Destruction of Lens Is Indication of Retreat

WITH THE BRITISH ARMIES
IN THE FIELD, May 18.—The city of Lens is being destroyed by fire.

Fires and explosions in this local city of France were plainly visible from the British lines and fires and explosions continued throughout the night and are still raging. The Germans plainly know now the danger they are running of a British sweep that will close a circle about the city and trap them there, and the burning of the city is believed to be the first step for a general retreat.

This is the opinion of British army officers. It will be recalled that the same program of burning and blowing up of buildings has been followed by the Germans in every city and town they have evacuated.

CIVILIANS FLEE FROM ITALIANS

ROME, May 18.—Austria has ordered all civilians to evacuate the Isonzo section in which the Italian troops are steadily forging ahead.

Trieste's populace is panic-stricken at the rapid approach of the Italians. All banks in Trieste have been closed and government offices and leading business houses have hurriedly shipped all their records to Vienna.

Most of the Austrian prisoners taken so far by the Italians were from divisions recently detached from the Russian front, which confirms the report that the Austro-German troops have been withdrawn from the Near Eastern front and used to strengthen the Western lines of defense.

ROME, May 18.—The Italian forces have taken over four thousand prisoners to date in their offensive against Austrian lines in the Isonzo.

Official statements issued from General Cadorna's headquarters report these captures, and also announce that the enemy's attack in the Carso region had failed with heavy Austrian losses.

BROWNWOOD SUICIDE WILL BE BURIED TODAY

BROWNWOOD, May 18.—The remains of B. E. Hurlbut were buried with Masonic honors at three o'clock this afternoon. Mr. Hurlbut died Thursday morning, having lingered for twenty-five hours after swallowing a quantity of chloroform. During the last hours he became semi-conscious and talked to his wife. He is survived by his wife and ten children, all of whom are now here. He had been in poor health for some time, it is presumed that this caused him to end his life.

Airship Maneuvering Near Ballinger Excites People

Reports brought to Ballinger Thursday afternoon by fishermen and campers on the Concho river that an airship passed over the country, was confirmed later by the citizens of Paint Rock. According to the report brought here the aircraft sailed from the east and was going west at a high rate of speed. For considerable distance the airship traversed along the line with the Concho river. It was sailing high but the buzz of the machine could be heard very plain and this attracted the attention of the people. It was about six o'clock Thursday morning, when the airship passed over the country, and many people who were out saw the machine.

G. G. Carlisle and W. A. Bridwell, who were in Paint Rock on business Thursday, say that the citizens of that town were considerably excited over the appearance of aviators in that section and there is considerable speculation as to the purpose of the maneuvering. San Antonio is the nearest aviation base, and it is possible that scouting is being done by Uncle Sam from that point, while some suggest that the aviators are sailing under foreign colors and are operating from some point south of the Mexican border.

From time to time for several months similar reports to this, have been made from different points in this section of the state, but the airship reported to have passed this way was seen at night and little evidence has been placed in the report. This is the first ship reported to have been seen in the day time, and the best people of Paint Rock are firm in the statement that they saw the ship.

AMERICAN DOCTORS ARRIVE IN ENGLAND

LONDON, May 18.—The first contingent of the United States army medical unit arrived in England today, according to official announcement. The medical corps will go immediately to the front where the American flag will be established.

SECOND SECTION OF AMERICANS TO FRONT

PARIS, May 18.—America's second section of fighting men went to the French front today. The unit goes to strengthen the lines of the French armies, composed of about forty Americans, comprising No. 2 Squadron off an American munitions transport coming to a French port some time ago.

FIRST WAR BOND IS SOLD IN BALLINGER

The F. & M. Bank advertised in Thursday's Daily Ledger that this bank had been authorized to accept applications for "Liberty Loan" bonds. The opening of an agency in Ballinger and the announcement brought quick response and George Holman has the honor of being the first Ballinger man to buy a war bond. It is expected that others will follow, and the capitalists of this city will have a hand in helping to make up the big war fund. Mr. Holman's application has gone in, and he will soon be dawing interest on his patriotism.

The liberty bonds bear interest at the rate of three and one-half per cent from June 15th, 1917. They are issued in denominations as low as \$50, are exempt from taxes, except as applies to inheritance tax and are exchangeable for bonds of later issues if the rate of interest is increased.

TRUCE RUMOR FROM GERMANY

LONDON, May 18.—The Exchange Telegraph Co. received an Amsterdam report to the effect that a rumor was afloat there of a truce being arranged between Russia and Germany to permit Russia to perfect her political organization.

JAPANESE GUN BOATS ARE AFTER THE SUBS

PARIS, May 18.—The official announcement was made this morning that Japanese gunboats had arrived at Marseilles. The Japanese boats will be used in combatting submarine warfare. The U. S. boats are already operating off British coasts and it is expected that the strength of the submarines will soon be tested.

SUB DESTRUCTION SHOWS DECREASE

PARIS, May 18.—Only three French merchantmen were sunk by submarines in the week ending May 13th, according to an official statement made by the French admiralty this afternoon.

Mr. Taylor states that he had quite a wait before getting in his turn for examination, but got by without any trouble after he was called for examination. He spent one year at West Point, and is in perfect physical condition, and with the educational advantages he has, he will no doubt receive a commission when the work of organizing the half million army begins. R. F. Sharp, another Ballinger boy and Ewing are in the same company. Judge Baugh is in Company Fourteen.

DRAFT BILL SIGNED AND REGISTRATION DAY SOON

WILL CALL NATIONALS IN JULY

WASHINGTON, May 18.—The National Guard will be called into Federal service in three groups. The first group will be called July 15th, the second July 20th, and the third August 5th. The war department is arranging to assign the guards to duty on these dates.

HEAVY PLANTING IN SORGHUM URGED

WASHINGTON, May 18.—The acreage of grain sorghums, including kafir, milo, and teteria, should be greatly increased this year the U. S. Department of Agriculture advises. There is need for abundant production of all crops used for stock feed or human food or both. In the central corn belt corn will be used largely to replace winterkilled wheat. In the western half or two-thirds of Kansas, of Oklahoma, and of Texas, where winterkilling of wheat was most serious, the grain sorghums are safer crops than corn. They are now staple crops in this southern part of the Great Plains area, the grain-sorghum belt. In this section their acreage should be expanded to the limits of available land. This is no time to experiment. Grow the crop that is surest. Grain sorghums can be grown with less moisture than corn and will withstand longer and severer droughts.

These sorghums can be sown throughout May and milo and dwarf milo are fairly safe when sown as late as June 15 or 20, except on the high plains in the western states. Sorghums do not germinate well in cold, wet soils and should not be sown until ten days or more after corn-planting time. Ground should be free from weeds before sowing the sorghums, as early growth is slow and they may be smothered by vigorous weeds.

So spoke Lord Derby, England's secretary of state, speaking for War Kitchner's successor today. Then he added emphatically, "the biggest blow America is able to deliver, the sooner she de-

WASHINGTON, May 18.—The House finally disposed of the selective service bill this afternoon when Speaker Clark signed the measure and Vice-President Marshall affixed his signature immediately afterwards.

Instead of being sent direct to the White House, as most measures are, the bill was sent first to Secretary of War Baker for his perusal. Mr. Baker went over the measure with his military heads, carefully studying it at some length, and this caused some delay in the bill reaching the President.

Five days are allowed after Mr. Wilson signs the bill in which the draft registrars are to receive their final instructions. Then the President's proclamations will fix definitely the date of registration. It is believed that the date selected for registration day will either be the 23rd or 24th of this month.

WASHINGTON, May 18.—Registration day for service under the war army bill will be made the occasion for patriotic demonstrations all over the country. There will be celebrations in honor of the men who register, with patriotic talks by chamberlains, mayors, presidents of chambers of commerce, and others. The place of honor in local parades will be given young men of registration age. Committees of men and women will be at every registration booth to pin an emblem on each man who registers.

SCHOOLS CLOSED AT NOON TODAY

Nearly one thousand school children were set free at noon today, so far as the responsibility of the teachers for their safety and conduct is concerned. This has been final examination week, and most of the children have been enjoying a half holiday, only taking examinations in one or two subjects each day. The primary has been doing a full day's work every day up until Friday at noon when they were turned loose for the summer vacation.

The attention of the high school pupils, and especially of the graduating class, is now centered on commencement. Everything is ready for the final finish to the high school education and the delivery of diplomas certifying to the finish. This exercise will be held at eight-thirty tomorrow night at the Carnegie Library.

The year just closed has been a very successful one. The only hindrance throughout the year was the siege of measles, and this claimed the absence from school of about seventy-five per cent of the graded school pupils and the high school came in for a goodly number of victims. The nine months term was made possible by an increase in school taxes brought about by raising the property values. The school closes out of debt, but also out of money, and needed improvements will have to be held up for awhile.

The teachers who live at other places will leave within the next day or two for their homes, while some will visit, and some will remain at home and it is rumored that some will get married. The faculty for the term was made up of efficient teachers, and as usual there is regret and sadness brought about by the bidding fare well between teacher and pupils.

WASHINGTON, May 18.—Postmaster General Burleson announced today that the territory to which it would be unlawful to mail letters, postal cards or publications containing liquor advertisements under the so called Reed amendment, embraces at least 24 states in their entirety and portions of two others, while data is incomplete as to four more. The ban is effective July 1, except where otherwise stated. Among the states barred are: Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, Colorado, Georgia, Iowa, Mississippi, Nebraska and Oklahoma. In Ohio the advertising is excluded in county or territory or where sale of liquor as a beverage is prohibited; Rhode Island in cities and towns which have voted dry; Texas, in all political sub-divisions which have voted dry.
