AUSTIN, Aug. 21.-Gov. Ferguson this morning again positively refused to divulge the names of men who loaned him \$150,.. 000. Mr. Ferguson reiterated the statement made yesterday when asked to tell where he got the money by saying he would resign, if that was the price to be paid for refusing to make the answer. M. M. Crane, counsel for the prosecution, pressed Mr. Ferguson to answer the question, and appealed to Judge Bryan for a ruling as to whether Mr. Ferguson should answer the question. Judge Bryan passes on the admisability of the testiomny and he asked the legislature to give him until two o'clock to decide the matter and determine on whether the governor should be required to answer the question or not.

Judge Hanger, counsel for Mr. Ferguson, directed the governor to not answer the question and the attorneys began arguing the question. The prosecution holds that the question is very material.
