## Forfeited Land Sale Slated By Veterans Board

AUSTIN — Fifty-eight tracts of forfeited land in a general northeast-southwest belt across Texas will be offered for sale by the Veterans' Land Board on January 21.

The property was forfeited earlier by the Board because purchasers refused to make payments. The land offerings are located in 21 counties. They total 3,269 acres.

Largest tract to be offered is 196.2 acres in Maverick County. Most number of forfeitures to be offered in one county are 15 in Zavala.

Tracts to be offered for sale are located in these counties:

Northeast — Fannin, Van Zandt, Upshur, and Harrison.

Northwest Central — Callahan, Eastland, Coleman, Brown, Comanche, McCulloch, and Coryell.

South Central — Bastrop, Lavaca, Guadalupe, Bexar, and Medina.

Upper Valley — Zavala, Mave-

## Farmers' Social Security Options On Tax Explained

Most farmers in this area will soon be filing their 1957 Federal income tax returns. And, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., Abilene district manager for the Social Security Administration, most of them will also be filing Form SE, U. S. Report of Self-Employment Income to credit their net earnings to their social security accounts. Both the amount of tax due and future social security benefits are based on the net income earned. All self-employment reports must show at least \$400 for social security credit; under \$400 is not creditable.

Farmers will follow the same basic rules in reporting income as do business and professional self-employed persons. Internal Revenue rules provide that all operating expenses are to be deducted from the gross income in figuring the net earnings. However, farm and ranch operators do have an optional method of figuring the reportable net income. This option is not available to other self-employed persons, and is available for social security purposes only — it does not affect income tax computations.

Who may use this option? A farm operator may, (1) if his gross earnings are \$1800 or less, or (2) if his gross earnings are over \$1800, but his true net income is less than \$1200.

How does the option work? Of gross earnings of \$1800 or less, the self-employed farmer may report either his true net income or two-thirds of the gross income — provided the gross income is at least \$600. If his gross income is over \$1800, and his true net income is less than \$1200, he may report either the actual net or \$1200. Some examples will illustrate this special rule:

A. Farmer grosses \$1755 from his farming operation. His operating expenses are \$1050, leaving a true net income of \$705. For social security reporting he can use either \$705 or \$1175 (two-thirds of \$1755) as his reportable net earnings.

B. Farmer Smith has gross farm income of \$2790. His operating expenses come to \$1700, resulting in a true net income of \$1090. Since his gross is over \$1800 but his true net less than \$1200, he can report two-thirds of the gross because his gross income is over \$1800.

C. Farmer Jones' gross income is \$3300; his expenses come to

\$2000. Therefore, his net income is \$1300. He has no option — his reportable income is his true net of \$1300.

## Texas Veterans Are Sent Forms By Land Board

AUSTIN, Jan. 2 — 1,000 applications will be mailed immediately to ex-servicemen on the Veterans' Land Program waiting list, Land Commissioner Earl Rudder said Tuesday.

The speed-up comes as a result of the sale Monday of \$12,500,000 in Veterans' Land Bonds. They were sold at 2.695 per cent interest.

More applications will be mailed as fast as they can be processed, the land commissioner added. Application forms going out now are being sent to veterans who hold waiting list numbers beginning with 6001.

Meanwhile, the Veterans' Land Board set a new interest rate to be paid by participants in the program for their loans. The new rate is 3.5 per cent.

"The legislature has authorized a charge up to four per cent interest," Commissioner Rudder said, "but the favorable condition of the bond market made it possible for us to hold our interest down."

The 3.5 per cent interest to be paid by veterans for a V. L. P. loan compares with 4.5 per cent for V. A. housing loans, 5 per cent for federal land bank loans, and 5.5 per cent for FHA housing loans.

About 22,700 veterans are still on the waiting list for Veterans' Land Program applications. Of these, approximately 8,000 will receive applications from the \$12,500,000 brought in by Monday's bond sale.

"So that the program will have money to continue buying land, we will offer more bonds after 90 days if the market is favorable," Commissioner Rudder said.

Monday's sale is the first issue of bonds from the second \$100,000,000 in the program approved by voters in November, 1956. The last V. L. P. bonds from the first \$100,000,000 were sold in September, 1954.

## HOME MAKERS

After taking advantage of the after-Christmas sales, you will probably have some new clothes to make. One of the important factors of sewing is pressing as you go to give your garment that professional look.

A good dressmaker knows that pressing is just as important as the way in which a dart or seam is stitched. In fact, the most carefully handled dart or seam can look "home-made" if not properly pressed.

Pressing technique is important too. In general, work on the wrong side of the fabric. Occasionally this is impossible and you may have to press such things as pocket welts on the right side. For this, use a press cloth. Always smooth material carefully under the iron and press on the straight grain of the fabric whenever possible.

In sewing cotton or linen, pressed when well dampened or use a steam iron with high heat. Press woollens with a damp cloth

between iron and dry woolen, or use a steam iron. Use high heat for wool, but don't press too dry. To shrink out ease, pat with hand to hold steam in the wool fibers. Press silk or rayon with steam iron or use a pressing cloth, dampening cloth as you work. Use medium heat and press with a light touch. Open seams with point of iron lightly before using press cloth. Be careful not to water-spot the fabric.

Press velveteen, corduroy or velvet with a turkish towel over the ironing board or stand an iron on end, cover it with a damp press cloth and draw the wrong side of fabric back and forth over the steaming cloth. Brush lightly while steaming to remove stubborn marks.

Metallic yarns are used in many kinds of fabrics. They do give unusual or interesting effects to fabrics. However, they are a luxury fabric and call for special care and treatment when it comes to cleaning and handling.

Here are some suggestions on care:

Check before you buy. Find out if the fabric or garment can be washed, or if it must be dry cleaned. The majority of these fabrics do dry clean satisfactorily.

All metallic yarns are subject to abrasion; so avoid excessive rubbing. Use the acetate setting on the iron if you need to press. Imported metallic yarns of copper filament coated with gold or silver have a tendency to tarnish in dry cleaning. They may discolor from wear and perspiration. American-made metallic yarns usually dry clean satisfactorily and wear well. However, here are some exceptions.

Sunlight may affect the color. If the fabric has not been stabilized for shrinkage control, puckering of the fabric results after cleaning or washing because the textile yarn shrinks — the metallic yarn does not shrink. Spots leave a color change. If there is no label on the fabric or garment, check with your dry cleaner for suggested care.

#### Tip Of The Week

To protect good shears and scissors, hang them up or keep them in a box away from dust and dampness. An occasional drop of sewing machine oil where the blades join, is necessary to keep them working. Never use them on cardboard, wet cloth, flowers or heavy string. Keep a pair of inexpensive utility shears for such jobs.

The reminder follows notification by the Department of the Army of plans to strengthen the Ready Reserve force to 2,900,000 men by 1960.

The plan will affect nearly 10,000 men from the five-state area of Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, New Mexico, and Louisiana who have been released from active duty training and are obligated by law to enter the Army Reserve.

## FCDA Urges 7-Day Emergency Food Supply for All Families

If the United States ever suffers a thermonuclear attack, one of the basic problems for America's millions would be food, and how to get enough of it.

In the so-called good old days the family pantry generally was loaded with food—ready for any emergency.

TODAY, THE FEDERAL Civil Defense Administration recommends that every family keep a minimum of a seven-day supply of food in the home for instant use in an emergency. This has become known as Grandma's Pantry.

To estimate how much food is needed for seven days, multiply the number of persons in the family by the amounts shown in the adjoining list for one person. A two or three week supply would be more desirable. Foods listed are merely types recommended, not necessarily those which must be stocked.

The items kept on hand should be those staple groceries that are used in your normal pattern of daily serving. By following this plan rotation is no prob-

lem, as you replace the items used by shopping frequently

### Suggested Pantry

**MILK:** One package of powdered, non-fat dry milk, and two 14 1/2 oz. cans of evaporated milk.  
**FRUITS:** One 1 lb. 14 oz. can each of two varieties of canned fruits, and 1 lb. of dried fruits.  
**JUICES:** Three cans of approximately 1 qt. 14 oz. each of fruit or vegetable juice.  
**VEGETABLES:** Six cans (approximately 1 lb. each) of vegetables.  
**SOUPS:** Four 10 1/2 oz. cans.  
**MEATS AND MEAT SUBSTITUTES:** Four cans (approximately 1 lb. each) of your favorite items. Include cheese or peanut butter if desired.

**CEREALS:** Seven individual-serving packages of ready-to-eat variety.  
**BREAD:** The canned varieties.  
**CRACKERS-COOKIES:** One box.  
**BEVERAGES:** One small jar of instant coffee, one of instant tea, or a 1 lb. package of instant cocoa, whichever your family prefers.  
**SOFT DRINKS:** Twelve bottles.

**SUPPLEMENTARY ITEMS:** Sugar, salt, seasonings, candy (types that store well), chewing gum, and cigarettes or tobacco.

**CAUTION:** Store these items like Grandma did—in a dry, cool basement or storeroom within a temperature range of 35 to 50 degrees for best results. Check your "pantry" preferably weekly but at least monthly and rotate items regularly. Use within six months. Bottled water should be changed every six weeks.

enough not to deplete your supply to an appreciable extent.

IF YOUR CHILDREN are young, decrease the amounts by one-fourth. If the children are infants, canned baby foods should be substituted for some of the other canned foods. And don't forget—be sure to plan for old people or invalids.

Another word of caution: check your "pantry" at least monthly, and rotate items regularly. Bottled water, for instance, should be changed every six weeks.

Essential items for your stockroom should include two gallons of water in jugs or bottles for each person, and three gallons for each child under three years old. You should also maintain a supply of salt and sugar, matches, fuel, cooking utensils, a can opener, and tableware.

You would also do well to have in your storage room a portable radio, flashlight, candles and holders, first-aid kit, blankets, pail and garbage container. On the lighter side, you might add a supply of games and toys for the children.

## Plans To Rewrite Constitution Are Backed By RMA

Full support of members of the Retail Merchants Association of Texas is being given a movement to re-write Texas' antiquated constitution. Mrs. Lucile Huffmyer, secretary of Merchants Credit Association, said today. Mrs. Huffmyer said the Texas Legislature at its last regular session set up the machinery for re-writing the state's basic documents by authorizing a four-year study by governmental and private agencies and special committees of citizens. Members of the RMA had volunteered to assist in this work in any way they can, she said.

The re-examination of the constitution will be undertaken by the Legislative Council, the State Bar of Texas, the Texas Research League and citizens advisory committees to be named by the lieutenant governor and the House speaker. Recommendations by these groups will be made in 1961.

Rep. Truett Latimer of Abilene has spearheaded the efforts to bring the constitution up to date by removing ambiguities and ancient provisions, Mrs. Huffmyer said.

The Texas Constitution has been in force since 1876, and because of frequent amendments now resembles an irregular patched quilt of many words.

The 1876 constitution contains 60,000 words — four times as many as the Federal constitution. It has been amended 133 times — necessary because of the changing times and the great detail into which the original document went. This compares with 22 amendments of the U. S. Con-

stitution. In passing the resolution authorizing the study, legislators agreed that the length and detail of the Texas Constitution were reasons for so many amendments that have made the patched document burdensome — and expensive to citizens.

"Many major changes have occurred in the distribution of the people of Texas, between the farm and the city, in transportation, in technology, and in intellectual, commercial and social advancement since 1876," Mrs. Huffmyer pointed out.

She pointed out that it was not necessarily true that a wholesale revision of the document may be deemed wise, in which case recommendations will be made for specific changes in portions.

As an example of the many useless provisions in the constitution, as amended, one section sets out in great detail the planning for the Texas Centennial celebration in Dallas in 1936.

Many sections also deal with reconstruction problems, an urgent need in the '70's, and there are many specific provisions that make the document inflexible.
