Orders were issued a week or ten days ago for the movement of eight negro soldiers from this coun ty to Camp Travis on Oct. 27th. The local board had a sufficient number of negroes rounded up and ready to fill the required quota, and these would have entrained here next Saturday.

A delay in the schedule for moving troops caused the adjutant general to wire postponement.


