#### Farmers Reminded To Ask Refund Of Federal Gas Tax

COLLEGE STATION, July 3.

Farmers are reminded by C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist, that they may now apply for a refund on the 3-cent Federal tax on gasoline used for farming. The amount claimed must be based on the quantity of fuel used for farming purposes on individual farms and ranches during the period from July 1, 1956 to June 30. 1957.

Bates says that all claims must be submitted to the District Director, it had Revenue Service and claims for the past ar must be in by September 30, 1957. Only one refund claim per farm to permitted and operator wall each tax claimant is cautioned make certain that his refund . cuest includes all eligible fuel used.

Each farm or ranch operator who applied for tax refunds in 1956 will be mailed Form 2240 for filing the 1957 claim. An instruction sheet for preparing the application will also be provided, says Bates. For new fuel users or those who failed to file last year, copies of the filing form may be obtained from the office of the local county agent.

Too, Bates suggests that a copy of Publication 308, Farmers Gas Tax Refund, prepared by the Internal Revenue Service, be obtained from the county agent's office or from the nearest District Internal Revenue Service Office.

The specialist advises agricultural producers who used an ap-preciable amount of gasoline last year in their farming or ranching operations to check into their eligibility for a refund. The legislation which makes possible the refund was passed by Congress in the spring of 1956 and farmers unfamiliar with the procedure should contest their local cedure should contact their local county agent or Internal Revenue Service for details.





More than 3,000 sons and daughters of deceased war veterans attended class this past school year under the eight-month-old War Orphans Education Program, Mr. Scott B. Harringon, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Dallas, Texas, revealed today.

But he pointed out that the educational programs, which went into effect after the 1956-57 school year got under way, is just now beginning to gain momentum. During the next school year, he predicted, War Orphans enrollments probably will more than double this year's total.

And the years ahead will witness even greater increases, he said, as younger children of de-ceased veterans reach the legal age for war orphans schooling. Generally, the program is for young men and women between 18 and 23 years of age.

At present, for example, an estimated 25,000 sons and daughters of war veterans who died of conditions caused by military service are 14 years old. They'll reach the eligible age for war orphans education in another four years. And another 60,000 are under 14. They will become eligible in another four years.

War orphans education is available to the sons and daughters of Wald War I, World War II and Kerean veterans who died of conditions caused by their military service. They may receive up to 36 months of education with an allowable of up to-\$110 for each month of schooling complet-

#### Quail Hunting Is Expected To Be Good This Winter

AUSTIN, July 11. - Right now conditions point to the best quail season Texans have known for years, according to the Assistant Executive Secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission. He has just returned from a trip through East Texas, studying first hand the effect of the hatchery program now under way.

At the same time wardens all over Texas are reporting to the Austin office of the Commission that the quail crop this year has been exceptionally good. Favorable weather conditions and improvement of habitat by land owners is given credit for the increased crop, according to the Assistant Executive Secretary.

The Commission hatchery at Tyler has some 19,000 quail on hand to be released by clubs or individuals. More than 11,000 birds already have been released this year.

"There are still some birds available to land owners with proper feed and cover," the Assistant Executive Secretary said. These birds are sold at 50 cents each to land owners who can qualify. Applications should be


