Cover Crop Plans Announced For Eastland County By ASC TEditor's Note: The following |

was written by Upper Leon Soft Conservation District supervisors.)

Many landowpers of this area are now very busy planting winter cover crops on their lands.

The conservation farmer and rancher regards cover crops as a nust" in orded to hold his soil and water in place. Winter cover crops when drilled of broadcast do much to reduce soil loss from both wind and water. A cover C op with a legume does much to ndition the soil by making both tight and loose sand easier to plow. The tight land becomes more mellow and the loose land firmer.

The addition of much needed organic matter to the soil is of great importance. Organic matter or crop residus is nature's way of feeding and conditioning the soil.

Good land cover helps hold rainfall in place, increases available-plant food and air space within the soil, all of which are essential if the land is to produce profitably. Increased crop yields are a result, for the most part, to the above soil conditions. Winter cover crops can be used for supplemental income through grazing.

Hairy vetch is regarded as the best winter legume for this area. Hairy vetch is a fibrous rooted winter legume which has proved its value by protecting soil from wind and water erosion. It in-crases the yield of the following crops by adding organic matter. and hitrogen to the soil.

Land owners are reminded of the invertible cost share rate other need conservation practices.

Your county ASC Committee Conservation district super gisors, agricultural workers and thers have recognized the value of cover crops and have provided a very good program to encourage landowner participation. limited to half of the cropland, but not in excess of 60 acres. Assistance is offered on phosphate for legumes. Be sure to secure an approval from the ASC office before these practices are planted, otherwise payment cannot be made, the ASC office said.

Under a new law any producer may grow 30 acres of wheat for feed on the farm. If a producer wishes to take part in this program an agreement must be filed by October 15, 1957, or before the wheat is seeded, whichever is earlier. If an agreement is signed on, wheat may be sold off the farm.

All the details of the Conservation Reserve' Program for 1958 (5 year program) have not been received. It is expected that this program will be available by about October 15.

The ASC reports several inquiries regarding sacks for peanuts this fall. They advised the producer to contact the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association for the details because of the strict requirements.

Peanut and cotton marketing cards have been prepared and may be secured from the county office. Cards will be mailed to producers upon request.

the shell, for frying, or poaching. Thrifty homemakers need not shy away from Grade "B" eggs, but rather take advantage of the plentiful supply and lower price by serving egg main dishes often and by stepping-up the richness of many other foods with added eggs.

Non-fat milk solids contain all nutrients found in fresh skim milk. It is economical and can supplement or substitute for part of your milk supply. Use nonfat milk solids for making your own mixes. Use them for biscuits, shortcakes, muffins, waffles, pancakes, chocolate pudding. Recipes are found in extension bulletin "How to Use Whole and Nonfat Dry Milk."

Next time you have mashed potatoes, use a tablespoon of milk powder for every mediumsized potato. Add it with the butter when you mash the potatoes. Then, instead of adding fluid milk, use some of the hot potato water in which you cooked the potatoes. Substitute powders for milk in sauces, gravies, desserts, and meat loaves. Supplement calcium by adding powders to whole fresh milk (especially for children).




