because of extreme drouth, the fire risks on the national forests in the Northwest have been greater this season than in any other since 1910, the worst year since the forests were created. Much less damage was done this year because experience in fire fighting was gained in the fires of 1910.
