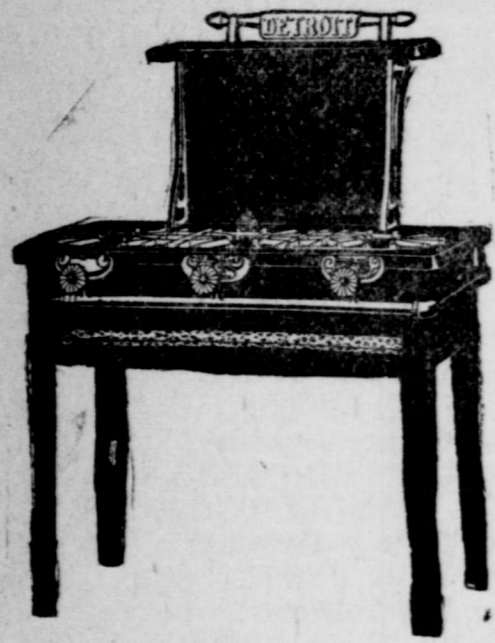

## SUSSEX SINKING CONFERENCE

## MAJORITY FOR GOOD ROADS 23

The returns from the road election held last Saturday show that the tax question carried by a majority of 23 votes, for the tax—receiving 722 for the issue, and against the tax receiving 699.

As expressed by some of those interested in the success of the issue, this is too close to be comfortable. Yet, it is a safe majority and the tax to be levied by the court this year will create a fund sufficient to carry on the road work. It is estimated that a fund of about \$28,000 will be created from the regular tax and the special tax. According to the plans originally outlined and agreed upon in the commissioners court, each precinct will receive from the fund the amount paid by that precinct.

It is believed that the commissioners court will secure a loan sufficient to begin the work at an early date, and not wait until tax paying time before they can start road improving. It is up to the court to do this if they see fit, and as summer time is the proper time to build roads, it is the desire of many tax payers that such arrangement be perfected.

## DESPONDENT LADY ENDS HER LIFE

Mrs. M. E. Wilkerson, age 66 years, died at the home of her son, R. E. Wilkerson, east of the court house square Sunday afternoon about four o'clock, as the result of a pistol shot fired by her own hands.

Deceased has been making her home with her son for sometime, and bad health had caused her to become despondent. Her despondent condition had caused the family some apprehension and the gun, a F. & H. .38 calibre, had been removed from its accustomed place and thought set aside. The other members of the family, with visitors, were about the place when Mrs. Wilkerson, without making her intentions known, stepped into a room to herself and fired a bullet in the back of her head, dying instantly.

Arrangement were perfected for the funeral and at four o'clock Monday afternoon the funeral services were held at the home and interment made in the City Cemetery. J. v. J. W. Bost, pastor of the Nazarene church, conducted the services.

The friends of Mr. Wilkerson and his family extended sympathy in the sorrow brought upon them by this tragic death.

## FUNSTON MOVES NEGRO SOLDIERS

SAN ANTONIO, April 10.—As a result of the trouble between the Texas rangers and the Company C, of the Twenty-fourth infantry, a negro regiment stationed at Del Rio, in which one negro trooper was killed, Gen. Funston announced today that he had transferred the negro regiment to Mexico to be used in protecting communication lines.

Del Rio, Tex., April 10.—Private John Wade of Company C, Twenty-fourth infantry, was killed here late yesterday by State Ranger Barler when two rangers and Sheriff Almond attempted to arrest sixteen negro soldiers who had created a disturbance in a house in the restricted district.

Three negroes attacked the officers while the latter were taking them to the jail. Wade jumped on Ranger Barler, pressing him to the ground, and clubbing him on the head with the butt of his revolver. Lying on his back, Barler drew his pistol and fired over his shoulder at Wade, killing him instantly.

Protests against the presence of, and requests for the immediate removal of the negro soldiers who have been stationed here for the past three weeks, were being prepared today to be sent to the war department. A high state of indignation existed in Del Rio today as a result of the shooting.

## VICTIM OF SHOOTING IS OUT OF DANGER

The latest report from Winters, says that Wm. Heckler, who was shot by Jim Flynt, while resisting arrest last Saturday, is getting along well, and there is no danger of the wound proving fatal. In fact the report says Heckler is able to be up and about his home where the shooting occurred.

The particulars are about as published in last Saturday's Ledger. In reporting the trouble the officers say that Mr. Flynt did not shoot until after Heckler had fired shots at the officers, who went out to arrest him for creating a disturbance. Heckler had previously shot at his son, and was armed with two guns when the officers reached the scene of the trouble. Heckler refused to submit to the appeals made by the officers that he lay down his guns and surrender, but instead fired two shots at them.

Mr. Flynt made a nominal bond to await the action of the grand jury and it is the opinion of those familiar with the facts in the case that no serious charges will be filed against Mr. Flynt.

One or more charges have been filed against eckler and the officers will go out and arrest him again.

## Cummins and Wilson Favorites In Iowa Primary Today.

Des Moines, Ia., April 10.—Iowa voters are at the polls today casting their ballots at Iowa's first presidential preference primary. Candidates for delegates at large, alternates, district delegates and alternates, national committeemen and state committeemen are being selected for all the parties. The vote promises to be large and Cummins delegates for the republicans and Wilson delegates for the democrats are conceded. W. W. Marsh of Waterloo, democrat, and J. T. Adams of Dubuque, republican are conceded selections as national committeemen.

## VILLA IS SEEKING NEW AID

EL PASO, April 10.—Reports received here today through Mexican sources say that Villa is near Parral and is twenty-four hours ahead of the American troops who are crowding on his trail.

The report also says that Villa is attempting to join Arrieta Brothers, who are stationed at Durango City with three thousand Mexican troops, who are known to be semi-hostile to the Americans.

## Mexican Help Only Limited

SAN ANTONIO, April 10.—In a report made yesterday to Gen. Funston by Gen. Pershing it was indicated that the Carranza authorities were co-operating to a limited extent with Pershing in the chase after Villa. The report stated that the governor of Chihuahua had permitted Pershing to use the telegraph wires into that city. The offer was made to American aviators who landed in that city. However, Gen. Pershing's report did not come to Gen. Funston over the Mexican wires, but was transmitted by aeroplanes and wireless to Columbus. Gen. Pershing did not give his location in the report. He stated that some supplies had been purchased in Chihuahua, but the provisions were limited.

No news has been received from Pershing during the last twenty-four hours.

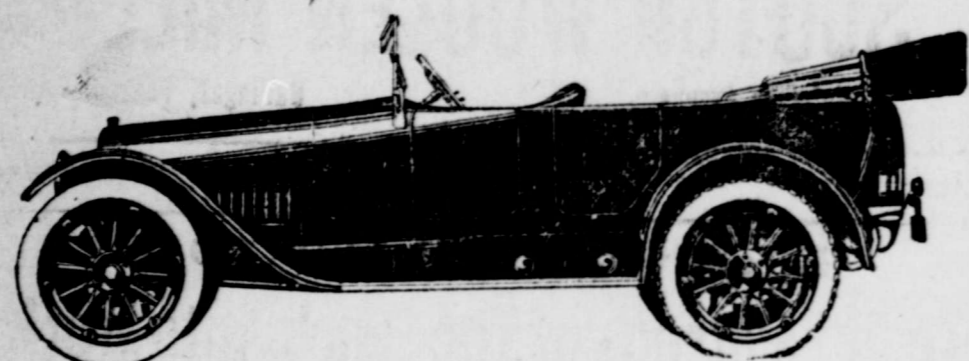
Gen. Funston announced today that the base of supplies would remain at Columbus, and the contemplated change would not be made until further developments in the expedition.

**ENGINEER 52 YEARS;  
GETS LIFE VACATION**

C. A. Cahoon, better known among railroad men as "Uncle Del" has just been placed on the retired list by the Santa Fe, after fifty-two year's faithful service at the throttle. We make mention of this successful career because "Uncle Del" was one of the pioneers of the Santa Fe on this branch of that road and has friends all along the line.

Mr. Cahoon made his first run on an engine on July 4th, 1864, and he has been on the job regular ever since and never killed a engine into Brenham, Caldwell, Cameron, Belton, Ballinger and San Angelo.

C. A. Cahoon was probably the best known and most familiar figure on the Santa Fe lines in Texas. He was born June 19, 1843 and at the age of 16 became a machinist apprentice in the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul shops at Racine, Wis. At 18 he in years later he was sent home disabled, but soon recovered enough to return to his work with the railroad company. Subsequently he was sent out on the road as a fireman. Soon he became an engineer and for forty-seven continuous years "pulled" a locomotive.

Uncle Del estimates he has ridden 2,004,000 miles in a cab, or a mileage equal to eight times around the world.

Uncle Del has been placed on the pension list by the Santa Fe which means he goes on a vacation for the remainder of his days with his salary paid.

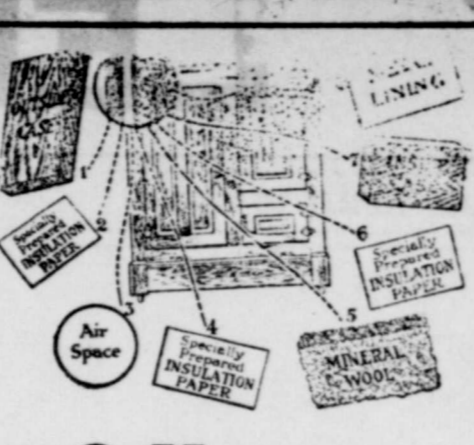

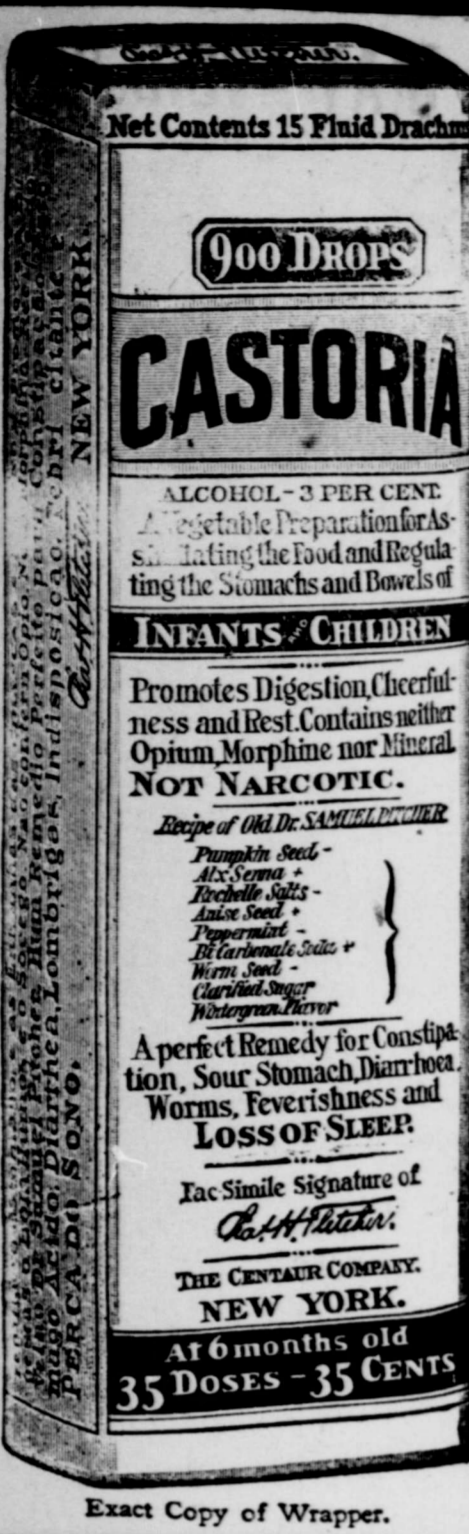

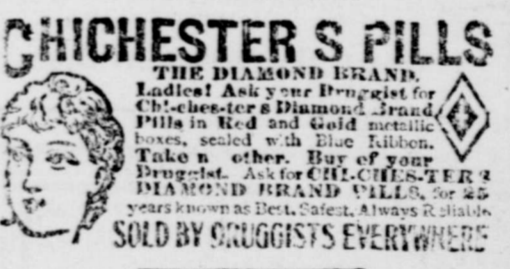
