## Cover Crop Plans Announced For Eastland County By ASC

**Editor's Note:** The following story was written by Upper Leon Soil Conservation District supervisors.

Many landowners of this area are now very busy planting winter cover crops on their lands. The conservation farmer and rancher regards cover crops as a "must" in order to hold his soil and water in place. Winter cover crops when drilled or broadcast do much to reduce soil loss from both wind and water. A cover crop with a legume does much to condition the soil by making both tight and loose sand easier to plow. The tight land becomes more mellow and the loose land firmer.

The addition of much needed organic matter to the soil is of great importance. Organic matter or crop residus is nature's way of feeding and conditioning the soil.

Good land cover helps hold rainfall in place, increases available plant food and air space within the soil, all of which are essential if the land is to produce profitably. Increased crop yields are a result, for the most part, to the above soil conditions. Winter cover crops can be used for supplemental income through grazing.

Hairy vetch is regarded as the best winter legume for this area. Hairy vetch is a fibrous rooted winter legume which has proved its value by protecting soil from wind and water erosion. It increases the yield of the following crops by adding organic matter and nitrogen to the soil.

Land owners are reminded of the favorable cost share rate available for winter cover crops and other needed conservation practices.

Your county ASC Committee, Soil Conservation district supervisors, agricultural workers and others have recognized the value of cover crops and have provided a very good program to encourage landowner participation. Now is the time to protect our lands from severe sand storms and possibly heavy rains next spring.

"Cover up with cover crops." The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee has reported the winter cover crop program is now in operation and has advised farmers of this area to take advantage of it for winter benefits.

There is offered a straight rye cover crop for 1957 peanut acreage with a cost-share of \$1.25 per acre. Vetch and peas also may be used as a cover crop. Legumes are not limited to peanut acreage. Payment on vetch is 8 cents per pound and 3 1/2 cents per pound on winter peas.

The straight rye cover crop is limited only by the acreage of 1957 peanuts, but the legume

crop is limited to half of the cropland, but not in excess of 60 acres. Assistance is offered on phosphate for legumes. Be sure to secure an approval from the ASC office before these practices are planted, otherwise payment cannot be made, the ASC office said.

Under a new law any producer may grow 30 acres of wheat for feed on the farm. If a producer wishes to take part in this program an agreement must be filed by October 15, 1957, or before the wheat is seeded, whichever is earlier. If an agreement is signed on, wheat may be sold off the farm.

All the details of the Conservation Reserve Program for 1958 (5 year program) have not been received. It is expected that this program will be available by about October 15.

The ASC reports several inquiries regarding sacks for peanuts this fall. They advised the producer to contact the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association for the details because of the strict requirements.

Peanut and cotton marketing cards have been prepared and may be secured from the county office. Cards will be mailed to producers upon request.

The Norton Sound, which left Port Hueneme, Calif. Sept. 23, is firing experimental missiles, evaluating their reactions in tropical conditions.

During the month long cruise, the ship's crew is scheduled to visit several Central American ports, including Balboa, C. Z.

She is scheduled to return to Port Hueneme Oct. 24.

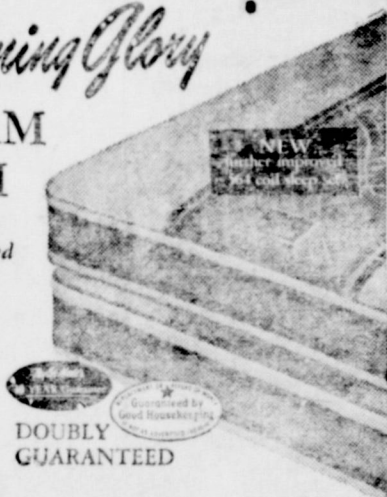

**New Rule Permits  
Planting Of 30  
Acres Of Wheat**

A new provision of the Wheat Marketing Law provides that a producer may sow up to 30 acres of wheat for feeding purposes, according to Emmett E. Powell, office manager of the Eastland County Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

A producer signs an agreement that there will be no wheat sold off the farm and he may sow as much as 30 acres of wheat for feeding purposes. The producer who puts the allotment in the acreage reserve program is not eligible to sign the agreement.

Any producer, even though there is no allotment on the farm, may sign the agreement. This does not affect the 15 acre provision other than a producer can not have 15 acres for sale and 30 acres for feed. October 15 is the final date for signing this agreement, Mr. Powell said.

Sitting Bull is buried at Standing Rock Agency, Fort Yates, North Dakota.

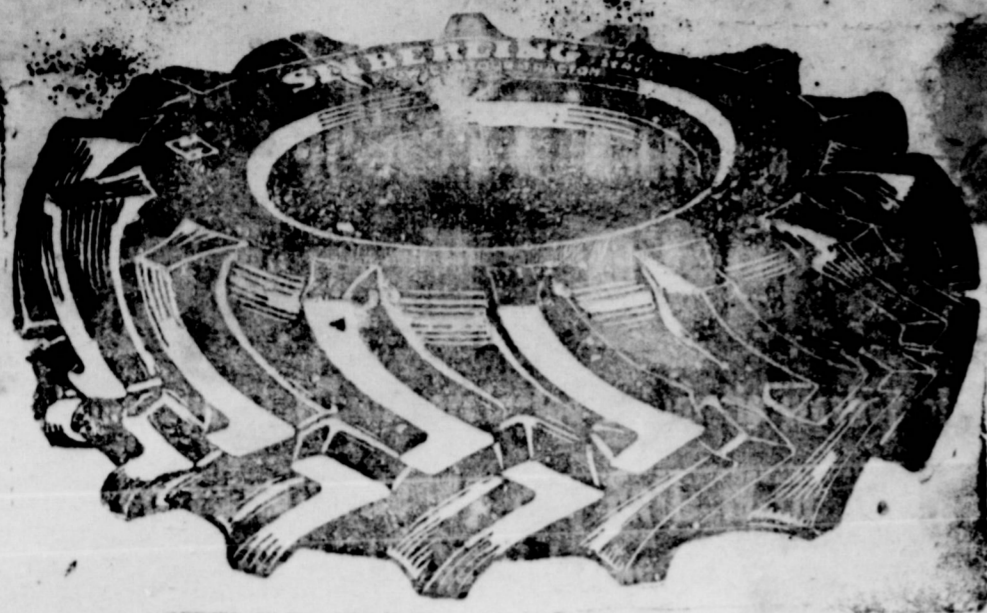

Would you like to feed your family better for less? If you are like thousands of other homemakers, the answer is "yes." Follow these suggestions for better utilization of the food dollar.

To get the most from today's food dollar:

Plan your marketing list before you shop.

Buy only what can be used or stored satisfactorily.

Plan to use left-overs. Avoid waste.

Market in person — see what you buy.

Buy the form and quality that is best suited to the intended use.

Buy foods in plentiful supply.

**DON'T FEED THE GARBAGE CAN . . .** The average American feeds 225 pounds of food a year to the garbage can. That's two-thirds of a pound a day. At the low rate of 25 cents a pound, this means a family of five pays \$281 for groceries they do not eat.

Reason: Lack of good planning and buying, poor preparation and serving, poor use of leftovers, and improper practices of preservation and storage. Solution: Suggestions for planning meals, buying, preparing, serving, and preserving foods are given in Extension Bulletin "Eat Well for Less." Get a copy from the HD agent's office.

Eggs are available in various grades and sizes in most markets. Extension foods and nutrition specialists say highest grades, A and AA, are ideal for cooking in

the shell, for frying, or poaching. Thrifty homemakers need not shy away from Grade "B" eggs, but rather take advantage of the plentiful supply and lower price by serving egg main dishes often and by stepping-up the richness of many other foods with added eggs.

Non-fat milk solids contain all nutrients found in fresh skim milk. It is economical and can supplement or substitute for part of your milk supply. Use non-fat milk solids for making your own mixes. Use them for biscuits, shortcakes, muffins, waffles, pancakes, chocolate pudding. Recipes are found in extension bulletin "How to Use Whole and Nonfat Dry Milk."

Next time you have mashed potatoes, use a tablespoon of milk powder for every medium-sized potato. Add it with the butter when you mash the potatoes. Then, instead of adding fluid milk, use some of the hot potato water in which you cooked the potatoes. Substitute powders for milk in sauces, gravies, desserts, and meat loaves. Supplement calcium by adding powders to whole fresh milk (especially for children).
