According to reports of members from various parts of the preserve it is the general opinion that the public generally speaking, has been gratifyingly cooperative in observing the hunting and fishing rules that prevail within the preserve and for this the Association wishes to express its sincerest thanks. However, one or two members complained of persons driving up and down the public roads through the preserve and firing from their cars into

fields and pastures. The Association would like to point out to these persons and others who may be ignorant of the law, that it is a violation of the law to shoot across a public road and this applies at all times whether within or without a game preserve and whether in or out of hunting season. Persons wishing to hunt or fish should first get permission from landowners in order to comply with the law and avoid the possibility of having to pay a fine. Fines can be really heavy sometimes.

Rites For J. L.

James Are Held In Eastland Monday

Funeral services were held Monday at 12 noon for J. L. James in Hamner Funeral Chapel in Eastland. Interment was in the Eastland cemetery following Masonic graveside services.

Officiating ministers were Rev. Lively Brown, pastor of the First Methodist Church in Ranger, and Rev. John Wyler, pastor of the Carbon Methodist Church.

Mr. James, age 69, was found dead in bed last Thursday morning at his home north of Carbon on the Eastland highway.

He had been employed by Lone Star Gas Co. in Eastland since 1925 until his retirement Jan. 1 of this year.

He was born in Arkansas Dec. 8, 1888, but had lived in Eastland County most of his life.

Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Mrs. Vance Stalcup of Slaton, Tex., and Mrs. Mary Lou Lindley of Galveston; three sisters, Mrs. Edna Towers, Mrs. Lillian Long and Miss Mattie B. James, all of California; and one brother, Paul James, also of California; three grandchildren and one great grandchild.

Increase in Number Of Rural Improvement Loans Reported

Wolverines Played Iredell; To Meet Desdemona Tonight

Local banks and other private lenders are increasing their stake in the Farmers Home Administration's program of long term loans to qualified farmers to buy or improve family-type farms or establish good soil and water conservation practices. H. P. Cole, Farmers Home Administration county supervisor, pointed out this week.

His agency is authorized to insure farm real estate loans that are made from funds advanced by banks, insurance companies, or other institutions having money to invest. Since the recent change in the money market, activity by investors has greatly increased.

During the past six months, the national monthly volume of new insured loan business has risen from approximately \$1,250,000 to \$5,000,000 a month.

For either a direct or indirect loan the farmer pays 4½ percent interest. If the loan is insured, the lender or investor gets a clear 3½ percent and the Government guarantees payment of both the principal and interest.

Crop Prospects Are Brightened By Late Season Showers

Rains ranging from one-quarter to three and four inches, put late season stamp of assurance

upon the best crop prospects but the farmers of this section have faced in almost ten years, early this week. But even so Jupiter Pluvius was not uniform in the distribution of his favors. Sections north and east of Rising Star received only a quarter of an inch, while areas east and south were blessed with heavy showers.

South of May rains of three and four inches produced almost flood conditions. But over the area generally the showers were beneficial and sufficient to insure a good peanut crop. Grain land is in excellent shape for planting. In the city of Rising Star a total of .89 of an inch was recorded by the city gauge for the 3-day period from Sunday to Tues-


