## COLQUITT MAKES

### GOOD IMPRESSION

Ex-Governor O. B. Colquitt arrived in Ballinger Tuesday afternoon at 1:30 and after luncheon with a few friends at the Central Hotel, he began speaking at the Queen Theatre to a full house and for about two hours held the audience in rapt and respectful attention and by the loud and continuous applause showed conclusively that a large per cent of the audience were in accord with him and enjoying his talk to the fullest extent.

Judge Jno. I. Guion in a few well chosen remarks introduced the speaker and said among other things, that Colquitt had made one of the best governors Texas had had for the past twenty years, always firm and out spoken in his convictions and honest on all questions of vital interest to the people of his state.

The candidate for the senate first spoke of his position on prohibition and said it was a question that seemed would never cease to agitate the minds of the people of Texas, but he for one would like the subject to take a rest. He paid his respects to the Anti-Saloon League, an Ohio institution, and also expressed his views on woman suffrage and said he had always been and was now unequivocally opposed to both issues and strongly favored state rights in

and opposed a centralized government and said he believed fully in local self-government and the states that were governed least were the best governed and he thought the self-government should begin in the home.

He expressed his views on the banking laws with reference to rural credits and said he agreed with the law looking to the establishment of credit banks for the benefits of the farmers and even went further than the effects intended by this law, and thought it a long step in the right direction and wanted to encourage home owning and a home loving people and we would then have a citizenship that would not have to be forced to arms but a people that would gladly shoulder arms in the protection of home and loved ones. He further stated that the farmers should have money at as cheap rate as other class of citizens.

He then defended his acts as governor against his enemies, who were claiming he was against the national government, when he criticized them for not coming to the rescue of the Southern cotton planter to help save the cotton crop of 1911 when the government had given several million to save the Wall Street gamblers, when the panic struck them when gambling in stocks and bonds.

He defended his acts with reference to the Mexican border trouble and said he had no apologies to make in either instance as since proven he was right in both cases by the government coming to the very views he had advocated and talked at length on the Mexican situation, and took occasion to give

Senator Morris Sheppard some pretty strong thrusts with reference to his stand taken in the Mexico situation and told what Governor Ferguson said to Sheppard when he advised him what should be done with reference to the situation on the border.

The ex-governor made a splendid two hour address that was well received by the entire audience and wound up by giving a short history of his life from a small boy from Georgia and saying how much he appreciated the splendid vote Runnels county had given him twice for governor and felt sure he would again be accorded the same treatment and was very confident of being the next United States Senator.

He left at 6 o'clock in an automobile for Winters where he spoke at night and was accompanied by Judge Jno. I. Guion H. Giesecke and Otto Voglesang.

## WOMEN PARADE TO URGE SUFFRAGE

CHICAGO, June 7.—One thousand women from every corner of the United States ate luncheon today at the Auditorium hotel and listened to a dozen prominent equal suffrage speakers talk politics.

Today is the third and last day of the first convention of the Women's Party convention.

The one thousand women sat at one hundred tables in the large ballroom in the Auditorium, satisfied that their first convention has impressed at least two political parties with the importance of 4,000,000 women voters in eleven "free states."

Among the speakers at the luncheon were: Mrs. Dora Phelps Buell, Colorado state factory inspector; Miss Annie Martin, Nevada, lobbyist; Miss Maude Youmger, Mrs. William Kent, Mrs. Sarah Bard Field, California; Mrs. John A. Keating, Portland Ore.; Mrs. William H. Sawtelle, Arizona; Mrs. Florence Axtell, Bellingham, Wash.; Mrs. C. S. Haire, Helena Montana.

Many of the delegates to the convention planned to march in the Illinois Equal Suffrage parade to start at four o'clock this afternoon.

At a mass meeting tonight leaders of all three political parties are to speak.

NEW HAVEN, June 7.—Dutch Carter, who registered an objection to Mme. Gadski's appearing in "Die Walkure" in the Yale Bowl today because of her husband's German activities, stirred up considerable of a rumpus several weeks ago, but Madame will sing today, just the same.

President Hadley said he would make no comment, but that the action of the university in asking Mme. Gadski to sing at the opera spoke for itself. Prof. Hiram Bingham said he thought Mr. Carter was mixing up Prussian militarism with German singing.

The following protest, which appeared in the Yale News is taken to indicate the sentiment of some of the undergraduates on the question:

To the Chairman of the News: Sir:—I understand that Hook McGloob has been engaged to sing in a German opera in the Bowl. I have it on accurate information that McGloob's wife is under indictment for stealing three pairs of coolie running pants from Yale in China while serving as a laundress. As a Yale man and especially as an American I want to protest against Hook's engagement to sing in a Yale function.

Yale in China is of immense importance to the modern China, but the recent utterances of Klig, Fish and Lea, with their "I'm buyin' 'em" (a statement lacking in the fundamentals of English grammar and insulting insinuating to the person addressed), together with the engagement of Hook makes me sore.

I don't suppose you will publish this because it is too direct, but I hope you will.

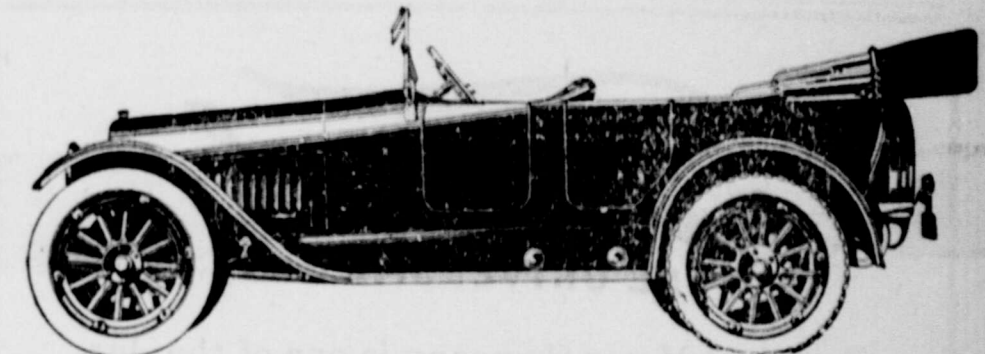
### BULLETIN ON JUDICIAL REFORM IN TEXAS

The University of Texas has just issued a bulletin dealing with the much discussed issue of judicial reform. It does not pretend to a solution, but does offer the following thoughtful articles as a contribution to the discussion: "Reforms in the Texas Judiciary," W. H. Kimbrough, Amarillo; "Procedural Reform in Texas," Rhodes S. Baker, Dallas; "Organization of the German Judiciary," Geo. C. Butte, Austin; and "A Proposed Constitutional Amendment." Since it is generally conceded that there will be presented to the next legislature a plan for the reorganization of the judiciary and the simplification of procedure, the matter contained in this bulletin will doubtless interest a large number of people in Texas. Tentative plans for this reform will be presented to the next meeting, June 12 and 13, of the University of Texas Law Association in Austin, Hon. Pat M. Neff of Waco, serving as chairman of the recomendatory committee. Members of the higher courts, whether members in the Association or not as well as all citizens, are invited by President Kimbrough to take part in the meeting.

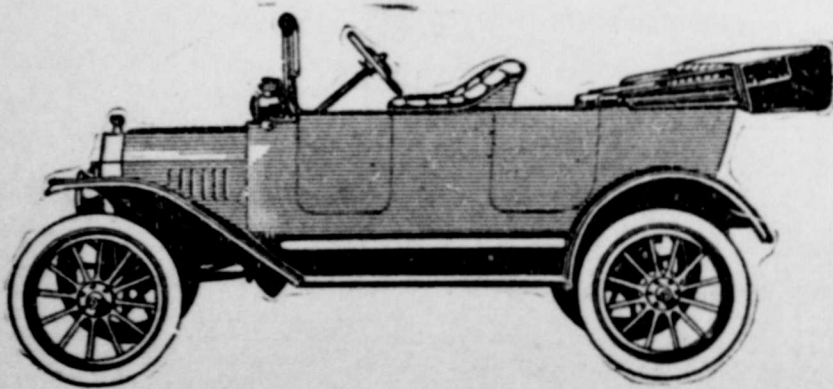

### SECOND CROP IRISH POTATOES

By G. H. Garren, Agronomist Extension Service Agricultural and Mechanical College.

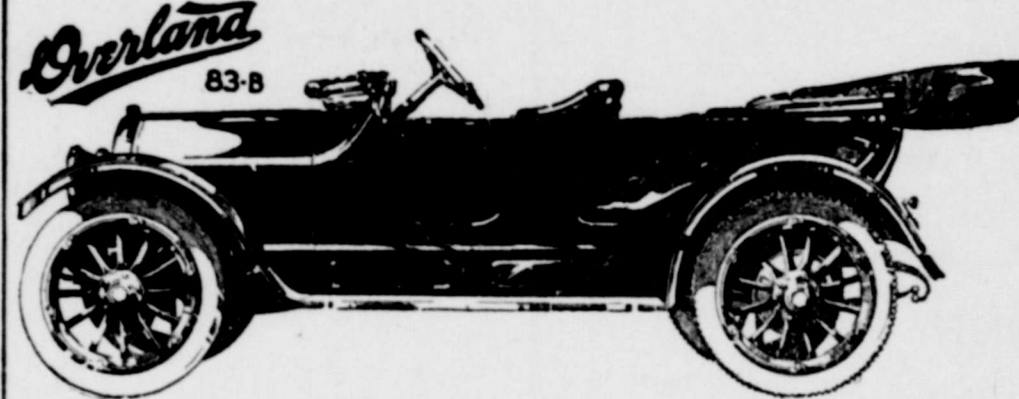
It is a growing practice throughout the Southern States to grow a second or fall crop of Irish potatoes. The increasing popularity of the Irish potato as a staple article of diet and the ease with which this second crop can be kept through the winter should commend to the Texas farmers the growing of a fall crop of Irish potatoes.

The second crop is usually planted on the same land where the first crop grew or where cucumbers or some other early crop grew. Many use seed from the first crop, but seed from other sources can be used. Use an early variety. Irish Cobbler is one of the popular early varieties. It will require from 90 to 120 days to mature a crop, much depending upon the amount of rainfall during the growing period. Plant to take advantage of the rainfall of the season. Some growers in Texas recommend June planting. Such early planting, it is claimed tends to overcome the seasonal disadvantages.

The greatest disadvantage to overcome is the lack of moisture. The planting and the cultivation of the fall crop will differ from the planting and the cultivation of the first crop only in the efforts

necessary to overcome the handicap of a lack of moisture. Overcoming this handicap will be materially aided by:

1st. Sprouting the seed before planting. Place the seed on the ground in a shady place. Cover with straw or other coarse litter. Keep moist until sprouted. Plant before the sprouts are long enough to break off in handling. Sprouting the seed hastens early growth.

2nd. Plant and cultivate on the level. Level cultivation the better enables the grower to maintain a mulch to conserve his moisture. Plant about six inches deep on deeply prepared land and roll the soil in covering, if possible. If covered with a hoe, walking behind the hoe will serve the purpose of rolling the soil.

3rd. At all costs, maintain a good mulch. Success depends upon conserving the moisture. Harrow frequently before planting and after planting until the potatoes come up. Then, if obtainable, cover the whole field with a mulch about three inches deep of straw or other coarse litter. Then all future cultivation will consist in hand pulling what few weeds may come through the mulch. If a litter mulch is unobtainable, a soil mulch will have to be depended upon.

Those who are interested in growing fall potatoes, but are not in a position to grow them on a field scale, should grow half a dozen rows or so in the garden for home consumption. It would be easy to secure sufficient litter to mulch a few rows. In addition, growing a few rows in the garden will give that practical experience and skill that would later insure success in growing them on a larger scale.

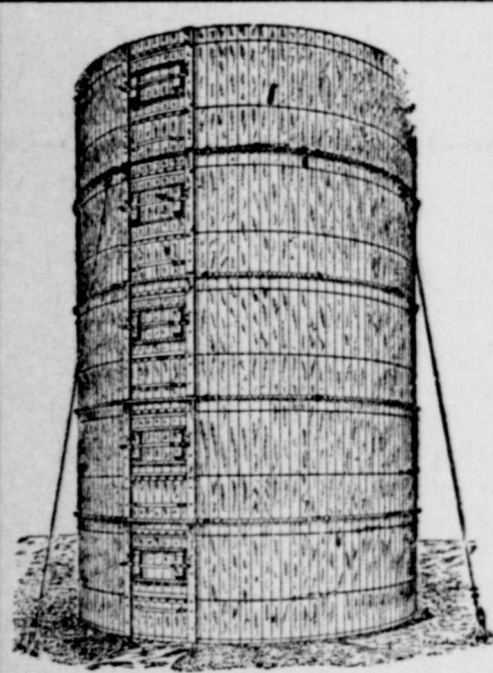

The present reserve seat section will be enlarged, owing to the increasing demand for the better seats, and chairs now used in the Queen transported there for the present. Before the next summer it is hoped to have cushions made for the preferred section. There will still be the same number of general ticket seats at the airdome at the low admission prices.

So be patient and when you hear Ballinger isn't going to have a good picture show, show them up. The management of the present amusement houses can afford to do this—and they will.
