Pecans Offer Profitable Vocation For Young Farmers In This Region

Plant a pecan orchard and give it proper care to insure its growth to full potential in a minimum of time. That is the advice of C. E. Smith of Rising Star, veteran orchard owner, to young men interested in a vocation with potential.

Plant An Orchard . . .

Smith enjoys an annual income of \$10,000 to \$15,000 per year from his 65-acre orchard of improved varieties of pecans.

The success of an orchard depends to a great extend on how much effort goes into its anagement and care, Smith se'l. "But I don't know of as J kind of business that will carn you a living unless you work," he added. Smith, who grew up at Mid-

land, moved to Rising Star in 1948 and bought his orchard, which is located adjacent to the city limits on the southwest. He has sandy soil that

is ideal for pecans. Some of his trees are over 40 years old.

Smith's larger trees - he has about 800 - now yield 100 to 150 pounds of nuts each year that bring in \$40 to \$60. He treats his whole orchard

years. Nursery trees lack all of the important tap root, he added. Water planted trees the first year or two, he said.

Smith's orchard includes peach and apple trees that are being replaced with pecans as the fruit trees die out.

This country produces good peaches and apples, he said, adding "you have about three days to market a peach crop when it ripens as compared with several months for pecans, and your fruit yields is not nearly as dependable."

Smith believes that the Comanche pecan, which was developed by Louis Romberg at the U. S. Pecan Experiment Station at Brownwood, is the best for this region. It is a large, round papershell pecan with a delicious meat and it

does well in dry years. Most of Smith's trees are of the Burkett variety, although he has 15 or 20 different varieties for experimentation. All budding has been to Comanches lately and he will continue to emphasize this variety, he said.

The Texas Pecan Growers Association recently ran an evaluation check in the Smith orchard. Using their formula for placing values on pecans, they concluded that Smith's orchard is worth around \$1,500 per acre. Improved orchards with gow management practices Smith said.

Smith's son, Carl, assists his father with the carl, assists his "I'm getting a liftle old for all the hard work that goes into producing pecans," the elder Smith said. Carl is a plumber by trade and works in that profession in the Rising Star area as well as helping in the orchard.

to a good dose of fertilizer (13 13-13) in late February each year. He puts this into the ground with a spreader. The orchard averages about 10 or 11 trees to the acre,

planted in rows to allow 70 feet between trees. Smith plants no cover crops in the orchard. He plows as soon as he can after every rain during the growing season.

Smith uses sprays to control insects-malathion for case borers and disyston for honey dew. leaf worms, etc. 'He has a power spraying machine that pulls behind a tractor.

What is the best way to plant an orchard? Smith's experience favors planting pecan seed and grafting buds from improved varieties on the small trees after they are (Continued from page 1)

half to an inch in diameter. Planting seed gives you a better root system, he believes, and your production will begin sooner by two or more



The workshop was sponsored by the Governor's Cm ed by the Governor's Comas Agricultural Extension Service.




