Suggested Pantry

If the United States ever suf-fers thermonuclear attack, one of the basic problems for Amer-ica's millions would be food, and how to get enough of it.

MAS

In the so-called good old days the family pantry generally was loaded with food-ready for any

MILK: One package of powdered, non-fat dry milk, and two 14% of cans of evaporated milk. FRUITS: One 1 lb 14 oz. can each of two varieties of canned fruits, and 1 lb. of dried fruits. JUICES: Three cans of approxi-mately 1 qt. 14 oz. each of fruit or vegetable juice. VEGETABLES: Six cans (approxi-mately 1 lb. each) of vegetables. SOUPS: Four 10% oz. cans. MEATS AND MEAT SUBSTI-TUTES: Four cans (approximately 1 lb. each) of your favorite items. In-clude cheese or peanut butter if de-sired. CERFALS: Seven individual-servemergency. ... TODAY, THE FEDERAL Civil Defense Administration recom-mends that every family keep a minimum of a seven-day supply of food in the home for instant use in an emergency. This has become known as Grandma's

Pantry. To estimate how much food is needed for seven days, multiply the number of per-sons in the family by the amounts shown in the adjoining list for one person. A two or three weeks supply would be more desirable. Foods listed are merely types rec-ommended, not necessarily these which must be stocked.

The items kept on hand should be those staple groceries that are used in your normal pattern of daily serving. By following this plan rotation is no prob-

IF YOUR CHILDREN er young, decrease the amounts by one-fourth. If the children are infants, canned baby foods should be substituted for some of the other canned foods. And don't forget-be sure to plan for the people or invalids. Another word of caution: check your "pantry" at least monthly, and rotate items regularly. Bottled water, for instance, should be changed every, six

weeks.

Essential items for your stockroom should include two gallons of water in juge or bottles for each person, and three gallons for each child under three years old. Tou should also maintain a sup-ply of sait and super, make ply of sait and sugar, match es, fuel, cooking utensils, a can opener, and tabloward You would also do well to he

CEREALS: Seven individual-serv-ice packages of ready-to-eat variety. BREAD: The canned varieties. CRACKERS-COOKIES: One box. BEVERAGES: One small jar of instant coffee, one of instant tea, or a 1 ib. package of instant cocoa, whichever your family prefers. SOFT DRINKS: Twelve bottles. SUPPLEMENTARY ITEMS: Sug-ar, salt, seasonings, candy (types that store well), chewing gum, and ciga-reites and tobacco. CAUTION: Store these items like in your storage room a port radio, flashlight, candles holders, first-aid kit, blank pail and garbage container. On the lighter side, you m add a supply of games and t rettes and tobacco. CAUTION: Store these items like Grandma did—in a dry, cool base-ment or storeroom within a tempera-ture range of 35 to 50 depress for best results. Check your "pantry" prefer-ably weekly but at least monthly and rotate items regularly. Use within six months. Bottled water should be changed every six weeks.

Revised Farmer's Gas Tax Refund Guide Available


A. E. Fogle, Administrative Officer of the Abilene Internal Revenue office, announced today that a revised Farmer's Gas Tax Refund guide booklet is now available to assist farmers in submitting Federal gas tax refund claims for the year ending June 30, 1957.


The Publication, No. 308, together with claim Form 2240 and instructions for submission of claims are available on request at the Abilene, Texas Internal Revenue office. Forms and instructions also may be obtained at county agricultural agents' offices.

Claims should be filed on Form 2240 on or after July 1, but no later than September 30, 1957.

Last year a million and a quarter farmers filed claims for refund of the Federal tax on gasoline used for farming purposes, and refunds averaged \$20.

It is estimated that the number of claims for refund filed this year will be close to 2,500,-000, and the total refund is expected to increase correspondingly. These expected increases are due to an increase in the Federal gas tax rate from two to three cents a gallon plus the fact ' that an entire year will be covered by these claims whereas only taxes paid on gas used during the first six months of 1956 were subject to the claims filed last year. The Farmer's Tax Refund guide explains in plain language the rules and procedures to be followed in filing a claim for refund of the Federal gasoline tax. It also explains conditions under which the farmers may purchase diesel fuel and other special motor fuels, to be used for farm purposes, without payment of the Federal tax thereon. 62
