ANOTHER COUNTTY JUMPS INTO WAR.

London, July 22.-Siam has dewith Germany and Austria, acording to a Reuter's dispatch rom Bankkok. Nine steamers aggregating 19,000 tons have been eized. The object of Siam's delaration is "to uphold the sanetity of international rights against nations showing contempt for the principles of humanity and respect for small states." All Germans and Austrians, the dispatch adds, have been placed under arrest and their business closed. Siam, "the land of the free," a kingdom of southeastern Asia, has a population veriously estimated at between 5,000,000 and 10,000,000; it is probably more than 8,000,000. The peace strength of the army is about 12, 000 men, while the navy consists nominally of twenty-one vessels, all of small size.

How It Is Commanded.

An army is a huge body of men gathered together for fighting purposes in different units of organization. An army when it passes a certain strength usually is commanded by a general. Today there is no general in the United States army, but it is probable that within a few months congress will revive the rank and name some officer, who, taking the title of general, shall have supreme command of all the fighting forces in the field.

An army is composed of army corps.

There may be two or three or more corps in an army. Sometimes when the field one general is put in supreme command while his forces are divided into several armies, each one in command of a lieutenant general. It is likely that congress soon will make Maj. Gen. John J. Pershing a lieutenant general and put him in command of the First corps, consisting of several divisions of troops, to see service in

A division of troops is commanded by a major general. It is composed of several brigades, each one of which is commanded by a brigadier general. It is possible for a brigade to consist of a combination of cavalry, infantry and artillery, but frequently each brigade is composed of regiments all of the same branch of the service. The typical infantry brigade, for instance, consists of a headquarters and three regiments of infantry, while a typical cavalry brigade consists of a headquarters and three regiments of cav-




