In keeping with the heritage of this area, Guy and Patty Belt will construct a new restaurant adjacent to their Ranch House Motel at the west edge of Muleshoe.

### Cabot Buys TUCO, Inc. From SPS

Beri Springer, President and Chief Operating Officer of Southwestern Public Service Company, announced that the sale of TUCO, Inc. to the Cabot Corporation has been finalized today. The purchase price was \$33.8 million.

TUCO, Inc. was formed in May of 1974 as a wholly owned subsidiary of Southwestern Public Service Company to provide Southwestern Public Service Company with a firm supply of fuel, including natural gas, coal and fuel oil. TUCO, Inc. also produces other liquid hydrocarbon by-products for sale to non-related wholesalers.

In announcing the sale, Springer said, "Cabot Corporation is a long established individual oil and gas company, and the sale of TUCO, Inc. to Cabot will materially enhance our fuel supply and further enable us to continually provide our customers with dependable electric service, now and in the future."

Contracts presently held by TUCO, Inc. relative to fuel supplies to Southwestern Public Service will continue and Southwestern Public Service will have the first opportunity to purchase additional supplies of natural gas resulting from Cabot exploration activities over a broad area.

Cabot Corporation, in addition to other business activities, explores for, develops and produces crude oil and natural gas, owns gas gathering systems and operates four natural gas processing plants for extraction of natural gas liquids.

Belt explained that groundbreaking for the new construction is expected Monday, tomorrow, and completion of the facility is expected between August 1 and August 15.

He said the new restaurant will feature a western and antique motif and will be named The Capitol Freehold Land and Investment Co. Ltd. Restaurant, in commemoration of the first landholders of all the land in Bailey County.

The restaurant will be 30x90 feet and will feature two dining rooms. The main dining room will be large enough to accommodate most visitors, with a 30x30 foot dining room on the east side for small private parties or dinners, and for overflow from the main dining room.

The exterior will be reddish-brown, with a full length porch and white stanchions, in keeping with the western theme. Inside, it will be finished in a weathered wood with wood plank carpet. Featured inside will be antiques of many types. Many of which will be placed on display with small brass name plates showing the owner. He explained that persons who would like to place their antiques on display will be given a document describing their antique or antiques and they will be given a document describing their antique or antiques and they will still be owned by the person who places them on exhibit. He said the antiques will also be fully insured.

In the small dining room, the east wall will be of stone, all natural rock, with a wood burning fireplace. The entrance to the small dining room will be completely of the same stone, including the ceiling in the hallway.

Wrought iron gates will shut off the small dining room to assure privacy for the special dinners or parties.

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### Screening For Health Set Here

A State Health Department team will be screening needy Bailey County children for health problems on Thursday, May 10, according to Cathy Greer, caseworker with the Texas Department of Human Resources.

According to the caseworker, the clinic will be conducted from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. at the Texas Department of Health, 306 West Second, Muleshoe, and volunteers are needed to supervise small children whose parents are having their siblings receiving health checkups.

The health screening is known as Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnosis and Treatment (EPSDT). Health Department nurses provide the service under contract with DHR.

Eligible for the screening are certified Medicaid recipients under the age of 21. This includes recipients of Aid to Families with Dependent (AFDC) or Supplemental Security Income (SSI). Anyone who is eligible for the screening and desires it, should contact the local DHR office for an appointment.

Those wishing to assist in providing transportation to and from the clinic, seeing after the children or furnishing refreshments, should contact Patricia Mata at the DHR office 272-3981.

## Cold Weather Leaves Frost Friday Morning

## Temperature Dips To Near Freezing

Shivering residents who were hunting coats and sweaters Thursday morning probably forgot that the same type weather was in this area a year ago to the day. On Thursday, May 3, of this year, the weather was bone chilling low 40s with a brisk wind.

But, on Wednesday, May 3 of last year, the city had received 1.8 inches of rain and a light snow was falling that morning. True, the snow did not last long, but it lightly dusted the ground before it melted.

Small hail also pelted the area during the three days before the third, again much like the weather this year. But, last year, a wide area was not devastated by deep hail that piled up, leaving more than three inches of rain in a sudden cloudburst.

Friday morning was colder yet as the temperature dipped into the low 30s and persons whose vehicles were sitting outside had to scrape ice off their windshields from the very heavy frost shortly after sunrise.

Bailey County Agent Spencer Tankley said he did not believe the very cold temperature was enough to seriously damage young growth, although it would slow growth and germination of seed in the colder soil.

Thursday was dreary with the cold wind and a steady drizzle that left no accumulation of moisture.

Warmer temperatures and clear skies were expected to dominate the weather picture for the weekend as the cold front that caused Thursday's miserable weather gained in intensity before slamming into the Dallas - Fort Worth area leaving widespread flooding and tornadoes that caused minor damage.

National Weather Service said the warmer temperature is expected to linger in the area until next Tuesday, when cooler weather again will be noted.

### Bailey County Gets Drink Tax Rebate

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Monday that Texas cities and counties will share more than \$5.2 million in rebates from the state's mixed drink tax.

Bailey County reported county tax revenues at \$2,084,02, and the county will receive \$312.60 of this amount as a rebate.

In Cochran County, the reported revenue was \$637.56 and the county received \$95.63.

Lamb County's revenue was \$7,303.37 and their share was \$1,095.51, while Littlefield reported \$4,523.57, with their share of the tax being \$678.54.

Parmer County reported no revenue from mixed drinks tax.

Bullock said mixed drink sales for the first quarter of 1979 totaled more than \$180 million.

His office has mailed checks totaling \$5.2 million to some 200 counties and 354 cities as their share of the 10 percent gross receipts tax on mixed drinks sold in Texas during January, February and March of this year.

The balance of the money collected, \$12.8 million, will go to the state's General Revenue Fund.

Texas cities and counties receive a 15 percent rebate of the tax collected on mixed drinks sold within their boundaries under the law that legalized the sale of mixed drinks.

Bullock said mixed drink taxes generated \$65.3 million for state, county and local government in 1978.

The mixed drink tax is collected by the Alcoholic Beverages Commission and the city-county share is rebated on a quarterly basis by the Comptroller's office.

### MAIF Plans City Survey

Thursday morning, a group met to discuss the final draft of the planned survey to be conducted in Muleshoe.

Coordinating the meeting was Jeff Smith, president of the Muleshoe Area Industrial Foundation.

A final draft will be prepared by Ken Leggett, planner for the South Plains Association of Governments, Lubbock, and mailed to Smith for approval prior to printing 1,500 to be distributed to private homes and 250 for businesses in Muleshoe.

### Commissioners Buy Trucks During Meeting

During a regular monthly meeting of the Bailey County Commissioners Court on Wednesday, commissioners approved bids for two trucks for Precinct One and Two.

For Precinct 1, the bid was awarded to Muleshoe Motor Company. After trade-in, the net bid was \$9,282.76, plus an additional \$396 for the bed of the truck.

The bid of Muleshoe Motor Company was also approved for Precinct 11. Net bid was \$8,782.76, plus \$396 for the bed of the truck.

Meeting with commissioners court was Boyd Magby, who requested to purchase a parcel of land. The request was tabled for further study.

Commissioners also passed a resolution approving the application of funds for the district attorney investigator for the year 1980 and established the county policy of paying mileage for travel at 18 cents. Previously, commissioners paid 16 cents.

They also paid routine bills during the day.

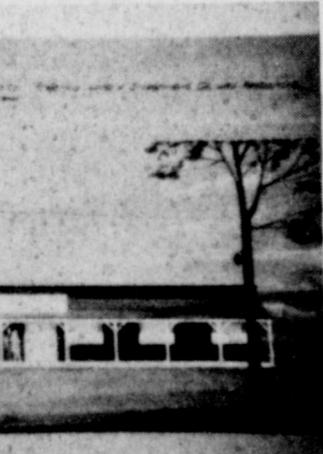

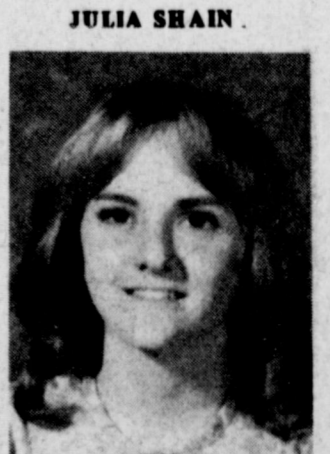
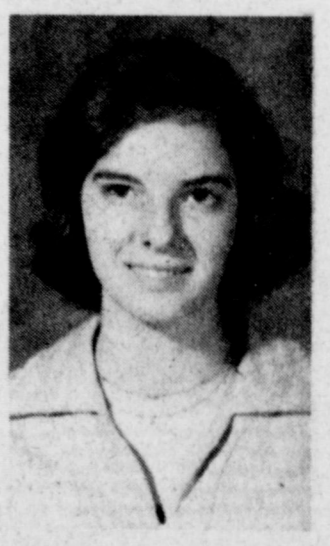

A well-balanced diet should include a wide variety of foods to ensure an adequate intake of all essential nutrients. Being physically active does not require special dietary supplements of any kind.

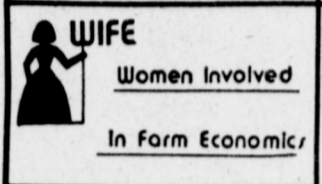

We are "encouraged" that potentially damaging cuts in cotton research funds and Commodity Credit Corporation credits, proposed in the President's budget, will be restored by the House Agricultural Appropriations Subcommittee and will have a reasonable chance of survival in the full Appropriations Committee and on the House floor.

This was how officials of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, felt April 25 on their return from Washington D.C. where they attended a two-day meeting of the Cotton Producer Steering Committee and joined that group in registering opposition to a cut of \$3.42 million in agricultural research funds for 1980. Almost half that amount, \$1,647,000 would come from research on cotton and cottonseed.

"In view of the overall increase of 7.7 percent in the President's budget," points out PCG Executive Donald Johnson, "we think it unfair that agriculture be singled out for such a drastic research cut. Moreover," he adds, "it seems equally inequitable for almost half the total reduction to come out of cotton money."

CCC credits, if the President has his way would be cut almost in half. "These are vital to cotton exports," Johnson argues, "and are used for interest bearing loans with an excellent record of repayment, so in the long run they cost the government nothing."

The High Plains area is particularly upset by the proposed research fund reduction because it is almost certain that approval of the President's budget as it was sent to Congress would result in the loss of approximately \$170,000 in Federal funds for the 15-year-old PCG Boll Weevil Control Program. The program is conducted each year under a matching funds agreement with USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service.

"So a loss of \$170,000 in Federal funds in effect would reduce moneys available for the weevil program by a total of \$340,000," notes Ed Dean, PCG Field Service Director. "And such a loss would seriously endanger the future effectiveness of a joint producer-government program that has kept the boll weevil off the High Plains and out of West Texas, New Mexico and Arizona cotton since 1964."

Johnson, Dean, PCG President Lloyd Cline of Lamesa, and Board Chairman W. B. Criswell of Idalou, while in Washington met with Congressmen Jack Hightower of Vernon, Kent Hance of Lubbock, Charles Stenholm of Stamford, and visited the offices of Texas Senators John Tower and Lloyd Bentsen. All expressed support for restoring boll weevil funds, other agricultural research funds and CCC credit moneys. Hightower, a member of the Agricultural Appropriations Subcommittee, voiced confidence that the budget would reflect his support when it comes from the Subcommittee.

Each of the three Congressmen has counties in his district that are involved in and/or protected by the boll weevil program.

## Wheat Farmers To Harvest About 150 Million Bushels

AUSTIN--Texas wheat producers are expected to harvest some 150.3 million bushels this year, almost twice the small 1978 crop, but still below the 1977 level, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has announced.

Brown said the latest Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service surveys show increases in all wheat-growing areas, but that expected production would still be 10 percent below that of 1977.

Many farmers cut back on

their planting last year in response to low prices and in compliance with the government's set-aside program. The 1978 yield was 54 million bushels.

The prospects are good for the growth of wheat this year.

Tornado damage to crops in the Wichita Falls and Vernon areas has not been assessed as yet. There are around 200,000 acres of wheat planted in Wilbarger and Wichita counties each year, Brown said.

"Once again the Soviet Union has shown total disdain for the unilateral concessions made by the Administration in restricting the introduction of new nuclear weapons into the European theater," Senator John Tower (R-Tex) declared today in response to announcement of the deployment of a new Soviet tactical nuclear missile in Eastern Europe.

"At the very instant the Carter Administration is saying the SALT II agreement is virtually completed, the Soviets apparently feel quite comfortable in injecting an element of instability in U.S. - Soviet relations by deploying the SS-21 tactical nuclear missile. The United States, on the other hand, has long since decided against the early deployment of an enhanced radiation weapon," Tower stated.

Tower said this latest move on the part of the Soviet government, reinforces the position taken by many opponents of the SALT II agreement that the treaty must be examined in the broader context of overall U.S.-Soviet relations, including Soviet adventures in Africa, the Middle East and elsewhere, and the balance of U.S.-Soviet conventional military and naval strength.

"This country is rapidly reaching an unacceptable level of military strength vis-a-vis the Soviet Union. The lack of 'equality' in the SALT II accord will only accelerate that decline. This latest example of Soviet intimidation -- the introduction of the SS-21 -- should hopefully convince the Administration that no amount of goodwill on our part will be reciprocated. We must deal from a position of strength and determination or be content with ultimate, and perhaps irretrievable, inferiority," Tower added.

The senior Texas senator said it is time for the

Carter Administration to immediately reassess its entire approach to the SALT II agreement as well as its basic foreign policy, and to do so before submitting the treaty to the Senate for ratification.

"It will be very difficult to conduct any meaningful consideration of the SALT treaty in the absence of a full understanding of what this Administration really wants for the United States in terms of its leadership in the world."

## Consumer Food News

Best buys at Texas grocery markets this week include poultry items, pork, canned produce and some fresh produce, Gwendolyn Clyatt reports.

Mrs. Clyatt is a consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

This week's price-quality trends are the following:

**POULTRY...**Egg prices are attractive, along with turkey prices, especially on turkey parts. Fryer chickens have higher prices, but they are still a protein bargain, so buy extras and freeze for later.

Some markets offer bone-ched chicken breast, but check the prices before buying. It may be more economical to bone chicken at home.

**PORK...**Prices are a bit lower as supplies increase. More supply increases are expected later in the year forcing prices down even further. Specials include end and loin chops, quarter-loin cut into chops, rib end roasts, frankfurters

and liver.  
**ALONG GROCERY MARKET AISLES**  
Features include canned fruits and vegetables, salmon, tuna, sugar, bread, pancake mix and syrup.  
**FROZEN FOODS...** Best buys are strawberries, pies, ice cream and vegetables.

**DAIRY...**Features are cheeses, milk, sour cream and yogurt.

**FRESH VEGETABLES...** Best buys at moderate prices include carrots, celery, head lettuce, dry onions and squash, along with collards, mustards, turnips and greens.

Asparagus prices are as economical as they will be, but cauliflower and cabbage prices are high due to short supplies caused by bad weather.

**FRESH FRUITS...** Best buys at moderate prices include bananas, apples, pineapple, avocados and pears.

Pear quality is excellent, but let them ripen at room temperature a few days. Apples are from "controlled storage," so refrigerate them to maintain quality.

Strawberries are available, but consumers can expect better berries and lower prices in about two weeks.

He played football for Eastern for four years, and will receive his bachelor's degree in Education on May 11.

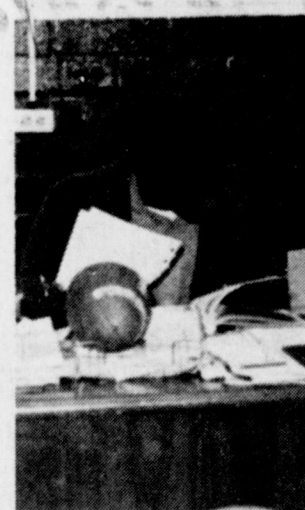
Manley will return to Philadelphia to teach at Highland High where he graduated.

AUSTIN—Representatives of the Texas Department of Agriculture export team have recently returned from a Caribbean trade mission where they promoted representative fresh and processed Texas food products.

Over 2,000 buyers for the hotel-restaurant, grocery and institutional markets in South America, Mexico and the Caribbean attended the 1979 Food and Equipment Exposition of the Caribbean, Carib-USA, in San Juan, Puerto Rico.

S. Trade Assn. (SUSTA), operated a booth, Food from Texas-USA, featuring products for the export market.

Editor's note: The Sandhills Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sandy Creek seems unalarmed about the state of the nation this week.

Dear editor:

The world rarely solves its problems. It mostly just passes them around from one party to another or from one system of government to another. You can't tell how drunk a man is by the form of government he is living under.

According to some people the world has been on the brink of disaster ever since a brink was discovered.

I do not know how seriously we're in trouble but you can not make me believe that once we have got all these cars produced we are not going to find something to run them with, or that once we have got all these buildings with windows that won't open we are not going to find some way to air-condition them.

### TFU Disappointed In Death Blow To New Land Bill

A spokesman for the Texas Farmers Union says it was Governor Clements' announced intention to veto a proposed bill to prohibit foreign land ownership of Texas farm land that killed the measure in the House of

Representatives Wednesday.

Clements publicized his intent to veto HB 431 just prior to lawmakers' decision by 72 to 67 to table the proposal, a vote which Farmers Union says is "another clear indication that the oil companies are writing the laws of Texas once again."

"The record of public testimony in committee and the well known facts of who the opposition was on this issue obviously made it a big oil versus small farmer choice for the legislature," said Ron Butler, State Secretary of TFU. "Two of the large multinational energy firms which are not based in the U.S. led the charge and the rest of the 'oil gang' followed."

Efforts of the general farm organization will now center on a bill to require registration of land holdings in the state by both foreign and domestic investment corporations. Whether the opposition will be as heavy and whether Governor Clements will again threaten a veto are not known.

Quipped Butler, "Since there is little concern about exported petrodollars returning to buy up our Texas farm land... and considering the onetime interest by foreign royalty to purchase the Alamo... I wonder how state officials would react to putting up the Governor's mansion for sale to the highest foreign bidder?"

"For those who say there is no problem, we challenge the legislature to reconcile its position with the states' farmers and ranchers by passing a strong disclosure law. Such a measure should not overlook the giant real estate investment corporation... foreign and domestic. Let's find out who really owns the land in Texas and what trends are evident in current transactions," he continued. "We need to measure

what is happening to our prime farm land. Is it becoming yet another speculative commodity for the investment portfolio or are our natural resources being used to produce food and fiber for American consumers?" Butler concluded.

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

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## Hog Feeds Checked For Sulfa Residue

A program to help pork producers detect sulfa residues in withdrawal rations is now into its third month, Dr. James M. Armstrong, veterinarian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, reports.

"Feed samples are being tested from 60 hog farms in Texas, as well as 780 farms in nine other states. The samples are being collected by Extension personnel and others in major pork producing states. Before the program ends this summer, it is estimated that at least 4,000 farms will be sampled in about 20 states," Armstrong says.

Sulfa residues are showing up in hogs from farms where the producer uses no sulfa, he points out.

"Consequently, samples are being taken from these farms as well as from farms where sulfa is used, since the program is aimed at helping producers pinpoint the contamination sources. Samples are also being taken on farms where feed is farm-mixed and on farms using commercially mixed feeds," Armstrong adds.

Hogs with more than one-tenth part per million sulfa residue in their carcasses at slaughter may not be sold for human consumption. Residues result when hogs consume

sulfa contaminated feeds or water.

With the limited number of feed samples taken to date, about 10 to 15 percent have sulfa levels that could cause violations. While there is no connection between the feed sampling program and tissue sampling at packing plants, reports show that of all hog carcasses checked at the packing plants, from 10 to 15 percent have violative sulfa residues.

Hogs must be off sulfa-medicated feed at least 15 days before slaughter.

"The problem comes," Armstrong explains, "when the producer feeds a sulfa contaminated withdrawal ration that he believes is sulfa-free." This contamination can come from feed-mixing equipment, on the farm or in a commercial mill, that was not adequately cleaned following its use to mix sulfa-medicated feeds. It can also come from producer's mixing clean feed with sulfa-contaminated feed ingredients, such as protein supplement, purchased from another source.

"Another source of contamination," Armstrong says, "comes from hogs' eating manure that was dropped by sulfa-contaminated hogs in trucks, buying stations, packing plants, and other places on the way to market."

He said producer cooperation has been excellent in providing feed samples. The program is aimed at helping hog producers spot potential problems before they find themselves in violation for having excess sulfa in their hogs.
