# First Three Thousand Numbers Stand for Draft

## Lists of All Men Drafted On Way to Exemption Boards

### 106 Killed; 770 Hurt in Second Revolt; Government in Control

PETROGRAD, July 21.—One hundred were killed, and seven hundred were wounded of the civilians, soldiers and sailors rioters, besides six Cosacks were killed and seventy wounded, completes the casualty list of the second Russian revolution. This revolt has apparently been ended after five days of rioting. The government is now in control of the dissatisfied element and the city is quiet.

Minister of War Kerensky has temporarily been named Premier of Russia to succeed Prince Lvoff who resigned.

### Registration of Ladies in City Is Complete; Waste Will Stop

Following the two days of registration at the seven appointed stations in Ballinger, a personal canvass was made by a number of girls and ladies yesterday with good results. Something between a third and a fourth of the population of the city is now under pledge to stop waste of foods and "help win the war" under the Food Administrator's plan.

The total number of cards signed up, announced by city chairman, Mrs. W. S. Fleming this afternoon, is 357. This represents

families of 1485 people. Practically every hotel, boarding house and restaurant in town is represented in the registration.

Mrs. U. P. Melton, in charge of the food conservation work for the county, is requesting all those who get the Banner-Ledger (weekly edition) to clip the registration blank, sign it and mail it in to her address in Ballinger. This will prevent a shortage of cards, and as there are no funds appropriated for this work, will materially help the local committee.

### British To Use Reprisals On Germans

LONDON, July 21.—It was announced in the British House of Commons this morning that England intends to adopt the policy of reprisals for German air raids. This is the culmination of a bitter fight in the British Parliament to demand counter air raids for the brutal massacres of women and children in London and other cities by Zeppelin bombers.

### 5,000 MOTORCYCLES FOR THE NEW ARMY

WASHINGTON, July 21.—The War Department announced this afternoon that it had contracted for five thousand motorcycles for the new National army.

### CALLED TO DALLAS FOR INSPECTION.

Willard Wooden and Clint Penn left Saturday for Dallas. They enlisted in the National Guard some time ago, and were examined then. They were called out this time for inspection and will probably be returned here to await call to service.

### 6 BOYS HERE JOIN ARMY SIGNAL CORPS

Lieutenant E. A. Noyes of the Medical Corps of the United States regular army, accompanied by an assistant, arrived in Ballinger Friday afternoon on the east-bound train to accept enlistments for the Signal Corps branch of the regular army. Six boys from this place were examined and sworn in for this service for "the period of the emergency."

All six young men: Elmer Allison, Eugene Kipp, K. V. Northington, James Skinner, Frank Cameron, and Raymond Conner, were enlisted, which is said to be the best record for enlistment made by the Signal Corps officer on this trip through Texas.

Thirty-seven men in all were signed up on this tour, and after leaving Ballinger, Lieut. Noyes will go on to Austin, where he has only one other applicant.

Five of the men here had been in correspondence with the War Department for some time regarding enlistment and had had their applications accepted. Eugene Kipp, who has but recently returned from Guadalajara, wired in his application as soon as he learned of the opportunity and received his recommendation for enlistment when Lieut. Noyes came in. Roy Reeder, who had been examined and sworn in by Captain Mitchell of the Signal Corps at Sweetwater a few weeks ago, was instrumental in getting the local men to apply for this branch of the service and in securing an enlistment officer to come here.

These men will not be asked to report to Fort Sam Houston for at least thirty days, and possibly not for sixty days. After a brief training at Leon Springs in military tactics they will be transferred to a Northern camp, where they will be till ordered to France.

### ORGANIZE CHAPTER RED CROSS HERE

A call meeting of Red Cross members was held at Higginbotham Bros., store Friday afternoon to consider organizing a chapter of the Red Cross in Ballinger. Information had been sent for, but for some reason, blanks for an auxiliary were sent instead of the blanks for a chapter.

If an auxiliary were organized, Ballinger would be put under San Angelo, and all work done by Ballinger would be credited to San Angelo. On the other hand, if a chapter were organized, Ballinger could include other small towns near here as auxiliaries. This would make Ballinger headquarters for Runnels County.

It was decided that a chapter rather than an auxiliary would better suit conditions here, and a telegram was sent for blanks for organizing a chapter. A meeting will be held some time next week to complete the organization.

### TRAFFIC LAW ALSO ON THE BICYCLES

County Attorney Harris is calling the attention of bicycle owners to the fact that they are subject to the same laws and regulations as are motorists and automobilists in regard to head and tail light provisions.

Mr. Harris also received a communication from the Attorney General this morning making special mention of the action of the extraordinary session of the Legislature wherein that body amended the traffic law so that there is no provision in the original act that has no penalty applied. The lowest fine for the first offense for any violation of the act is not less than \$1.00 and not more than \$100.00, and for the second offense not less than \$10.00 and not more than \$200.00 will be assessed. If the court sees fit the driver's license may be cancelled in addition to the fines above noted, owing mainly to the flagrancy of the offense.

WASHINGTON, July 21.—Provost Marshal General Crowder announced this afternoon that the missing number 10,004 had been located. The checking up of the sheets has been completed.

Official lists of all drafted numbers will be on the way to the exemption boards before nightfall. The drawing of the approximately ten million men of America to combat autocracy, Hohenzollernism and Hapsburgitis, was closed at 2:18 o'clock this morning.

Men who comprise America's first National army were represented in the first three thousand numbers drawn, it is stated.

The last number in the draft list carried by this paper today will complete the list to be published until the official numbers have been received by the local exemption board. The news value in the last remaining names are now considered naught since the first three thousand numbers of the total drawn in Washington will determine America's new army draft.

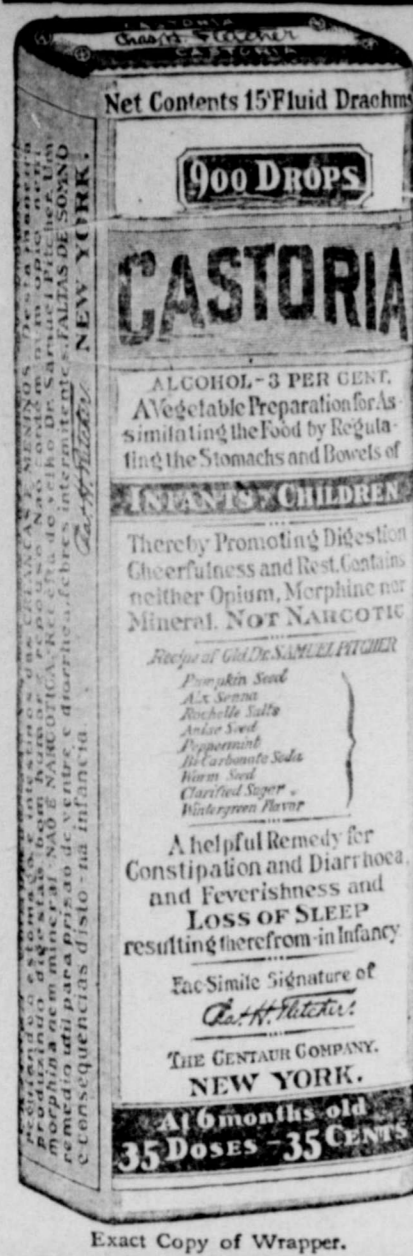

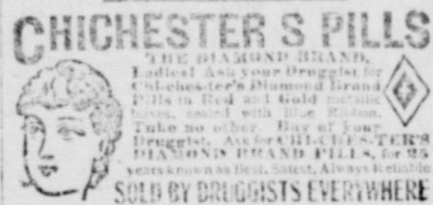

**THIRTY-FIVE MILES  
OF STATE HIGHWAY**

To secure a branch of the Tex-O-Kan Highway will insure thirty-five miles of state highway for this county. The highway will enter the county at the county line north of Winters and extend across the county to the south line passing out of the county on the Paint Rock road fourteen miles south of Ballinger. Under the provisions of the highway law the road would be maintained under the direction of the state highway department. The road would be officially designed as a state highway and with the listing of the road in the official log books of the country would bring much extra travel this way, to say nothing of the great benefit such a road would be to local travel.

The Tex-O-Kan Highway Association will hold a meeting at Abilene next Friday at which time the gap from Abilene south will be agreed upon and logged out. Two routes have been proposed, one going from Abilene to Lawn, Coleman and Brady, and the other from Abilene to Winters, Ballinger and Paint Rock. It is up to the people on the line of the

proposed road coming this way to get busy and go after the highway. To do this it will be necessary to "buck" such fellows as Grant of Brady and Boog-Scott, of Coleman. It is up to Simms, of Paint Rock, Bob Kirk, of Ballinger, and Jno. G. McAdams, Jones and Hill and of Winters to get their heads together and call on the people to help them, and help now.

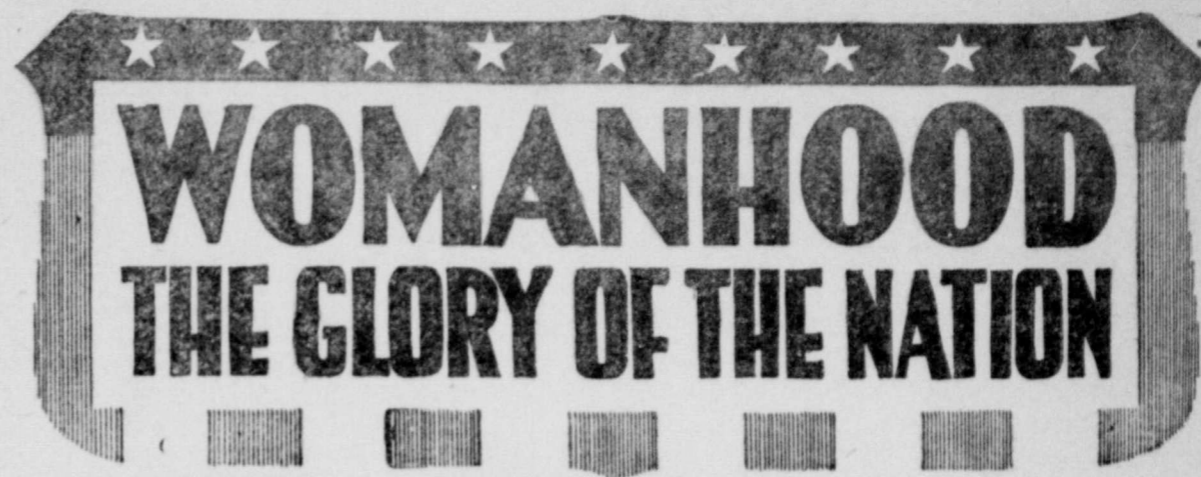

Besides this he put in a spare moment or two checking over the lists, handling the regular news service to the newspaper, receiving and sending the regular messages and commercial letters, and taking government stuff.

"We have probably had a greater business in a single day from the standpoint of money received, on days that we handled cable messages," said Rush, "but, Friday's business was positively the greatest in amount of words."

That the greatest number may be reached with this message of patriotism, a special day will be set aside during the Fair for a mammoth patriotic rally and special programs will be held each day, when the principal theme will be love of country and duty to our Government.

As a member of the Texas State Council of National Defense President Knight has taken up his plans with the Bureau of Patriotism Through Education of the National Security League and the fair will have the active co-operation of these organizations throughout the entire fifteen days of the exposition. Speakers of national and international reputation will be present on the special Patriotism Day and on numerous other days during the fair.

Supplementing the big rally to be held on Patriotism Day, these speakers will be heard each afternoon and night in the Coliseum, where, as a part of the regular program, ten-minute talks on patriotism will be made by some national character.

During these periods Thaviu's Band will render programs of music appropriate to the occasion, and war scenes will be projected on the curtain of the stage. Special arrangements are being perfected to procure authentic pictures direct from the battle fronts in Europe, and with the landing of United States troops in the war zone these views are expected to prove of exceptional interest. Discussing the plans for the patriotism programs President Knight said:

"The whole purpose of the plans of the State Fair of Texas along these particular lines is to put before the people not simply patriotism and public duty and backing up the Government, but also a clear statement of the sufficient reasons for going to war and sticking to the war until victory is reached, as it is absolutely sure to be reached. It is vital to make clear what can be done by the individual man, woman or child, the church, the lodge, the community, the society, for the common good.

"Addresses will be made during the State Fair by leaders of thought in every branch of activity related to the war. The relation of the war to agriculture, labor, business, finance, medicine, military and naval needs and every phase of endeavor will be explained.

"Every individual citizen of the United States must be aroused to a realization of the meaning of the war and the importance of personal service. 'The people of no country are imbued with more patriotic spirit than the people of Texas. While this is true, it is yet a fact that even we, sometimes, need to be reminded that patriotism means more than mere demonstration of this enthusiasm.

"In my opinion no agency in Texas or elsewhere could more comprehensively direct this patriotism into real service than the great State Fair of Texas. While these people are gathered together in multiplied thousands, we want to bring home to them clearly and forcibly a complete realization of the meaning of this war and a clear understanding of the great economic, industrial and international problems that are confronting and will confront this country during and after the war."

**NEW MEXICO RUIN YIELDS RICH FIND**

Santa Fe, N. M., July 19.—An extraordinary find of historic pottery and relics has been made by Earl Morris, excavating pueblo ruins at Aztec, San Juan county, with a force of twenty-five men for the American Museum of National History.

The discovery includes sixty pieces of rare pottery, over twenty thousand carved red and black beads, baskets, matting, knives, battle axes and other stone implements. Turquoise beads, mosaics and shell ornaments are classed as among the finest ever excavated in the southwest.

Grains of corn with cob, tassels and husks were intact as were also beans and bean pods, pumpkin seeds, pine cones, cotton fiber, yucca leaves, rushes, cotton yarn and cloth, sandals, snowshoes, beaver teeth and bones of animals and human beings, one skeleton in a sitting position, indicating the man had been decapitated. The find was made in underground communal dwellings buried for centuries.

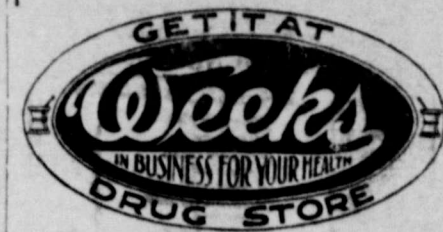
