



Breeding

The sunflower is fast gaining prominence as a possible cash crop in the Southwest, A breed-ing program match as been underway at the High Plains Research Foundation since 1961. The aims of the sunflower breeding program are to develop improv-ed varieties match are disease and insect resistant. Since some varieties now have an oil con-tent of 40 percent and because of the low irrigation require-ments and a growing season of 8 to 60 aigs, sunflowers could be may areas. This is a crop that has been more highly developed in com-rises other than it's native U

resistant strains as a better way to escape damage from this pest. Two hundred and nineteen strains and varieties were in-cluded in the sunflower nursery which was planted on June 19, 1967. These were selections from 642 strains and varieties

from 642 strains and varieties from previous plantings. One irrigation was applied on Aug-ust 9 and no insecticides were applied in order to observe in-dividual plant resistance to the head moth. Individual selec-tions were made for the 1968 nursery, which will be under the direction of Ben H. Quebe, Assistant Agronomist, and Dr. Douglas Owen, Senior Agrono-mist at the Foundation.


