## Parasite Control And Creep Feeding Discussed By Cowmen

Twenty five ranchers of Stephens and surrounding counties heard some of the latest developments in the control of external parasites on livestock, creep feeding of calves and eradication of brucellosis and leptospirosis diseases of cattle at a meeting held in Breckenridge. Speakers on the program included Manning Price, entomologist on the Texas A&M College and Experiment Station staff; Charlie Sewell, Purina sales manager for the Abilene District; and Dr. Don Pitts, veterinarian. Stephens County agricultural agents made arrangements for the meeting. Price pointed out to those present that DDT could no longer be used on livestock due to the fact that the animals will store this insecticide in their tissues. This will result in a higher tolerance of DDT than is allowed by the Pure Food and Drug Administration. "Last year 15 slaughter steers were turned down at a slaughter house in East Texas by the administration because of the presence of DDT," said Price. He recommended the use of Toxaphene or Methoxychlor at a 1/2% solution for the control of parasites on livestock. A period of 28 days should elapse after application before they are sold. Price indicated that the new systemic insecticides (Thelene and Corral) have not been recommended by the Texas Experiment Stations although the USDA has already done so. However he expects that after a few more tests with the compounds they will be recommended by the Experiment Station. Thelene is administered to cattle orally at the dosage of 1/2 ounce to each 300 pounds of live weight. This insecticide has controlled cattle grubs and screwworms in experimental work. According to Price, Corral has done such a good job in past experiments that it is nearly too good to be true. He said it will control, for a period of 60 days,

heel flies, horn flies, ticks, cattle grubs, screwworms and has some effect on the little gray horsefly. Cattle six months or older should be thoroughly wet with a 1/2% solution of Corral. Cost for spraying a cow is around 84 cents. "This is the only insecticide that has ever so much as bothered the horsefly," commented Price. He went on to say that a worm infested with screw-worm of Corral painted around it and it would kill worms present and prevent further reinfestation up to 20 days which is long enough for most wounds to heal. "Creep feeding calves has its advantages and disadvantages," said Sewell. Some of the limitations pointed out were as follows: extra equipment and labor is required; sometimes difficult to get calves to eat; calves sometimes do not sell to advantage and pastures larger than two sections may not be adaptable to creep feeding. On the advantage side Sewell pointed out these facts; it adds weight and finish, cows are not suckled down so much; calves grow out more uniformly; there is little shrinkage at weaning time; aids in development of future breeding stock; calves creeped usually sell for higher price than calves not creep fed; and it serves as a good market for home grown feeds. He felt that a complete ration should be used as a creep feed since creep feeding system do some prior planning and pencil figuring," emphasized Sewell. "Brucellosis has to go," stated Pitts at the beginning of his feeding system is usually to take place of complete feed as grass and milk. "The average of once every year and-a-half rather than once a year. In addition, the resulting abortion, sterility and difficult breeders increase replacement needs by 30 percent. It also contributes to the loss of markets for Texas breeding and stocker cattle. Brucellosis not only attacks cattle, but it spreads among swine and humans. In horses it causes fistulous withers. He suggested that beef cattlemen put their herd on Plan C for the control and eradication of bangs. Under this plan all heifer calves are vaccinated between the ages of 4 and 12 months and these and other officially vaccinated heifers should be used to replace all adult cows as soon as possible. Pitts said that Leptospirosis is very dangerous, but the epidemic of the disease last year was not strong enough to kill any cattle. However, he felt that future outbreaks might prove destructive. "Vaccination is usually not economical or useful unless the herd is exposed to the disease" commented Pitts.

### REWARD CAREFUL DRIVERS

The Texas Legislative Council this week was studying a proposed plan to reward careful drivers with lower automobile insurance rates. The Plan was outlined to a council committee by Vestal Lemmon, general manager of the National Association of Independent Insurers, at a hearing in Austin.

The council is studying automobile insurance rates and will make recommendations to the legislature.

Lemmon told the Legislator members of the council that Texans are paying as much as \$25 million dollars more than necessary.

He blamed this on the uniform-rate system that is used in Texas that requires all companies to charge the same rate, whether the policyholder is a careful driver or has had 10 accidents a year.

He proposed a flexible rate system, such as used in other states, that allows insurance companies to fix their own rates and opens insurance to competition. This system would allow companies to charge less to careful drivers.

Lemmon said the single-rate law in Texas stands as an "open invitation to federal regulation and taxation of the insurance business" because it was monopolistic and violated anti-trust standards.

He testified many insurance companies "stand willing and able" to charge lower insurance rates but cannot do so until Texas adopts a flexible rate system.

He gave figures showing that car buyers in Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma and New Mexico pay 20 per cent less than in Texas for their car insurance.

Citing the high price of car insurance in Texas today as compared with other states, Lemmon said that if Texas had a flexible rate law, a person owning a 1958 Ford could obtain standard insurance coverage for it for approximately \$40 less a year than he is now paying.

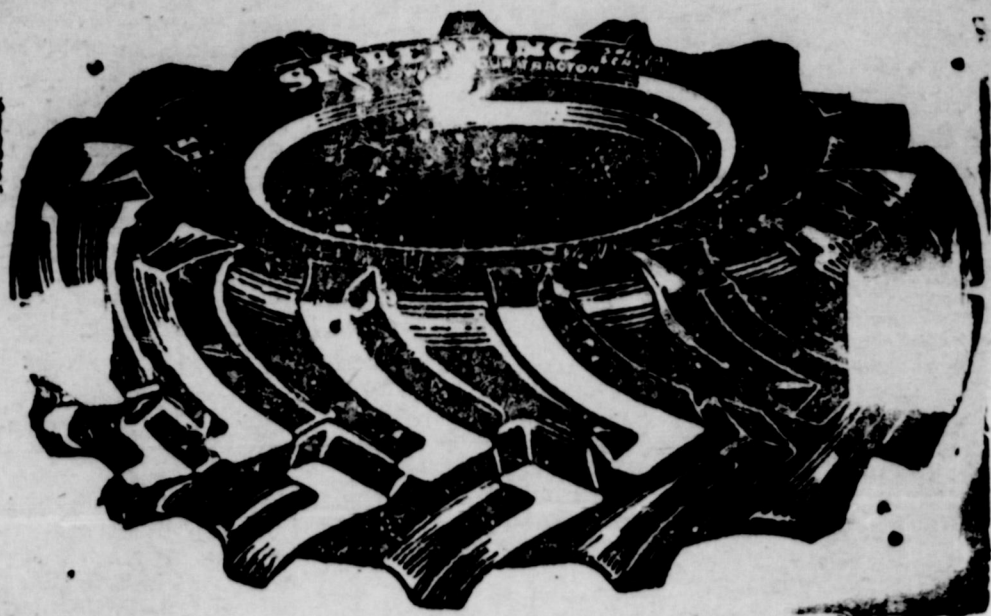
